Girder collapse
Govt warns of
punitive
action

The government would take punitive action against individuals, firms and organisations found responsible for the collapse of girders from under-construction footbridges in the city, killing three persons in last six months, the communications ministry has warned.

Minister for Communications Nazmul Huda said the city dwellers are concerned about safety of the footbridges being constructed under the supervision of Dhaka City Corporation (DCC).

He was speaking at a meeting of the National Road Safety Council (NRSC) yesterday, says a press release of the communications ministry.

To prevent recurrence of footbridge collapse, the NRSC decided to publish a white paper on alleged negligence, irresponsibility, technical faults and irregularities in tender awarding and contract signing by the DCC. The white paper would also focus on allocation of funds for construction of the bridges and negligence in construction work.

A three-member committee formed earlier submitted its report at the meeting, revealing "alarming irregularities in contract signing and extreme negligence in construction work."

The meeting decided that in future, all those who want to construct footbridges in the city must seek permission from the Dhaka Transport Coordination Board.

50 shanties
gutted at
Agargaon

At least 50 shanties were gutted in a fire at Taltala slum in the city's Agargaon area yesterday.

Fire brigade sources said the fire originated from a shanty at about 3:10 pm and soon engulfed the entire slum.

Seven fire fighting units rushed to the spot and extinguished the blaze after an hour.

Fire service sources estimated the extent of damage caused by fire at Tk 3.5 lakh.

BJP govt faces another crucial test March 26

Anti-terrorism bill to be tabled in joint parliament

PALLAB BHATTACHARYA, New Delhi

The gathering storm over India's ruling BJP-led alliance following differences among its constituents over the handling of VHP's temple movement in Ayodhya by the government of Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee and a proposed new anti-terrorism law has blown over.

Sharp differences between BJP on one hand and its allies, barring Mamata Banerjee-led Trinamool Congress, on the other Ayodhya and the anti-terrorism legislation issues were reconciled at a meeting of the alliance here Friday evening after both sides agreed to go for give-and-take.

The blowing over of what seemed like a crisis-like atmosphere over the alliance must have come as a big relief for Vajpayee government which faces a crucial test in pushing through the anti-terrorism law in a joint sitting of Parliament on March 26.

More than anything else, the government's immediate concern is to ensure smooth passage of the Prevention of Terrorism Bill which was approved by the Lok Sabha (lower house), where the ruling alliance has majority, but rejected by the Rajya Sabha (upper house) where the opposition enjoys the edge in number game.

The Prevention of Terrorism Bill 2002, moved

List of FFs being finalised: PM

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday said her government has taken in hand the urgent task of finalising the list of freedom fighters of the 1971 Liberation War.

She also spelled out a work plan taken up by the newly set up Liberation War Affairs Ministry to improve the condition of freedom fighters, rehabilitate them and their family members, and preserve the memory of the martyred freedom fighters.

The Prime Minister was addressing a gathering of freedom fighters at Paltan Maidan in the city marking the opening of a week-long programme organised by the Liberation War Affairs Ministry to observe the Independence and National Day.

"You'll be happy to know that we've made a sincere beginning to do the urgent job that nobody could do so long ... And you would be surprised to know that the list of freedom fighters has not yet been finalised through gazette notification," she told the freedom fighters.

The Prime Minister noted that many non-freedom fighters have 'become' freedom fighters taking that advantage while many real

Families of all US diplomats pack up to leave Pakistan

The families of all US diplomats and non-essential diplomatic staff were preparing to leave Pakistan yesterday after Washington ordered them out in the wake of a church attack that killed a US diplomat's wife and step-daughter.

"The order has been conveyed and the families and non-essential staff are preparing to evacuate," an embassy official told AFP.

Their departure would most likely be staggered over several days, he said.

"Maybe today, maybe tomorrow, they will start leaving."

Embassy officials refused to say how many staff and family members would be affected by the rare order, which was announced in Washington overnight.

The decision followed "a careful review of our security posture in Pakistan" in light of the March 17 church attack, Reeker said.

Islamabad made no official comment on Washington's decision, but a senior interior ministry official defended Pakistan's stepped-up security arrangements for expatriates following the attack.

"It is their decision, but as far as we are concerned we have taken all possible steps to ensure the security of all diplomats in Pakistan," the

official told AFP on condition of anonymity.

"We have increased the number of security personnel in Islamabad and intensified police patrols. We are taking no risk."

The evacuation order is a step up from the State Department's decision Monday to "authorise" the departure of dependents and non-essential staff one day after a man detonated a grenade in a church used by the US and other diplomatic communities.

The State Department issued the lower-level authorisation order just after the September 11 attacks on Washington and New York but lifted this on January 28.

The decision also follows the abduction and murder of US jour

AL processions in Chittagong intercepted

Awami League processions in different areas of the port city yesterday protesting repeal of the law for display of Bangabandhu's portrait were intercepted by police.

The main procession led by City AL president and former minister for labour and manpower MA Mannan was brought out from the city AL office at Darul Fazal Market. It was intercepted at nearby Amtola.

Participants in the procession then held a rally there.

Police also prevented smaller processions in different areas from joining the main procession.

Abductor held, 3 stolen vehicles recovered in Chittagong

Chittagong Metropolitan Police (CMP) have arrested one abductor and recovered three different types of vehicles along with 93 bottles of phenylidol from different places of the city, according to CMP sources.

Acting on a tip-off, Chittagong thana police arrested Mohammad Safayedul Haque from Baddharkanta area under the thana Friday night. Safayedul, 25, was allegedly involved in Shahjahan (Manager of Pepsi Company) abduction case, a CMP press release said.

Police said Safayedul with some of his accomplices abducted Shahjahan and collected Tk two lakh as ransom from him in November last year.

In a separate drive, CMP recovered one abandoned truck from FIDC road in the Chittagong thana and another stolen motorcycle from Kalabagan area of same thana in the city yesterday. DB Police recovered a micro-bus from the possession of one Nazimuddin from Forest Research Institute area.

In another raid, Halishahar thana police arrested one person and seized 93 bottles of phenylidol from connecting road area in the city.

Loadshedding hits many city areas

Loadshedding of power in the command areas of Dhaka Electric Supply Authority (DESA) during peak hours yesterday was around 50 MW, causing sufferings to people due to frequent disruption of power on the sultry day.

In the city, the areas badly affected by power supply disruption throughout the day included Paribagh, Tejgaon, Kamalapur, Khilgaon, Lalbagh and Mirpur.

The disruption in three areas—Paribagh, Tejgaon and Kamalapur was due to 'overloading' of Ulon-Dhammomid 132 KV transmission line, DESA sources said.

Meanwhile, the Power Development Board (PDB) failed to generate its target quantum of 3217 MW yesterday as Ghorashal 210 MW unit could not resume operation. Production at the unit remained suspended for maintenance work which was due to be completed yesterday.

Besides, 120 MW steam unit of AES Haripur plant tripped yesterday.

The demand for power across the country yesterday was around 3000 MW, PDB sources said.

Hasina tells rally at Jessore

Awami League president Sheikh Hasina yesterday said people would take revenge on those involved in disgracing the father of the nation and eliminate the evil forces from this soil.
