Paraguay's last-gasp second round defeat by Germany on Saturday continued a frustrating World Cup for South America, which now has only one of its five original representatives still in the tourna-

They got through to this year's second round in somewhat bumpy fashion, beating Portugal 3-2, drawing 1-1 with South Korea and then losing 3-1 to alreadyeliminated Poland.

It was a performance that sums up their whole game -- inconsistent. If they play as they did in the first half against Portugal, when they raced into a 3-0 lead, they are capable of beating not only Mexico but many of those left in the tournament.

If they perform as they did in the early stages against the Poles, then their World Cup will end at around 5.30 p.m. local time (9:30 a.m. British time) on Monday.

The Americans are hoping their shocking start against Poland, when they trailed 2-0 after five minutes. will galvanise the side back to their

"Maybe it was a good wake-up call for us," said goalkeeper Brad Friedel, who saved his second penalty of the tournament late in Friday's match. "If we would have won we may have gone into the Mexico game a bit cocky.

We may revel in the success of the lesser known teams of the world, but really, the exit of the superpowers has made this World Cup poorer. The second round started Saturday, and started in most mundane fashion. If everything had gone according to the script, surely we could have gotten a better game than the one we got between England and Denmark. And that too came after a drab affair between Germany and Paraguay.

It was almost predictable. Italy never realised their attacking potential under Cesare Maldini. And it is the same with Paraguay. Nelson Cuevas, after setting the pitch on fire in their last game, only got five minutes of action at the end. And even in that short time, he once again proved to be the Paraguayans' most dangerous player. He was not fully fit apparently, but didn't show any signs of it. Surely he could have played at least one half. Yes, if Paraguay had held on for just five more minutes and then

penalties, there would be no scope for criticism. But they didn't and the point is, Paraguay would have had a better chance taking the game to the Germans, who themselves were not too adventurous, and did not have a single shot on target in the first half. If anything, the South Americans went closest, but most of them were long range efforts. Ayala did have a wonderful chance when he was left unmarked in the German penalty box though, but he finished like defenders usually finish when in such situations. High, wide and not so handsome.
