

Bangla still off computer code

Bangla, the mother tongue of the world's eighth-largest population group, is not included in the cluster of languages that are part of the computer operating system.

Popular computer software makers have incorporated more than 250 languages into their operating system, but Bangla did not find its place yet, despite a sharp rise in the use of computers, experts in the information communications technology (ICT) said.

The operating system is the low-level software, which handles the interface to peripheral hardware, schedules tasks, and allocates storage and default to users when no application programme runs.

Bangla has lost its possibility of entry to the computer operating system due to lack of initiatives and patronisation by the government and non-implementation of copyright laws in the country.

Bangladesh is yet to have the universal computer code of its language since the country is not a member of the Unicode Consortium, a body on formation of a global character standard or universal computer code. The Unicode Consortium has successfully created International Standard ISO/IEC 10646 for languages.

Fierce Israeli attacks on Palestinians, Arafat's office

Call for emergency UNSC session as 15 killed

Israel killed 15 Palestinian security forces members in a fierce wave of ground, air and sea attacks in Gaza and the West Bank early Wednesday in bitter payback for a guerrilla ambush that gunned down six Israeli troops.

The retribution strikes for the first time hit Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat's Gaza City headquarters, strafed by a warship, killing four of Arafat's bodyguards and injuring four others.

Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon, who has been severely criticised for failing to outline a clear plan to tackle the 17-month crisis which threatens to explode into all-out war, ordered his forces to hit back hard and fast after one of the deadliest Palestinian guerrilla raids yet.

The ambush Tuesday night occurred after Palestinian gunmen took up a position in a building overlooking an army checkpoint, near the village of Ein Arik, west of Ramallah on the West Bank, opening fire before escaping into Palestinian territory.

Six Israeli soldiers were killed and one injured.

Israel swiftly hit Arafat's Gaza compound, with Palestinian security officials reporting an attempted beach assault by Israeli marines on the building, but there was no independent confirmation.

Minutes after the first strike, an F-16 fighter-bomber blasted Gaza City police headquarters and Apaches helicopters launched five hours of strikes.

They fired 20 missiles at targets across the city, including a civilian

Ban on 2-stroke three-wheelers in city after 6 months

UNB, Dhaka

The government has decided to ban two-stroke three-wheelers in the city after six months and in other parts of the country in phases.

It has also decided to seize the three-wheelers plying the city streets without fitness certificate, route permit and tax stickers.

"Punitive actions, including imprisonment, will be taken against the drivers and owners of those three-wheelers that will ply the streets with fake stickers," said an official announcement quoting the decisions of an inter-ministerial meeting yesterday.

The Dhaka Metropolitan Police have been asked to take effective steps in this regard.
