

OPEC may revise output if Iraq reduces exports

OPEC said on Wednesday that it might revise its production quotas upwards if Iraq were obliged by September to reduce its exports owing to back-dated pricing of its oil.

A source close to the Organisation of Petroleum Exporting Countries, who declined to be named, said that talks between the United Nations and Iraq on the so-called "oil for food" programme to be held here on July 4

If the question of the price of Iraqi oil were not settled then, OPEC might revise its proreuction quotas and put extra crude oil on the market of justified by demand, the source at OPEC headquartyers said.

The humanitarian programme of oil for food, which provides an exception to an international embargo against Iraq, authorises Baghdad to export oil under the control of the United Nations.

the UN sanctions committee, under pressure from the US and British governments, has laid down a tight scale for the setting of prices for

This mechanism, being applied by the UN, could halve in June the amount of oil exported by Iraq, which was on average about 2.1 million barrels per day, Iraqi Oil Minister Amer Rashid said last

Andersen conviction sets stage for more cases from Enron

The obstruction of justice conviction of audit firm Arthur Andersen sets the stage for more criminal trials stemming from the Enron collapse and accounting irregularities, legal experts say.

The Chicago accounting giant was convicted Saturday of destroying tonnes of documents related to its former client Enron. The verdict effectively ends the audit business for Andersen, which had been one of the Big Five global firms.

A federal jury concluded after 10 days that Andersen staffers conspired to destroy or erase Enronrelated documents as the Houston energy trader headed towards a meltdown in late 2001 in the full spotlight of an official investigation.

Observers said the conviction opens the door to criminal prosecution of individuals at the accounting giant as well as at Enron, whose spectacular collapse cost billions to investors and employees and left corporate America reeling over how the company's massive losses could have been kept a secret.

"We are going to get to the bottom of the Enron debacle and the people responsible are going to be prosecuted," said Leslie Caldwell head of the Justice Department's Enron task force.

Thomas Ajamie, a Houston lawyer specializing in securities fraud cases, said he sees the government's Enron task force continuing on several fronts.

"This is just the very beginning, Ajamie said.

"I think they will be proceeding against certain individuals at Arthur Andersen. And then they'll try to get the cooperation of Arthur Andersen partners in the prosecution of some

of the Enron players.' One immediately target could be Nancy Temple, the in-house lawyer cited by jurors as playing a pivotal role in the obstruction of justice

Temple "made every effort to sanitize their files." said Andrew Weissmann, the lead federal prosecutor in the Andersen trial, shortly

after the verdict was issued.

Temple did not appear in court after her lawyer said she would decline to answer questions that might incriminate her.

Other likely targets for prosecutors are Andrew Fastow, the former chief financial officer at Enron who set up a series of partnerships that hid debt and inflated income at Enron, as well as former chairman Kenneth Lay and former chief executive Jeffrev Skilling

Japan welcomes US additions to steel tariff exemptions

Japan welcomed Tuesday a US announcement of further exemptions to its controversial steel tariffs but wants Washington to go further.

The United States on Monday announced it would exempt 47 more steel products from recently introduced hefty tariffs of up to 30 per

The newly announced items include at least nine Japanese products, amounting to 20,000 tons of exports to the US annually, a Japanese trade ministry official said.

"We appreciate the US move as the 20,000 tons include items of primary concern for the Japanese industry," Economy, Trade and Industry Minister Takeo Hiranuma told a press conference.

Hiranuma added Tokyo also wanted Washington to make "a fair judgement" on the treatment of other Japanese steel exports.

In March, US President George W. Bush announced he was applying tariffs of up to 30 per cent on most steel imports to protect the ailing US steel industry, prompting Tokyo and other countries to lodge complaints with the World Trade

US exempts 46 addl items from steel tariffs

US trade officials Monday dropped 46 foreign steel products from the list of imports President George W. Bush slapped with additional tariffs in March, to the chagrin of US trading partners.

These 46 products were excluded because it was determined that they are not sufficiently available from US producers and that excluding these products would not undermine the effectiveness of the safeguard on steel products.' the Commerce Department said in a written statement.

This is the second time Bush administration officials have removed products from the list and Commerce Department officials expected this would not be the last

amendment. "The products to be excluded

cover a broad range of steel products, including plate, hot-rolled products, tin mill products, coldrolled products, stainless steel bar. corrosion resistant products, hotrolled bar, and stainless steel wire, officials said.

The 46 exemptions were chosen from about 409 requests made by individual companies, including European conglomerate Arcelor and Anglo-Dutch group Corus for specific categories of steel, and follow an earlier announcement of 61 exemptions. The 61 exemptions represented about one per cent of steel affected by the tariffs.

There were initially 1,200 requests, but others have been withdrawn or had already been

On March 5, Bush imposed up to 30 per cent tariffs on imported steel under Section 201 of US trade law.

In the international market, dollar lost ground significantly against most of the currencies. The weak performance of the Wall Street and speculation about USA operation in Iraq had made greenback hit a 17-month low against euro and GBP and 2 and 1/2 year low against Swiss franc. Euro was the biggest gainer as the dollar lost its ground although. Intervention fear by BOJ kept the dollar trading in a narrow range against the yen.

At 1500 hours, euro traded at 0.9552/57 against dollar, pound sterling at 1.4923/31 and yen traded at 124.22/25 against US dollar.
