
Dario Fo's captivating comedy



Accidental Death of an Anarchist is a political satire on the then prevailing traumatic situationa harsh criticism of the post war Italian milieu. Bibhas Chakraborty's adaptation keeps the bitter tone of the original Dario Fo drama making it more pungent and comical. An apt theatrical making for the Bangladeshi viewers liquidating the serious rude world of fascist

The problematic world of post world war Italy was a place of anarchy and corruption. Sixteen people died of a bomb explosion in Milan in 1969. Again the extremist leftist group was chosen as the whipping boy, several of them thrown behind the bars for crime, and one among the so-called hooligans died in prison. The blamed party sued a case which dragged on for ten long years consequentially tearing the mask of the big-wigs of Italian political and executive arena. The high-ranking criminals received little, the cost was already paid full by little dedicated leftists.

Dario Fo's drama was a protest to this tragedy. Featuring the tragic incident this immortal play targets its gun towards the conspirators. He sketched his characters taking colour from that real life ridicule of humanity. Incorporating powerful lines into ludicrously light situations and fixing the bad characters against the hatred of the audience, Dario Fo created a piece which is enthralling even today. Moreover, the brilliant adaptation and direction made the piece superbly life-




Tale of a mythical family feud

Natyadhara staged its 7th production Augnijal at the city's Guide House Auditorium on last Thursday evening



Translated by Bibhas Chakrabarti, the play has been directed by Ashish Khondakar who labelled the piece as a 'conventional classic" when he was talking to The Daily Star representative. "In its story telling from, the play is linear quite simple and familiar to today's audience. There are universal men-women relationship, love, emotion, marriage, revenge, racial arrogance and family feud in it." The play's plot evolves through interactions and conflicts among these elements.

There is a devastating draught in the kingdom. To set rid of it a fire extinguishing ritual is going on. Parbashu is the chief conducting priest of the ritual. His priesthood ends in a feud between father and son. Jabakri, cousin of Parabashu. has a fiery role in this conflict. Jabakri makes Aurabashu to commit patricide. Aurabashu is a youngman who is regardless to age old feudal arrogance and discriminatory caste group and loves Nittila whom with he

enlightenment in Bishakha. Bishakha's pre and extra marital affair with Jabakri indicates intricacy of human relationship.

Aurabashu and Nittila episode represents conflict of feudal values with theatre art.

When asked to reflect on how he evaluates this play, director Ashish Khondakar says, "Ample simplicity is there in the story form of this play. But there is also an intricacy in its inner message. It's always the man's mental malady, which makes the things intricate, and inevitably men suffer its consequence. A classical tone is omnipresent in this play. Though it fairly contains its contemporary time, its relevance to

the present day context is unquestionable. The play conveys a significant message within its simple

Regarding his stage direction and design, Ashish further says. "I have faithfully tried to retain the play's contemporaneity and the colour of the text. In it I have tried to capture and display a classical image of oriental art manifested in everyday lifestyle. I have applied a minimisation form which is a basic character of oriental art."
