Target lost pride

Somewhere along the way, the Brazilians lost their cockiness, their "beautiful game" and their supremacy in the soccer world. The quest for redemption begins Monday against Turkey.

The three R's -- Ronaldo, Rivaldo and Ronaldinho -- lead Brazil against Turkey's stalwart defence on Monday in the first and probably decisive game of Group C. The winner is all but assured a berth in the second round, with modest

Costa Rica and World Cup newcomer China completing the group.

A great escape act

South Africa's Quinton Fortune chose a dramatic moment to net his first international goal Sunday by smashing home an injury-time penalty to secure a 2-2 draw with Paraguay.

Manchester United midfielder Fortune completed a stunning

But the South Africans stuck to their guns superbly to take a point in their opening Group B game as the 25-year-old buried the first spot-kick of the tournament past Paraguayan keeper Ricardo Tavarelli, who was in for the suspended Jose Luis Chilavert.

Tavarelli fouled Sibusiso Zuma, as the striker raced into the area, and Fortune kept his cool to score

Although the South Africans are still looking for their first win at a World Cup tournament after four matches to date, the way they refused to buckle in the face of adversity will have delighted coach Jomo Sono, whose men now face unknown quantities Slovenia and

Effervescent striker Roque Santa Cruz and defender Francisco Arce had put Paraguay seemingly on the road to victory by scoring either side of half-time

Bayern Munich striker Santa Cruz turned the South African defence inside out in the opening period and scored with a near post header after 39 minutes from an Arce cross.

Ten minutes after the restart the game looked as good as over when Arce smacked home a tremendous freekick from out on the left.

South Africa pulled one back six minutes later when Estanislao Struway deflected a low Aaron Mokoena shot past his own keeper and just when it seemed they would be unable to rescue a point Fortune pulled them level.

Samba minus Emerson

Brazil's World Cup plans were in disarray Sunday after a freak training ground accident put their inspirational captain Emerson out of the tournament.

The AS Roma midfielder dislocated his right shoulder when he dived to stop a shot from Rivaldo as he took his turn as goalkeeper in the final training session before their opening Group C match against Turkey here Monday.

"The shoulder is dislocated," said team doctor Carlos Runco. "This njury takes four weeks to recover so he will not be able to play any more in this World Cup.' Brazil have sent a request to

football's world govering body FIFA for authorisation to call another player. It was not clear who that might be, although speculation centred on discarded great Romario whose exclusion from the squad caused uproar in Brazil.

Emerson, who has played 44 times for Brazil and scored five goals, hurt the shoulder when he dived to the right just minutes into the training session at the Ulsan Munsu

He stayed down for a full five minutes, surrounded by his teammates, before he was helped up. He lingered on the sidelines for several minutes before leaving the field, taking no further part in the session. Emerson, 26, later left for the

team hotel with his arm in a sling. "When Emerson fell we didn't immediately think it was serious, but he stayed on the floor and we knew something had happened," said defender Roberto Carlos.

Rivaldo said Emerson's inexperience as a goalkeeper contributed to

the injury.
"I shot on goal and I think Emerson had a problem because he is not a goalkeeper. He doesn't know how to fall on the floor, that's why he injured the shoulder," he said.

Ironically, Emerson had warned before their final warm-up game in Malaysia last month that fitness and injuries could prove to be the decisive factor in the World Cup.

Gabriel Batistuta repaid coach Marcelo Bielsa's faith in him when he headed home a 63rd minute goal to give World Cup favourites Argentina a 1-0 win over Nigeria in their opening group F match on Sunday.

Batistuta rose above team mate Mauricio Pochettino as both were looking to get onto the end of a deep corner from Juan Sebastian Veron, but Batistuta's striker's instincts ensured he was in a better position

It gave him a place in an exclusive club of 10 players who have scored 10 or more goals in World Cup history, leaving him four behind record-holder Gerd Mueller, who scored a total of 14 in 1970 and 1974, when he helped Germany win

a second World Cup. It was Batistuta's 56th goal for

Argentina in his 76th international but more importantly, gave them three points from a match thev dominated for long periods, but struggled to control in a tough group that also includes England and

Batistuta won his place in the side ahead of Hernan Crespo with Bielsa saying there was little to choose between the two. Crespo came on late in the game as Batistuta went off to a standing ovation from the fans.

He was close to scoring several times as the Nigerian defence struggled to cope with far post crosses, not least when he headed a similar effort to his goal just wide in the first half. But his perseverance paid off to

Substitute Kily Gonzalez almost added a second goal near the end of the match when he broke down the left and fired in a shot that impressive Nigerian keeper Ike Shorunmu did well to block.

Veron was relieved to get the win "We're very happy to have achieved an important victory over tough rivals. It was a hard match we dominated for most of the 90 minutes and had lots of chances to score but it was very difficult," he said.

"What was important was the team. This is a very difficult group with great teams and great players and we were able to show the world

what we are worth as a team." Argentina top the group before

An eight-month-old Canadian baby was denied access to the Sapporo World Cup stadium for Germany's 8-0 demolition of Saudi Arabia because he did not have a ticket, a Japanese newspaper has reported.

"My son was not yet born when we bought tickets to the game. We had been told that the baby could enter the stadium even without a ticket," the mother, not named in the Mainichi Shimbun report, was quoted as saying

According to the report, the baby was refused entry on Saturday even though his mother said she had been told by officials that she would be permitted to take him to the match.

The paper quoted an official of the local organising committee as saying: "It has been decided, as a rule, not to allow those without a ticket - regardless of age - to enter a stadium or ride the shuttle buses. It's stated clearly on ticket application forms.'
