## Halim, Javed propel Dhaka

Brilliant half-centuries from Halim Shah and national player Javed Omar put Ispahani National League leaders Dhaka in the driving seat against hosts Kulnna at the Jessore Stadium on Friday.

On the penultimate day, Halim slammed 94 while Javed hit 66 as Dhaka, resuming on 133 for two, scored 363 for nine in their second innings before captain Khaled Mahmud declared. It left the home side chasing a victory target of 271 runs.

At close of play, the home side, who enjoyed a 93-run first innings lead, lost three wickets with 42 runs on the board.

A victory for the star-studded capital team will ensure their maiden championship with a match in hand.

However, the day began badly for Dhaka as they lost two wickets in the morning leaving them on 141 for

four.

But the middle-order pair of Halim and Javed put on 139 runs for the fifth wicket to steer their side out of trouble.

The magnificent stand ended when Halim was trapped leg before by Tushar. He hammered seven fours in his 276-minute vigil.

Javed, who fell to the occasional spin of Hasanuzzaman, hammered six boundaries.

Left-arm spinner Mohammad Rafique, claimed two for 10 from five overs while Khaled Mahmud grabbed the other wickets.

At the MA Aziz Stadium, visitors Barisal avoided their seventh successive defeat when opener Imran Ahmed carried his bat against Chittagong.

The right-hander scored an unbeaten 89 as Barisal took their overnight 6-0 to 213 for six at stumps. It gave them a lead of 148 runs.

Imran's six-hour knock contained eleven boundaries. Middle-order Kamal (33) was the other notable scorer.

## Tamim may step down

The Cricket Committee of Dhaka Metropolis (CCDM) chairman GS Hasan Tamim has threatened to quit if the senior division clubs of Dhaka do not cooperate with him.

Tamim, who is also a director of Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB), was reacting to the news that the inter-club cricketers transfer might be deferred from the scheduled March 4 date to allow the Bangladesh A team players return from the West Indies and participate in the bourse.

Tamim, who came back to Dhaka from Malaysia on Thursday night, said that it would be very unfortunate for local cricket if the clubs demand yet another delay in the transfer programme.

"Nine of the 12 Premier Division clubs told me that they wanted the transfers to begin from March because of post Eid hangover. But nobody has told me anything regarding A team players," said Tamim adding that all the clubs had agreed on holding a day-long long transfer exclusively for the A team cricketers when they return home.

"But now it seems we have developed a new problem with the A team. This is not a healthy sign for cricket. If the players' bourse is late, inevitably the league will start behind schedule. If the Premier league is delayed once again, clubs may not agree to play in the next season's league which we had planned to kick off in October," Tamim said.

"If required I will resign but I won't tolerate this kind of disorder any more. No one is cooperating with me," said a visibly frustrated Tamim.

Tamim also informed that he has asked all the clubs to put forward their demands in writing so that he can arrange an emergency meeting in this connection.

Meanwhile, the CCDM have sent a request letter to the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) yesterday for not relegate Lalmatia Club and Indra Road Krira Chakra from First Division this season.

who have all agreed two-year contracts, played a combined total of almost 300 Tests and have an average age of 51, 10 years lower than the current ICC panel.

All 10 Test-playing countries were asked to nominate candidates for the panel, and more than 30 were interviewed by Madugalle.

He then made recommendations to International Cricket Council chief executive Malcolm Speed and Sunil Gavaskar, chairman of the ICC's Cricket Committee-Playing, who had the final say.

Gavaskar took no part, however, in considering the claims of Viswanath, who is his brother-in-law.

"I know that international captains and cricketers are looking to match referees to take a sensible and consistent lead on disciplinary and other matters," said Gavaskar.

"This new panel is a tremendous group of former Test cricketers, who I am sure will command the respect of teams around the world."

Of the five, only Madugalle and Viswanath are members of the existing panel, although Lloyd did the job for three years until 1995-96 before taking up the job of West Indies team manager.

Wasim has been working as a teacher in India, while Procter has concentrated on media work since giving up the job of South African coach in 1994, although he remains a national team selector.

"Restructuring the panel from 20 part-time referees to five full-time professionals will take standards of decision-making and authority to new levels.

"The referees will work closely with the new panel of eight elite umpires and I am confident that with a new disciplinary code to back their judgement, we will see a distinct improvement in on-field behaviour in a short space of time," Speed commented.

The appointments come at a time when the ICC is embroiled in an ongoing row over the officiating of former England captain Denness during the South Africa v India Test at Bloemfontein last November.

He punished six Indian players for dissent and other breaches of discipline, prompting furious protests and the setting up of a review panel to look into the matter.

Their findings may be made public later this week.



Ramprakash arrived in New Zealand last weekend and will get his first outing of the tour when England meet Otago in a three-day game in Queenstown, starting on Saturday.



Aussie delegates all for Pak tour

Australian cricket officials Friday played down security concerns over their September-October tour of Pakistan and said it should go ahead.

"Pakistan is no different from other countries and we are proceeding on the basis that the tour will go ahead, once the facilities and security of our players are guaranteed," Richard Watson, Australian Cricket Board (ACB) general manager of cricket operations, told reporters while inspecting the national stadium here.

He was visiting the arena in southern Karachi with Tim May, chief of Australian Cricketers' Association (ACA), and ACB security expert Reg Dickson on the first day of a week-long reconnaissance trip.

The delegation is also due to meet representatives of the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB), police and government officials.

Watson said the pre-tour checks in Pakistan were the same as for any destination.
