Butcher baffles Lankans

Mark Butcher completed a slow, ugly, vital century on Monday while Graham Thorpe became the fifth batsman in a row to pass 50 as England stayed on course to save the first Test against Sri Lanka at Lord's.

The home side had reached 483 for five, 203 ahead, at tea on the final day after being forced to follow on late on Saturday following a dismal 275 in their first

The Sri Lankans' hopes of a 10th Test win in a row had slipped away during the afternoon as the lefthanded Butcher, who had looked in wretched form after coming to the crease, produced an innings memorable for stodgy determination rather than sparkling strokeplay.

He reached three figures, his fourth in Tests, with a nudge to fine leg after six-and-a-half hours at the crease, during which he faced 291 balls and hit nine fours. Perhaps exhausted by his marathon effort, he ran himself out moments later for 105, needlessly risking a third

Graham Thorpe followed him for 65, chipping Aravinda de Silva's occasional off-spin lazily to midon after a half-century partnership with John Crawley.

Crawley was 21 not out at tea with Alec Stewart the new bats-

Sanath Jayasuriya's Sri Lankans appeared resigned to a draw themselves as they stuck to conservative fields, even dispensing with first slip after lunch.

Sri Lanka had looked in total control after scoring 555 for eight before dismissing England for 275 in their first innings but Michael Vaughan, with an attractive 115 -which took two hours less than Butcher's to compile -- laid the foundations for the fightback.


