

Bill to make namaj mandatory deferred

Speaker Jamiruddin Sircar yesterday deferred introduction of a private member's (non-minister lawmaker) bill seeking state intervention to ensure that all Muslim citizens offer prayers (namaj) five times a day.

The deferral came as the architect of the bill, GM Quader of the Ershad-led Jatiya Party, said he was not prepared to move the bill after the speaker invited him to do so.

"I seek your permission to table the bill on the next private member's day," Quader told the speaker.

Stand up to oppressive government

Hasina tells March 7 rally

Awami League chief Sheikh Hasina has urged the people to build up resistance against the BNP-led alliance government which, she

alleged, was repressing opposition leaders and workers and members of the minority community across the country.

"First they (ruling alliance men) gouged eyes and cut limbs of Awami League leaders and workers, then they looted houses and property of opposition workers and now they are torturing and killing women," the Leader of the Opposition in Jatiya Sangsads said while addressing a big rally at Paltan Maidan in the city yesterday.

The AL organised the rally in observance of the historic March 7. Senior party leaders also addressed it.

Hasina alleged that the administration of Prime Minister Khaleda Zia was 'pressurising the victims of repression' to give statements as per its wishes.

Citing examples, she said that an acid victim named Rahima was kept confined at a Narail police station to force her not to mention the name of a BNP man who had thrown acid on her.

Southern region losing ecological, social character

People's consultation told in Barisal

Representatives of various professional and socioeconomic groups from greater Barisal yesterday observed that this southern riverine region is losing its ecological and social character through introduction of unplanned development programmes in different sectors affecting the heritage and livelihood of the people.

Taking part in a daylong consultation here at the divisional headquarters of Barisal they said the programmes particularly in agriculture and communication sectors were designed without taking into consideration the features of the region causing loss of its natural advantageous characteristics in favour of random, drastic development.

This part of the country once identified as a region of "paddy, rivers and canals" has now almost lost its heritage with its rivers and canals drying out and its famous varieties of rice becoming extinct, forcing locals to be dependent on imported rice from outside, they said.

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Danish, German envoys ask govt to stop minority repression
