Established in 1989, Darul Ihsan University has the distinction of being the first private university in Bangladesh. However, it obtained the approval of the Government in 1993 under the Private University Act 1992. This university, unlike other private universities in the country, came into being through a process which started with a series of conferences on Muslim education in Mecca in 1977, in Islamabad in 1980, in Dhaka in 1981, in Jakarta in 1982 and in Cairo in 1987. The late Professor Syed Ali Ashraf, who was the founder Vice-Chancellor of Darul Ihsan University, was actively involved in these conferences. In fact, he was the chief organizer. The main idea behind these conferences was to evolve a system of education suitable for Muslim countries.

Why was it thought necessary to have a system of education different from the secular system of education followed all over the world? Secular education ignores man's relationship with God. It focuses on the cultivation of intellectual qualities. There is an assumption that the whole purpose of higher education is to encourage free intellectual enquiry unhampered by any dogmas. Religious faith and the values based on it stand in the way of such an enquiry. But those who maintain this view cannot blink the fact that secular education has failed to stop the erosion of moral values among the younger generation. In a survey it has been revealed that eighty percent of the guardians in the United States think that in view of this erosion, children should be given religious education. The situation here in Bangladesh is no better. The campuses are disturbed by violence and public life is full of corruption. To remedy this state of affairs, we need a balanced development of the human personality. By balanced development we mean physical, intellectual, moral and spiritual development. This can be ensured only when we accept the premise that man's relationship with God supplies the basic principles which govern his relationship with fellow human beings and the physical world around him. Besides, it is not true that religious belief which is the basis of moral and spiritual values is a stumbling bloc to free intellectual enquiry. As Muhammad Asad, a great Islamic thinker, has put it:

"It was Islam that had carried the early Muslims to tremendous cultural heights by directing all their energies towards conscious thought as the only means to understanding God's creation and, thus, of His will. No demand had been made of them to believe in dogmas difficult or even impossible of intellectual comprehension; in fact no dogma

whatsoever was to be found in the Prophet's message, and thus the thirst after knowledge which distinguished early Muslim history had not been forced, as elsewhere in the world, to assert itself in a painful struggle against the traditional faith. On the contrary, it had stemmed exclusively from that faith."

The Western concept of education which we have blindly imitated evolved out of circumstances which have never existed in the Muslim world.

There has never been any hostility to the pursuit of science and learning in Islam. There is no reason why we should imitate the Western concept. We must evolve our own system. So the late Professor Syed Ali Ashraf, who had done a lot of spadework in the field of education, felt called upon to set up this university which he named Darul Ihsan (an abode of excellence). His purpose was to develop an institution 'modern in outlook and faith-based in philosophy.' Darul Ihsan's aim is the education of the total man, the cultivation of all his powers—intellectual, moral, spiritual as well as physical. All knowledge is seen as a unity which, for the sake of convenience, is divided into 3 classes:

(a) Knowledge reflecting the relationship between man and God; (b) Knowledge reflecting the relationship between man and man; and (c) Knowledge reflecting the relationship between man and Nature.

On the basis of this classification, the curricula of the university have been divided into 3 faculties such as: (a) Faculty of Religious Sciences which includes such disciplines as the Quran and the Quranic Sciences; (b) Faculty of Human Sciences which includes Humanities and Social Sciences, and (c) Faculty of Natural Sciences which includes Computer Science and Engineering, Physics, Chemistry, etc.

Location of the Campuses:

Presently, the Administration Building of the University is located at House # 21, Road # 91A, Dhanmondi, Dhaka, but its academic programmes are being carried out on campuses scattered over Dhanmondi, Uttara and Savar.

The Savar Campus is the eventual home of the university. It is about 30 km from Dhaka City. It has an area measuring about 13 acres of land close to Zahangirnagar University, Atomic Energy Commission, EPZ establishments and surrounded by meadows, trees, creeks and lakes. A huge two-storied building with a floor space of 25,000 square feet known as the 'Mosque Complex' has already been constructed.
