And pace bowler Chamila Gamage, who took a wicket with his first ball in Test cricket, was rewarded with a limited-overs spot.

Coach Mohsin Kamal agreed that the limited-overs game, favoured in Bangladeshi domestic cricket, is completely different from the five-day game.

"They need more time to play Test cricket, more time to minimise their mistakes," the former Pakistan Test bowler said.

The International Cricket Council (ICC) confirmed after the match that Bangladesh's Test

status was not in danger. "It's simply not on the agenda. It's not something that's being brought up at the moment," ICC spokesman Brendan McClements

India's Anjali Bhagwat won her third gold of the Commonwealth Games here on Thursday when she clinched victory in the women's 10m Air Rifle final.

She scored 550.8 points to beat countrywoman Suma Shirur, who had 500 points, into the silver medal position with England's Louise Minett winning bronze with 494.8

The win gave India its ninth gold in the shooting competition and the country's 15th gold overall in the Games.

Shirur, with whom Bhagwat had clinched the gold in the pairs event earlier in the competition, said she was overjoyed with her medal haul and was looking forward to showing them off to her family when she gets

Bhagwat also won a gold with Raj Kumari in the 50m Rifle Three Positions Pairs event.

Charlotte Kerwood of England won the women's double trap shooting gold at the Common-wealth Games here on Thursday with a score of 141 points

Nadine Stanton of New Zealand won the silver with 134 points with Cynthia Meyer of Canada taking bronze with 132.
