Steel tariff row EU okays sanction process against US

AFP, Luxembourg

EU foreign ministers gave their goahead Monday to a process that could lead to retaliatory sanctions against US tariffs on steel imports which have infuriated Washington's trade partners.

The sanctions -- including levies on US fruit juices and garments will not take effect immediately, but

the European Commission will have to inform the World Trade Organisation (WTO) of its intentions by June 18 at the latest.

The US and its trading partners are at loggerheads over tariffs of up to 30 per cent which the administration of President George W. Bush introduced in March to protect ailing US steel mills from foreign competi-

The EU and other steel-making

nations in Europe, Latin America and Asia say the tariffs violate WTO rules, and are challenging them at the organization's headquarters in Geneva

Washington is lukewarm to Brussels calls for compensation on tariffs, preferring instead to make targeted exemptions. Last Friday it announced 61 such product exemp-
