Power committee for revision of IPP deals

The government committee on independent power plants (IPP) has recommended immediate revision of and amendments to the agreements signed with private power generation agencies to safeguard national interest.

The committee identified certain inconsistencies in the agreements and found some provisions were against the interest of state-owned energy agencies, officials of the Energy Ministry said.

It suggested that power purchase rates should be re-fixed and project tenure enhanced to 25 and 20 years from the existing 22 and 15 years. The enhancement of tenure of the project would help save Tk 200 crore annually in the power

Barge-mounted pacts against PDB interest

The Independent Power Plant (IPP) contracts of the barge-mounted power plants and the Rural Power Company (RPC) are against the interest of the Power Development Board (PDB)

The major contracts-- which were signed between the government and the AES for the 450 MW Meghnaghat plant and the 360 MW Haripur

The committee noted that allowing duty free import of plant equipment for three barge-mounted plants, spare parts for 12 years, and

even free import of office furniture vehicles and air-conditioners were all violative of existing rules.

The state-run power generation and distribution agency PDB does

not enjoy such exemption for import of machinery and spare parts.

Awami League, coming to power in 1996 allowed power generation in the private sector through Private Sector Power Generation Policy to meet the staggering power deficit. Under the policy, nine independent power generation companies signed agreements with PDB and Rural Electrification Board to generate 1331 MW.

These are: Khulna Power Company Ltd., New England Power Company, Westmont Power Company of Malaysia, AES Haripur 360 MW and AES Meghnaghat 450 MW, Rural Power Company and United Summit.

Syed blames low turnout on opposition boycott

Comment on law and order sours **CEC-govt relations**

Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) MA Syed in his first reaction on the city corporation polls yesterday said voter turnout in the capital was low as a 'major political party' did not take part in the elections.

He however observed that turnout was comparatively better in Khulna and Raishahi.

After a noticeable two-day absence since the election day, the CEC joined his office at 11:00am yesterday.

Syed appeared perturbed in the face of journalists' queries about the polls and his absence.

"It's not important whether I stay in office on the election day or not. The important thing is whether the Election Commission is functioning," Syed told journal-

He added, "It's not decent to hover over the election officials while they worked.'

On Thursday, the CEC cast his vote at 11:00am and went back home. He did not attend his office or make any official visit to any of the city's polling centres as per

He refrained from coming to office on the next day, a weekly holiday, although the Election Commission (EC) was busy carrying out election responsibilities.

Polls stun Jamaat

BNP's major alliance partner Jamaat-e-Islami is in a state of shock after suffering a serious debacle in the April 25 city polls in three cities, as 20 out of its 23 candidates for ward commissioner has lost the elections.

Sources said Jamaat leaders and activists are deeply shocked at the poll disaster and are apparently blaming BNP for not doing enough to ensure victory of their candidates. However, Jamaat has not yet given any formal

23 wards -- six in Dhaka, five in Khulna and 12 in Rajshahi -- out of a combined total of 151 wards under the three city corporations.

and two out of the 12 in Rajshahi came out successful. In Khulna, Jamaat lost all five seats it fought for. In the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) polls, independent candidates
