# AL 'finds out' 17 rigging methods

#### Party's Oct polls report launched

As many as 17 'fraudulent methods' were employed in the last parliamentary election to hand out defeat to the Awami League (AL), says an AL-sponsored research publication

The book titled, "A Rigged Election: An Illegitimate Government" was published by the Centre for Research and Information (CRI). AL President Sheikh Hasina launched the book at a ceremony in the city yesterday.

In the preface to the 294-page book, the editorial board led by defeated AL candidate AMA Muhit wrote, "The study could not escape the conclusion that it was a fraud of the century, and unless fresh polls are held the rulers will not gain the necessary legitimacy to govern the country."

The book identified the methods based on 22 case studies carried out in 22 parliamentary constituencies where the AL nominees lost out.

## Spanish nerves settled

Perennial World Cup underachievers Spain were made to sweat before eventually achieving a 3-1 victory over tournament debutants Slovenia here on Sunday.

Prolific Spanish striker Raul scored in the 44th minute while midfielder Juan Carlos Valeron put the Spaniards two up with a 74th-minute strike.

But the Slovenians struck back and seven minutes later substitute Sebastjan Cimirotic scored the tiny nation's first World Cup goal to pull his side back into the Group B match.

When substitute Milenko Acimovic burst into the penalty area minutes later he went down and claimed a penalty but his claims were waved away by the referee.

The Slovenians were therefore

furious when Fernando Morientes earned a spot-kick for a seemingly soft challenge by Sasa Gajser.

The veteran Fernando Hierro stroked the penalty past Slovenian goalkeeper Marko Simeunovic to see Spain on the way to what they hope will be a performance that banishes memories of so many poor World Cup displays.

Raul's 26th international goal put him level with the now-retired Emilio Butragueno in the all-time Spanish goalscoring list, but Hierro SEE PAGE 11 COL 4

# Hasina terms govt illegitimate, wants immediate polls

Awami League chief Sheikh Hasina has branded the BNP-Jamaat coalition government as illegitimate, saying the alliance 'rigged' the last election.

"An immediate free and fair election is the only option left to rescue the country from ruination," suggested the opposition leader at the publication ceremony of a study report on the last parliamentary election at a city hotel vesterday.

Commissioned by the Awami League (AL), the Centre for Research and Information (CRI) brought out the report titled "A Rigged Election: An Illegitimate Government".

A month after the debacle in the election, the AL assigned the task of documenting the 'polls rigging' to a CRI team led by former finance minister AMAMuhit who lost out in the polls on an AL ticket.

The CRI came up with the 294-page report, a six-month exercise, yester
