Even though the findings revealed that human use of resources was far outstripping Earth's supply, it stopped short of determining how long the process could continue without detrimental

"Like any responsible business that keeps track of spending and income to protect financial assets. we need ecological accounts to protect our natural assets. Wackernagel said. "And if we don't .. we will prepare for ecological

bankruptcy." Wackernagel said the study's results could be used to gauge the impact of new technologies and how they affect the environment.

The use of an alternative technology, such as one that produces renewable energy or replaces natural biological processes, could allow society to live better without increasing consumption, he said.

Governments could also determine the impact consumers and businesses were having on depleting area resources and evaluate potential ways to reduce consumption, Wackernagel said.

Akbar clarifies Danish grant withdrawal

Shipping Minister Akbar Hossain yesterday said that a grant of Tk 268 crore was recently withdrawn from the shipping sector, as the Danish government did not agree to Bangladesh's plea for repairing roro ferries through open tenderbidding.

In a statement on the muchtalked-about issue in parliament, the minister further said that "we wanted the repairs to be carried out in Bangladesh but they (Danes) did not agree to that also.'

He discussed separate components of the programme under Danish grants and said the grants were initially made available for repair of ten ro-ro ferries, formulating a shipping policy, and also for river dredaina. "It was then said tender for ferry

repair would be floated in Denmark and the work would be carried out there too. We insisted on open bidding and repairs in Bangladesh. Then, they (Denmark) said they would withdraw the grants," Akbar About the Tk 92 crore dredging

"The revenue collection target is not realistic at all. Unless you revise it, you'll land up in failure. Failure to check government expenditures would lead to increased public sector borrowing, which in turn would result in inflation," Kibria, who had prepared six budgets during the tenure of the previous AL government, cautioned his successor.

In his 58-minute deliberation, criticisms of different fiscal measures apart, the former finance minister also offered an olive branch to his successor saying "financial reforms should go on. The finance minister (Saifur) has said he is facing obstacles within the party in carrying forward reform measures. My full sympathy is with him (Saifur) Our party will help him.' "We are worried that the finance

minister is facing hindrances from his own party regarding reforms. In this regard Kibria said that

during the AL rule a number of reforms were implemented. He referred to the financial sector reforms, power sector reforms to allow private and foreign investment and the move to divest the national flag carrier, Biman Bangladesh Kibria came down heavily on the finance minister for what he said

He gave year-wise statistics to prove that food production never clocked negative growth during 1994-95 to 1995-96 financial years. The milestone was set in 1996-97 when the country crossed the 20 million MT of production mark for the first time in its history. Recalling the 1998 flood-year,

Kibria told the parliament that even then food production surpassed that of the best crop year of the BNP's earlier tenure (1991-1996). "This did not happen automatically. While the previous BNP government shot down many farmers, we provided policy support and other incentives to them. We disbursed Tk 2,400 crore a year as farm credit compared to the average of Tk 1,100 crore during the BNP's rule," explained Kibria. He was disappointed that

Saifur's budget proposal dealt at great length with the past. "I was taken aback by the finance minister's budget speech and wondered whether it was to propose a budget or to castigate the Awami League.' Identifying breakdown in law and order and proliferation of criminal activities as the main concern of the

reflection of this situation in the finance minister's budget speech. He viewed that investment would not come unless criminal activities and toll collections were contained. He came up with some dismal economic statistics to prove that a downturn is looming.

Kibria said the country's exports fell by 17.27 per cent from the target in the current fiscal while both investment and savings clocked a piffling 0.10 per cent growth. "There is a shortfall in import also, which is a sure sign of drop in
