Top criminal kills 3, mob gets at killer, too

One of the most wanted criminals in the country shot three persons including an industrialist and a police official dead in the capital yesterday

Four hours after, a mob took revenge by beating the criminal and his accomplice to death

Mohammad Alauddin, who is among the 23 most notorious criminals, killed the three one after another barely within half-an-hour in the city's Kunipara area in the afternoon

According to police and wit-

nesses, Alauddin first shot the industrialist, Nizamuddin Bhuiyan, dead at his residence after he was refused illegal tolls.

Challenged by police while escaping, the notorious criminal shot an assistant sub-inspector (ASI) of police, Dinesh Chandra Sen, point blank, leaving him dead on the spot. Before fleeing, Alauddin

also shot an witness, Abdul khandakar Harun, dead, One source, however, said Harun was killed in police firing. While fleeing the spot, Alauddin

and his accomplice Akkas had a

brief gunfight with the police on patrol duty in the area. The two criminals suffered bullet wounds, but managed to escape, police said

Alauddin and his accomplices were closely following Nizamuddin since he went out of his residence in the morning. They were waiting for Nizamuddin's return home.

As soon as the industrialist entered his house at 15, Kunipara, at about 4:20 pm, Alauddin and his accomplce started spraving bullets on him. They fired as many as seven shots in his face and head, his family

members said Nizamuddn's mother saw the brutal killing as she opened the door and found his son groaning in pain in a pool of blood on the stairs. Others including his father and wife rushed only to find him dead.

Hearing the shots and the family members, neighbours rushed to the spot

"I cannot describe the scene... I saw my son carrying packets of sweetmeat collapsing on the stairs. Also. I saw the two killers walking out of our house calmly," said the wailing mother in her early sixties.

While leaving the six-storey building that also houses Nizam's fluorescent tube manufacturing factory and a garment factory, the two culprits were challenged by patrol police at Battola, about half-akilometre away.

According to witnesses, ASI Dinesh caught hold of Alauddin while his accomplice slipped away by shooting in Dinesh's head and throat. Alauddin also managed to get free as the two cops got busy with their dying colleague. However, the two cops fired at

Dark side of the deal

The purchase of a huge volume of wheat, keeping members of locallevel procurement committees completely in the dark, points to gross irregularities in this year's internal food grain collection drive. Suspicion has also arisen over upward revision of procurement target at the fag end of the wheat season

Over the last couple of weeks, many district- and thana-level food officials and also politicians on locallevel procurement committees have claimed that they were not informed

as a substantial volume of wheat was purchased at some government silos towards the end of the extended countrywide drive. For example, the deputy com-

missioner of Pabna, Ashraful Makbul, told the one-member secretarial probe committee that the district food controller, Fazlur Rahman, consulted neither him nor the other members of the procurement committee about the fresh

allocation. Equally unaware were the opposition lawmaker from the Pabna-4 constituency, Shamsur Rahman, and the Bogra district joint secretary


3 more die, 93 hospitalised

With the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) failing to spray adulticide or larvicide to fight the onslaught of the mosquito-borne disease, the dengue The government rationale for the situation in the city has assumed a dangerous proportion. target revision has also been ques-

The DCC was supposed to start a 'crash programme' from yesterday to fight the aedes mosquito. But it remained limited to rhetoric and no such actions were witnessed for reasons best known the city corporation.

And now, entomologists are suggesting citizens to use kerosene in absence of the DCC's fogging programme to fight the disease.

According to the dengue control room, Pushpa, a seven-year-old girl died at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital while Renu Das, 60, died at BIRDEM hospital on Friday. Uzzal, 23, died at the Khulna Medical College

Magurchhara blowout Unocal's refusal to pay under legal scrutiny

UNB, Dhaka

Petrobangla is now examining legal aspects of Unocal's denial to pay 685 million US dollars in compensation for the damage done in Magurchhara gas blowout five years back.

Officials at Petrobangla and Energy and Mineral Resources Ministry said Unocal's letter had been referred to advocate Khandakar Mahbubuddin Ahmed for his opinion.

They said the government would go for further action as per suggestions, expected shortly, from the lawyer, also a ruling party lawmaker.

The US oil giant on Thursday again in a brief letter told the Petrobangla that the compensation issue was resolved through a supple mentary agreement.
