Finance and Planning Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday hinted at tightening the belt of the financial sector in the coming years to compel its institutions to support the growth of the 'real economy'.

"The banks are busy making hundred per cent profits overnight but do not reduce the interest rate. I'll make it sure that the banks cannot go away with windfall profits without contributing significantly to the industrial development," Saifur Rahman said at a contract-signing ceremony at the Sonargaon Hotel

The minister indicated regressive tax on the banks' earnings from next year and reforms in the insurance sector as well.

The Lafarge Surma Cement Limited signed a contract with the Kobe

Steel Limited, Japan on a US\$100 million integrated cement plant with a production capacity of 1.2 million tons a year.

At present, the country's annual cement requirement is around six million

The US\$255 million Lafarge Surma Cement project at Chhatak in Sunamganj is expected to offer primary shares by the end of this year before

going for production in 2004. The minister hopes the Lafarge Surma Cement's share plays an important role in shoring up confidence among stock market investors.

Saifur also pointed an accusing finger at the bureaucracy in multilateral institutions like the International Finance Corporation (IFC), the private sector lending affiliate of the World Bank, and the Asian Development Bank

# SSF bars Thai WorldTel wants its deal probed

Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC) has decided to investigate the WorldTel's 'controversial' deal for installation of 3,00,000 fixed telephones in the capital, on a request from the company which was awarded the deal during the immediate past Awami League (AL) rule.

Official sources said the BTRC would also look into the BNP-led coalition government's allegation that the deal was not a transparent one.

This was the first ever deal for installing and operating a private telephone exchange in the country, to break the state-owned Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone

Board's (BTTB's) monopoly in fixed line telephony. As the present government in its white paper on 'corruption' of the AL government branded the deal as a 'black one", the WorldTel claimed that there was no corruption in the process of the deal. Subsequently, the

determine whether it has eligibility to continue the project, the sources said.

Controversy clouded the project with the BNP government filing cases against the AL government's post and telecommunication minister Mohammad Nasim on charges of corruption in the project.

The Bureau of Anti Corruption (BAC) filed a case with Ramna Police Station accusing that in order to 'illegally award' the Barmuda-based WorldTel the contract for installing 300,000 fixed phones in the city, Nasim had appointed a private firm -- Consosietes Limited-- as consultant without any bidding.

The consultant made 'fictitious recommendations' for the WorldTel, the lone bidder for the project, to make its

financial proposal look 'lucrative,' the BAC said. Nasim appointed the consultant although the minis-

try concerned did not have any fund for this and made SEE PAGE 11 COL 4

The areas in the downstream of the Padma river at Shariatpur, Madaripur, Faridpur, Munshigani and Manikganj districts are going to face normal to moderate flooding in the next few days, highly placed sources monitoring the flood situation said yesterday.

The forecast followed after major rivers continued to rise due to heavy rains and onrushing water from the upstream of Padma. The river Meghna, which carries the flow of the Padma and Jamuna rivers to the Bay of Bengal, was still flowing below the danger level, but the slow drainage down the river along with water-logging along the coastal

areas is complicating the situation. the sources said. The floods and water-logging

due to rains over the past few days have affected some 956,371 people in 17 districts and 57 upazilas of the country. Some 3622 homesteads and

crops in 1211 acres of land have been completely destroyed, according to statistics available from the control room of the Disaster Management Bureau yesterday.

"I want also to reassure the Mujahedin about the fact that Mullah Omar has been able to assemble the Mujahedin who have been scattered and who are in the process of regrouping," warned Allibi, a ibvan Islamist who joined the Afghan Mujahedin, or holy warriors, in the 1980s to fight the
