Australia need to find a way to survive dangerous spells from bowlers like Shoaib Akhtar if they are to successfully defend the World Cup next year, captain Ricky Ponting has said.

"He bowled well, he bowled quick and he got his deliveries in the right areas," Ponting told reporters after Shoaib had taken five for 25 to bowl Australia out for 165 chasing Pakistan's 256 for seven in Wednesday's third and deciding one-day international.

"When you're bowling 150 kilometres an hour (94 miles an hour) and swinging the ball you're always going to be hard to play. But we've got to find a way to combat that when the World Cup comes around.

"We have to identify when someone is bowling well and get through those tough times. We couldn't do that this time and he ripped the heart out of our innings.

"We're losing wickets in patches as well and we haven't got partnerships at the top of the order, and that's something we need when the World Cup comes around." said

Shoaib, one of the world's fastest bowlers, struck four times as Australia slumped from 44 for one to

New Zealand's cricketers are set on revenge when they meet the West Indies in the first of two Test matches on Friday after losing a five-match limited-overs series in controversial circumstances

The Barbados Daily Nations newspaper said Wednesday that umpires Asoka de Silva of Sri Lanka and West Indies' Billy Doctrove could be censored by the International Cricket Council (ICC) following the home team's last ball victory against New Zealand in St. Vincent on Sunday.

The victory gave West Indies a 3-1 series victory but Black Caps captain Stephen Fleming stormed after the match that the umpires had failed to keep account of how many overs each player had bowled. denriving him of a specialist one-day bowler for the crucial last over.

Batsman Shivnarine Chanderpaul smashed 15 off the last over to match fee for a defeat but will earn win the match and the series for the West Indies.

"This has certainly given us plenty of motivation to do well in this Test series," said Fleming as he put his team through their paces at Bridgetown's Kensington Oval. Match referee Wasim Raja said

on Wednesday that he had filed a report on the match to the ICC in

London and that the ICC would decide if any measures should be

taken against the umpires. He would not comment on the Daily Nation report that De Silva and Doctrove could face ICC sanctions

over their conduct in St. Vincent. New Zealand need to win the Test series to maintain their newly acquired status as the third best Test playing nation, awarded after Sri

Lanka lost their series in England. New Zealand are considering several changes to their line-up for the Test team, with three players, Matt Horne, Mark Richardson and Lou Vincent competing for two opening spots.

All-rounder Chris Harris, on form since being recalled to the Test team against England earlier this year, is being considered for the number four spot after Fleming.

Pace bowler Chris Martin has joined the squad to try and strengthen New Zealand's fragile pace attack. Shane Bond looked to have returned to his speedy best in the final one-dayer but strike bowler Daryl Tuffey has struggled throughout the tour, taking a total of one for 159 from 25 overs in four matches.

The West Indies batsmen are currently playing more consistently than for many years, with Guyanese pair Shivnarine Chanderpaul and skipper Carl Hooper at the top of their game. Chanderpaul averaged an astonishing 140.5 in the fivematch Test series against India

which ended last month, scoring

three centuries and three 50s. The left-hander was elevated to open for the one-day team, where he scored a century and averaged

61, but Wavell Hinds and Chris Gayle are likely to open in the Tests. Brian Lara, once the only reliable West Indies batsman, now finds himself being outscored but played two crucial innings in the one-day series and looks to be rediscovering his form gradually after breaking his left elbow during a tour of Sri Lanka

The bowling attack is less sure. Uncapped pace bowler Darren Powell has been recalled from the West Indies A tour of England to provide back-up to the team's jadedooking pace bowlers.

"Only 12 years ago, Kenya and Senegal drew 0-0 in the preliminary stages of the African Cup of Nations finals in Algeria and, like Kenya, they were eliminated at the stage, said Nicholas Musonye, general secretary of the Council of East and Central African Football Associations

"Now they are on top of the continent and are scaling the heights of global soccer. Surely what better lesson have African nations, especially from my zone?" Commentators concede that

much of Senegal's power lies in their ability to mix African flair with the European know-how and discipline obtained by experience in the French leagues. Mamane Sadou, a civil servant

and soccer fan in Niger, said Africa had to bring its own teams up to European standards. "We must make the players more

professional and bring their financial and other conditions near or identical to those we see on other continents. Then you will see more African teams reaching the quarterfinals in the future," Sadou said. Mark Ssali, sports editor of Uganda's Monitor daily, agreed: 'Africa's success in this World Cup has been due to the export of our talent to Europe...what happened is that our raw talent has become professional. They have learnt the

needed to survive on the world stage."

Back home, the beautiful game is
