

HSC exams from today

The Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) examinations begin today amid tight security including ban on gathering of more than four people (section 144 of the CrPC) within 200 yards of examination centres as well as punitive measures including video monitoring and summary trial courts for identifying and punishing cheaters.

A total of 7,16,637 examinees from 6,690 colleges and madrasahs will appear for the exams at 1,486 examination centres all over the country. Of them, 5,85,572 will take the HSC exams under the seven education boards, 28,800 the HSC vocational (trade course) under the Technical Education Board, and 67,245 the Alim, 25,540 the Faizil and



A small spark can ignite Indo-Pak war, warns US

Infiltration by Islamic militants into Kashmir must stop, says Christina Rocca

The United States yesterday warned a small spark could ignite a war between nuclear-armed rivals

Pakistan and India in the aftermath of a bloody attack in Indian Kashmir.

Infiltration by Islamic militants into Indian Kashmir to carry out acts of "terrorism" must stop, US

Assistant Secretary of State Christina Rocca told a news conference in New Delhi.

"Terrorism against India is as unacceptable as it is against America or against any other country," she said just before her departure for the Pakistani capital Islamabad.

Rocca, who is on a visit to the region aimed at reducing tensions, described a militant attack Tuesday against a bus and army post in Indian-administered Kashmir as "barbaric".

Her peace mission has taken on fresh urgency after Kashmir militants killed 33 people, mostly women and children, in the attack near Jammu.

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Gangsters go untouched

Toy pistol, shaving razors, beer and liquor recovered on third day of special drive

On the third day of its special anti-crime drive, the Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) yesterday arrested 561 persons, but not a single one of them is listed criminal.

An over 2,000-criminal list in hand, police launched its 'massive drive' on Monday. The failure to nab any of the top criminals has given rise to speculations that the well-publicised operation was badly planned and executed. Ever since the drive started, only seven listed criminals have been arrested.

The anti-crime drive assisted by the BDR and ansar personnel has also caused frustrations among senior police officials. Many of them suspect that the criminals were tipped off about the police move. Some officials have strongly emphasised the need for controlling information regarding movement of police prior to any operation. They are also disturbed as many low-ranking police officials are still using mobile phone sets.

Meantime, all that police could haul yesterday are two shaving razors, a

toy pistol, three bottles of foreign liquor and five cans of beer.

With the number of yesterday's arrests, police have so far detained 1,622 people in last three days. On the first day, 495 including three listed criminals and on the second day, 566 including four criminals were arrested.

Police also failed to net any one of the most wanted priced criminals during the special drive. Earlier, the home ministry made a list of 23 such miscreants.

Sources in different city areas alleged that police are mostly looking for opposition political activities and are not at all sincere to catch the listed criminals having links to the ruling BNP.

Meantime, of those arrested yesterday, 27 were charged under section 54 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC), 420 under the DMP Act, 77 under regular cases, and seven under the Motor Vehicle Act. Only 29 were

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Design flaws sank MV Salauddin-2

Probe committee detects misplaced centre of gravity

MV Salauddin sank due to faulty structural construction. Its centre of gravity, supposed to be at the keel, was on the bridge-deck and so when hit by a twister, it just tipped like a toy boat in the Meghna, a Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) probe reveals.

Sources said a team of four BIWTA experts had a look at the original design of the vessel drawn in 1988 and found that its owner illegally constructed a bridge-deck adding two double cabins, two single cabins, one master cabin, one bathroom and a cabin for security guards.

The owner also removed the built-in benches from the sides and added a saloon on the first floor.

It was also found that the vessel is two feet larger in length than originally designed. The team however failed to compare the original depth of 1.91 meters with the present depth because the draft of the hull and the hold were submerged in water.

The extra weight caused serious loss of stability and made the vessel 'extremely vulnerable to gust and minor collision', experts said.

MV Salauddin-2 capsized and sank in the Meghna near Shaitnal under Matlab South at around 9:30pm on May 3 with about 500 passengers on board on its way from Dhaka to Rangabali under Patuakhali district.

More than 400 passengers drowned in the river in the incident. The salvaged launch is now at Chandpur.

Despite these gross deviations, MV Salauddin-2 went on to 'pass the fitness tests' for years without a question being raised by the authorities

Expansion of graveyard Khoka's first task

Sadeque Hossain Khoka has taken up something very delicate as his maiden assignment as the new mayor of Dhaka.

With his assumption of power yesterday, he homed in on the expansion of the country's biggest and oldest graveyard at Azimpur in the city.

"I have ordered the chief executive officer to draft an application requesting the works ministry to allocate a piece of land adjacent to the eastern side of the Azimpur graveyard for its expansion," the mayor told reporters.

Dwelling more on his first job, the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) mayor pointed out that the century-old Azimpur graveyard was too small to cope with the increasing number of burials in the capital.

"Over the years, the time-span of reusing the graves has now been so short that the survivors cannot identify graves of their nearest and dearest," he said referring to the problems many raised with him on many occasions.

Khoka, who along with the may-

ors of Khulna and Rajshahi, was sworn in on May 5, took over the office of Dhaka's second elected mayor by chairing the meeting of the DCC Board comprising the mayor and ward commissioners.

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Dhaka mulls new route to Bangkok

Both Thailand and Myanmar have agreed to a Bangladesh proposal for a 'new Asian Highway route'. The new proposal suggests Dhaka getting linked to Yangon and Bangkok through Teknaf in the south.

When opened, the new regional road network will allow traffic from Dhaka to move straight to Bangkok and onwards to East Asian countries.

Although India has not agreed to the new proposal and still sides with the old one that envisages an uninterrupted roadway through Tamabil in northeastern Bangladesh, the new route can still go through, sources said.
