PM condemns terrorist attack on church in Islamabad

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia has strongly condemned the terrorist attack on a church in Pakistan capital, Islamabad.

In a message to Pakistan President General Pervez Musharraf the Prime Minister yesterday said, "I am deeply saddened by the news of the grenade attack in a church in Islamabad, causing death to some and injuries to many others I strongly deplore such an act of

"My government has constantly spoken out strongly against terrorism in all its manifestations. Your commitment to bring to justice the perpetrators of such violence enjoys our full support," said the Prime Minister in her message.

Khaleda Zia expressed her confidence that the government and people of Pakistan would be able to meet such challenges.

The arrested Proshika staff are Omar Tareq Chowdhury, a deputy director of Proshika and Ajharul Haque, a messenger of the same

Cabinet okays poly ban plan

The cabinet yesterday agreed in principle to amendments to laws for permanent ban on production, marketing and use of all types of polythene shopping bags

To ensure the ban on polythene bags, the cabinet approved amendments to the Bangladesh Environment Preservation Act, 1995 and the Environment Court Act, 2000, which propose stringent punishment to law-

The amendment proposes a maximum of 10 years in prison and Tk 10 lakh in fine for production and marketing of all types of polythene shopping

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia and the cabinet members overwhelmingly supported the move to introduce the new laws, sources said

However, the cabinet rejected a proposal to impose a token fine of maximum Tk 500 for the use of polybags as this may subject foreigners to harass-

The foreigners may carry polybags on arrival at the airport, which may

AL to meet next week on resignation move

The Awami League lawmakers are likely to meet early next week to finalise the submission of their resignation letters.

Following last week's dramatic decision to resign from the parliament in protest at a government move to remove Bangabandhu's portrait from all government, semigovernment and autonomous bodies and 'unabated repression', the AL members of the parliament (MPs) are now supposed to deposit their resignation letters with party chief Sheikh Hasina.

Party sources said the 58 AL MPs would submit the letters to

Hasina once she returns to Dhaka from a weeklong tour to the southwestern region.

Opposition Chief Whip Abdus Shahid hinted that the AL Parliamentary Party (ALPP) might call a meeting early next week after Hasina's return on Sunday.

Earlier, AL General Secretary Zillur Rahman said Hasina would 'take necessary steps about resignation at an appropriate time'.

Sources said the ALPP meeting would take stock of the situation and decide when they would quit the parliament

Twenty-year-old Nilufar now ponders over whether she would ever get to see her six-year-old child now in custody of her husband, her right arm melted with forearm and twisted left hand.

The only fault of Nilufar, now mother of two, was that her poor parents had defaulted on payment of Tk 50,000 in dowry.

Nilufar, pregnant and emaciated, fainted when her mother-inlaw and husband beat her up nearly throughout the night. The mother and her son lent a cruel edge to the incident by pouring kerosene on a bleeding Nilufar and set her aflame.

In trauma at the Barisal Medical College Hospital, Nilufar was threatened with death by her inlaws, while being treated for burns.

About one and a half years ago (on a Friday night) Nilufar was beaten mercilessly as she failed to pay the full amount of money her parents promised to.

Earlier, her parents living in a thatched house at Charmushura in Munshigani sold property and paid

A few months later, Nilufar's
