"Hell broke loose"

It was around 1:30 in the morning. The Shamsunnahar Hall premises were unusually busy with female students chanting slogans.

In came four assistant proctors. "We got to check your identity," one

"There are outsiders among you

We need to identify them." The girls obeyed

"As we opened the gate and came out, all hell broke loose," said Shaon, one of the victims.

Police, stationed outside the gate in riot gears, swooped on them, swinging their batons in wild rage. "It was madness out there with panic-stricken students crying and

running to and fro to escape police atrocity," she said "I must run. Run for your life," she thought. "Hide yourself. The animals are coming to get you. Run... run... run. They can't get me. No. If I get caught, they will maul me to

meatball. Then she fell down.

"There was a downpour of batons, boots and obscenities from all directions. Eventually, I was dragged up and bundled into a police van. I felt sick, felt like throwing up. There were ten or more others in the van.

"They even chased some students into their rooms and dragged them out, all the while swearing in abusive language," she said, prefer-

Police swoop on Shamsunnahar Hall; assault female students; nearly 200 hurt; strike today; BDR deployed

Police in a midnight swoop yesterday stormed into a female residential hall of Dhaka University (DU) and brutally beat up hundreds of students that set in motion a chain of protests and violent incidents throughout the day.

During the one-and-half-an-hour long unprecedented action that started at around 1:30am and ran through 3:00am, police in riot gear dragged and pulled students from their bed of the Shamsunnahar Hall, and beat up and abused them, according to witnesses.

The policemen also took 18 students to the Ramna Police Station at dawn. They were released at noon in presence of the hall provost. However, they have been asked to appear before court. More than 50 students sustained wounds in the police atrocities.

Many students had their dresses ripped while being dragged by the policemen. Besides physical torture, the police also verbally abused the female students, some of the victims said

Four assistant proctors including a female one of the university were present during the police raid inside the hall, residents said. They kept mum while all this brutality took place.

When contacted. Shafi Ullah, one of the assistant proctors, said the situation called for 'such an action against the unruly students'

The incident triggered violent protests on the campus throughout the day. Thousands of agitated students took to the street, and vandalised and torched vehicles to protest police atrocities. Police arrested 27 students

Another 50 students were injured as police clubbed the agitating students, and activists of the ruling BNP's student wing Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) repeatedly attacked several protest processions on the campus. A huge procession under the banner of general students was brought out on the campus at about 11:45am to protest the police atrocities. Students

The procession marched toward the VC's office and staged a sit-in there. When police asked the students to leave the place, angry students locked in an argument with them. At one stage, police charged baton on the students

from various halls and the Arts Building joined the procession spontane-

leaving at least 100, mostly female, injured. The angry students threw brickbats at police and vandalised at least 20 vehicles. They also set fire to a university bus. The driver of university proctor's private car was chopped with machete during the incident

Police shot at and teargassed students to disperse them. However, they regrouped again and took out separate processions from the Mal Chattar to SEE PAGE 11 COL 3

Home ministry asked to amend police law

The cabinet committee on law and order vesterday asked the home ministry to bring amendments to the police law to make it more disciplined, capable and efficient.

"The home ministry was asked to bring necessary amendments to the police law to make the force more disciplined and effective in the backdrop of the changed situation," said an official handout issued after a meeting of the committee with LGRD and Cooperatives Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan in the chair.

The home ministry was also directed to take measures to form counter intelligence units to monitor the activities of police and to maintain computerised records at police stations according to the decisions of a previous meeting.

The committee asked police to intensify its drive against terrorism recovering illegal weapons and arresting the miscreants. Law, Justice and Parliamentary

Speedy Trial Act for CMC incident

Charges under the Speedy Trial Act have been framed against four leaders of the Chittagong Medical College (CMC) unit of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) in a case accusing them of toll extortion.

The Court of Metropolitan Magistrate Wahiudul Islam Khan framed the charges after hearing both the sides - the prosecution and the defence.

The accused are Md Shahadat Hossain Bhuiyan, general secretary of the CMC unit of JCD; Mahbubur Rahman, senior vice president; Mamun Alam Khan, vice president and Kazi Omar Faruq, member of

Among the SAARC countries, only Sri Lanka and Pakistan are "on the right track" to reach the UN goal of halving the people in hunger by 2015, while Bangladesh, Nepal and India are "falling far behind".

Overall, the Maldives and Sri Lanka have done better than other SAARC countries in achieving the eight goals set by the UN Millennium Summit in 2000, said the UNDP Human Development Report (HRD), 2002 released yesterday in Dhaka simultaneously with other cities around the world.

Hartal observed to protest extortion

At least 25 people including three policemen were injured when policemen tried to disperse a procession during a dawn to dusk hartal called by the local businessmen in the city's Kotwali area yesterday. The businessmen of Kotwali areas clamped on a strike in the area to

protest the attack and extortion by an organised gang and drug abuse in the old part of the city. Early yesterday morning, the businessmen closed down their shops and

took to the streets. They chanted slogans in support of their demands. They also brought out procession in the afternoon that was resisted by the police. Police charged batons to disperse the agitating people. Several people

were injured during the clash between the agitators and the police. The

injured were admitted to the nearby Mitford Hospital, National Hospital and The clash continued for hours making North South Road a sheer battle-

ground. The situation became even more complicated when the supporters of local commissioner Hossin Mollah brought out an anti-hartal procession in the afternoon. The procession threw brickbats at the police leaving a police sub-inspector and two constables of Kotwali police station injured. The SI Shorab Hossain, 40, received injuries in the forehead and was admitted to the Dhaka Medical College. Kotwali police, however, could not confirm the injury of the other two injured constables when contacted last night.

The duty officer of Kotwali Police Station said that they have arrested six people for their alleged involvement with the riot and attack on the police
