Foreigners are cool

Never before has it been so fashionable, or so worthwhile, to employ a specialist foreign coach to contest the World Cup finals.

The scenes of ecstasy in Seoul and Tokyo, Dakar and London, not to mention the dramas seen in Dublin. owe much to the work of men whose birthplaces were far-flung from the capitals of their adopted sporting nations.

Germany may have been the first team from the last 16 to reach the quarter-finals, but they are one of the exceptions, in sticking with a former German player in Rudi Voeller, that helps prove the new rule in international soccer.

England, under Swede Sven-Goran Eriksson, were the second team through to the last eight and

But Eriksson was just one of seven 'foreign' coaches of the 32 who started the World Cup finals and, after the completion of the group games, five remained.

Following is an analysis of the comparative strengths and weaknesses of Brazil and Belgium:

BRAZIL STRENGTHS: With 11 goals to its credit, Brazil's attack is the best of the World Cup alongside Germany. Ronaldo, with four goals, is refinding his best form after two-and-a-half years of injury misery while the ungamelylooking Rivaldo, who has also scored in each game, is also living up to his billing. Neither can afford to be left alone for even a split second.

BRAZIL WEAKNESSES: Coach Luiz Felipe Scolari has expressed exasperation at

cal, rugged game instead of the classic flamboyant style of old.
