A stronger Boeta Dippenaar believes his current mental state is right for the coming cricket season that may just fit him like a glove.

The top South African batsman said at the South African training camp for the upcoming one-day series in Morocco that he learned a lot from the clashes against Australia and that he was feeling more positive than ever.

"It is a big season with lots of opportunities, but one should not live too far in the future. I was selected for the Moroccan tournament and I will concentrate on that."

Dippenaar has a lot to prove because he has all the talent in the world. His performance with the bat proves it. In 29 one-day innings he scored 984 runs at an average of 42.78 per innings. This is better than any other batsman of our time at the comparative stages of their careers.

That includes top batsmen like Gary Kirsten (37.8), Herschelle Gibbs (22.07), Jacques Kallis (35.86), Andrew Hudson (29.34)

He plays cricket with abandon even though it is not everything to him. "Just look at the past season. I started off badly against Australia but got better as things went on and in the end I enjoyed myself thor-

Even when Ian Thorpe doesn't set

out to make history, he does. Thorpe won the men's 100m freestyle in a personal best time of 48.73sec, taking his gold medal haul at the Commonwealth Games to five, two shy of the unprecedented seven he is chasing.

The magnificent seven may never happen, but Thorpe did become the first man to sweep the 100m, 200m, and 400m freestyles at one Games -- improving his 400m world record to 3:40.08 in the pro-

"I didn't know that hadn't been done before," said Thorpe, who has made a habit of doing the never before done in the pool. "I'm very pleased with the result. I

guess the difficulty is in trying to prepare to swim well across the board, get up for a sprint and have the endurance for the 400.1 Thorpe said he tried to tailor his

training to achieve across the distance spectrum, thus the improvement in his 100m free time from his previous best of 48.81. But Thorpe admitted he was feeling a bit fatigued. He had swum

every session, morning and eve-

ning, since competition started on

Tuesday. "I'm tired," Thorpe said.

But he had barely accepted his medal, and hugged fellow medallists Ashley Callus and Ryk Neethling for the cameras when he had to swim the first semi-final of the 100m backstroke.

Thorpe won that, too, clocking 56.49sec. But he was the fourthfastest qualifier for the final, as world champion Matt Welsh won the second semifinal in 55.91, with Alexander Lim of Malaysia finishing second in 56.11 and Scotland's Gregor Tait third in 56.32.

"The purpose was just to get through to the final," Thorpe said. Welsh, on the other hand, was trying to position himself for advan-

tage, and he made it clear he has

plenty in reserve. "For me, that swim was just to secure lane four in the final, that's what everyone wants," said the Aussie who is hungry for gold after his disqualification in the 200m

"I thought about going faster, but the race before was slower, so that was all that was necessary.'

The backstroke, a recent addition to Thorpe's competitive schedule, is reckoned to be the biggest stumbling block to his goal of winning an unprecedented seven gold medals at these Games.

The freestyle, however, appeared to be his to win, and he did

so without fuss. Callus earned the silver in 49.45

and Neethling took bronze in 49.71.

"I enjoyed it," Neethling said. "When my career is over, I can look back and tell my kids that I swam against the greatest swimmer in the world. It's something I savour."

With two freestyle relay golds, Thorpe has surpassed the four gold medals he won in his Commonwealth Games debut in

However, Thorpe wasn't the only swimmer with a packed schedule on

was a promising newcomer when she represented South Africa at the 1998 Commonwealth Games, achieved her aim of proving she could compete on equal terms. England's Rebecca Cooke won the 800m in 8min 28.54sec, ahead of Amanda Pascoe in 8:34.19 and Jamaican Janelle Atkinson in 8:36.23. Australian Petria Thomas wrote her name in the Commonwealth Games history books, too, becoming just the second swimmer, and the first woman, to win the same event at three consecutive Games with her victory in the 100m butterfly. Thomas matched the feat of Michael Wenden, who won the 100m freestyle in 1966, 1970 and Thomas, whose three world titles last year included both the 100m and 200m butterfly, had already won the 50m butterfly in Manchester and picked up bronze in the 200m freestyle and silver in the 4x200m


