US, Britain and Germany urge their nationals to leave India

Vajpayee won't meet Musharraf at Asian summit, Delhi repeats

Western governments yesterday urged tens of thousands of their nationals to leave India, fearing war between India and Pakistan.

The US State Department yesterday advised Americans to leave. "Tensions have risen to serious levels and the risk of intensified military hostilities between India and Pakistan cannot be ruled out," it said in a travel warning.

There are an estimated 60,000 Americans in India and some 30,000 Britons. British Foreign Secretary Jack Straw said the Britons should consider leaving and advised against traveling to India. Germany advised its nationals to leave India if not on urgent business.

The United States and Australia prepared to pull out non-essential diplo-The United States, Britain and other Western nations have already reduced diplomatic staffing in Pakistan and urged expatriates to leave the country, where there has been a rash of attacks and threats against

Westerners by Islamic militants. In New Delhi, a Japanese envoy called for peace, describing himself as a

Senior Vice Foreign Minister Seiken Sugiura said after meeting Indian leaders including Foreign Minister Jaswant Singh that he saw a "strong possibility" of war unless Islamabad acted on New Delhi's demands to curb militants entering India.

AP adds: India reiterated yesterday that its prime minister will not meet with Pakistan's president at an Asian summit next week, although bilateral meetings are being arranged with a handful of other leaders.

"I think the answer is no," RM Abhyankar, special secretary in India's foreign ministry, told reporters who asked if Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee had any desire to meet with President Gen Pervez Musharraf during the June 3-5 summit of 16 Middle Eastern and Asian countries.

Vajpayee will meet separately with the summit's host, Kazakh President Nursultan Nazarbayev, and probably with Russian President Vladimir Putin, and the leaders of Tajikistan and China, said Abhyankar.
