# **Dhaka dares Danes** to prove graft

# Copenhagen stands by charges

Dhaka has asked Copenhagen to prove the graft charges it brought against Shipping Minister Akbar Hossain

Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan, while talking to newsmen yesterday, asked the Royal Danish Embassy to justify the charges.

The foreign minister talked to the press following a lengthy meeting with the prime minister and the finance minister at the Prime Minister's Office vesterday afternoon.

Foreign ministry sources said the foreign minister, the foreign secretary and top ministry officials also met yesterday. The meeting drafted a letter to be sent to the Danish government immediately asking it to prove the charges

On the other hand, in an interview with the BBC Radio yesterday Danish foreign ministry Under-secretary Peter Lysholt Hansen said this was the first attempt by any Bangladeshi official to resort to any sort of corruption in Danish-assisted projects

He said they stand by the graft charges against the shipping minister.

The Danish claim of 'serious intention of corruption' has whipped up a diplomatic storm and put the government into an embarrassing situation.

"The Danish statement is devoid of diplomatic norms. They cannot say anything based on apprehension. What is the basis of their statement?" the foreign minister asked We will proceed in line with the diplomatic norms and the Vienna con-

vention," he told the newsmen on the government's next step.

Hansen told the BBC that he hoped the government would act on this matter since it pledged to fight corruption.

The Danish under-secretary also said their cooperation with the shipping ministry is over and issued a vague warning when he said, "I hope Denmark will not have to take such a step in other areas of cooperation (with Bangladesh).
