

## Bangladesh festival ends

The curtain fell on the Seventh Bangladesh Games yesterday.

President Professor AQM Badruddoza Chowdhury declared the end of the eight-day spectacle amidst fanfare at the Bangabandhu National Stadium in the afternoon.

The Games flame, which was burning from March 11, was put off soon after the three-hour closing ceremony had ended with brilliant fireworks that lit up the spring night over the big bowl.

Around four thousand athletes took part in 25 disciplines where in all 251 medals were on offer.

Bangladesh Ansars and VDP again asserted themselves as the best side by capturing highest 65 gold, 61 silver and 64 bronze medals while Bangladesh Jute Mills Corporation (BJMC) finished second with 48 gold, 31 silver and 21 bronze. Bangladesh Army and Bangladesh Navy finished third and fourth respectively with 41 and 24 gold.

Ansars also grabbed the top position in previous two editions in 1992 and 1996.

However, although the Ansars established themselves as the undisputed monarch in the quadrennial extravaganza, this seventh edition has produced some outstanding performances in athletics,

swimming, football and hockey.

BKSP, the country's lone sports institute, brought forward a new fastest man after seven years when 20-year-old Maruf Reza clinched the 100-metre gold with a record timing of 10.50 seconds.

Maruf also annexed the 200-metre glory to earn a rare double.

Mahbub Alam, who used to be

the fastest man of the country in last seven national championships and won the 200-metre gold in the 1995 SAF Games in Madras, pulled out of the 100m field with a groin injury halfway through the race.

Fouzia Huda Jui, who also belongs to the same institute, retained the fastest women's title.

In the pool, it was a three-person -- Karar Samedul Islam and Rubel Rana of Bangladesh Navy and Doly Akther of BJMC -- show.

Samedul, the shaven-headed swimmer who hails from Kishoreganj, bettered the South Asian Federation (SAF) Games records in 100 and 200 metres breaststroke as well as winning two more gold to finish with four. In fact, so good were his performances that Bangladesh Sports Journalists Association (BSJA) didn't have to think twice while picking him as the best performer of the meet.

On the other hand, his teammate Rubel Rana won eight gold with one SAF Games record and six national records.

But whereas there were two names in the men's section, in the women's there was only one -- Doly Akther.

Doly, in absence of the well-known Sabura Akhter, collected as many as nine gold. Sadly Sabura's absence had got nothing to do with any illness or injury. The teenage swimmer was made a mere spectator by the Kushtia District Court following an appeal by the District Sports Association for a breach of contract.

## Champs Trophy in Sri Lanka

Sri Lanka was confirmed as the venue for the 2002 International Cricket Council (ICC) Champions Trophy from September 12 to 30 in Cape Town on Monday.

The tournament will involve all ten Test playing nations plus Kenya and Holland.

"The ICC is delighted that the Board of Control for Cricket in Sri Lanka has agreed to act as host country for this major event," said chief executive officer Malcolm Speed.

"We look forward to working closely with the Board in staging one of world cricket's most entertaining and high-profile tournaments."

Teams will compete for a 1.15-million-dollar prize fund. The tournament is an expanded successor to the ICC Knockout, staged on two previous occasions -- in Dhaka, won by South Africa, and Nairobi, won by New Zealand.

There will be four pools of three teams in the new format. Each side will play two pool games before the semifinals.

Pool 1: Australia, Bangladesh, New Zealand.

Pool 2: England, India, Zimbabwe.

Pool 3: Kenya, South Africa, West Indies.

Pool 4: Holland, Pakistan, Sri Lanka.

FIDE Master Enamul Hossain Rajib drew with India's fourth-ranked player, Women's Grand Master Konuru Humpy in the first round of the 13th Goodricke International Open Chess Tournament at the Gorky Sadan in Kolkata on Sunday.

International Master Abdullah Al Rakib also drew his first round game with Indian Rahul Sangma.

A total of 53 players are participating in the meet including 19 Grand Masters, 12 International Masters, one Women's Grand Master and three FIDE Masters.

#### Police rough Singh up

India's leading spinner Harbhajan Singh was injured on Monday after being assaulted by police outside the team hotel, witnesses said.

"Harbhajan is bleeding profusely and his hands are bruised," an employee of the hotel told this news agency.

India are due to take on Zimbabwe in the fifth and final one-day international in this eastern city on Tuesday with the two teams locked 2-2.

Witnesses said the trouble began when a Delhi-based sports photographer wanted to go inside the team hotel to meet Singh.

"When the policemen didn't allow the photographer entry inside the hotel, Singh came down to the gate and asked the security to let him in as the photographer had a valid pass from the Indian team manager," the witness said.

"What followed was total chaos with policemen assaulting both Singh and the photographer, hitting them very badly."

City magistrate Abas Hazarika told AFP "the entire incident was very unfortunate."

There was no immediate comment from Indian team officials as senior police and civil officials rushed to the hotel to cool tempers.

#### Umpires to have techno service

Extended television technology to aid umpiring decisions will be tested during September's Champions Trophy tournament in Sri Lanka, the International Cricket Council (ICC) confirmed on Monday.

Under the system, which was agreed at an ICC meeting in Cape Town on Sunday, on-field umpires will be able to consult with the third official on any decision.

Consultation will be optional but when a third umpire is contacted, he will be allowed only two replays before passing information to the on-field officials.

The third umpire will not be able to intervene unless he is called upon by the on-field umpires.

The new ICC panel of elite umpires and match referees will discuss the recommendation at a four-day workshop near Cape Town which begins on Thursday.

The move was also endorsed by former Indian captain Sunil Gavaskar, who is on the ICC sub-committee that wants to bring in the new technology.

"International umpires do a difficult job extremely well. They already make a very high degree of correct decisions, for which they receive too little credit," Gavaskar said.
