Rajuk 'revives' project to fill up canal

The Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) has 'secretly' revived a project to fill up a natural canal in the city's Mohammadpur area next to the martyred intellectuals' monument and build a truck terminal there.

The Haikkar Khal winds its way from the Turag in the northwest through Mohammadpur and joins the Buriganga river in the south. The authorities have built a small culvert over the canal on the road to Basila from Mohammadpur to ensure flow

Over the years, Dhaka has already lost 22 natural canals due to similar 'mindless' decisions by the successive governments.

Originally the Tk 2 crore project was approved by the DCC under the cover of building a children's park. The commissioner of ward No. 46, Abu Sayed Bepari, initiated the land-filling after getting 'green signal' from top officials of the DCC and the Ministry of Local Government and Rural

Bepari told The Daily Star that the "people of the area do not want any canal there". He said there would be no problem if the canal was filled up for accommodating 2,000 trucks. He said the project was okayed by former mayor Mohammad Hanif, but it was shelved because of press reports. "Trucks create a big problem

Ban on foreign jobs for maids may go

The government is thinking of withdrawing restriction on female workers from going to Middle Eastern countries as domestic helps

"We may go for export of female workers if the conditions of female workers sent by other countries are found satisfactory," said State Minister for Expatriate Welfare and Overseas Employment Mohammad

The ministry is collecting data and also contacting other countries in this regard before finalising its decision, the state minister informed.

According to sources, the Director General of Bureau of Manpower Export and Training (BMET) Shahudul Haque will attend a conference on 'Foreign Domestic Migrant Workers' in Colombo at the end of this month.

The conference, organised by the Malaysia based

NGO CARAM (IOM), is likely to address problems and prospects of domestic helps working in the Middle East.

The DG would share his experience of the conference and apprise the ministry of the state of domestic helps working in the oil rich countries, the source said.

Currently, the government does not allow overseas employment of female workers as domestic helps fearing sexual abuse and harassment.

Only expatriate Bangladeshis or government officials are allowed to bring female workers as domestic help.

Unofficially though, many female workers from Bangladesh are travelling to the Middle East and working as domestic helps.

According to recruiting agencies, there is a huge demand for female workers as domestic helps in the Middle East. Government's restrictions bar them from

Opposition rejects Pak constitutional package

Pakistani lawyers and political parties Saturday rejected constitutional amendments proposed by President Pervez Musharraf saying that his military regime had no power to alter the document.

At a joint meeting here they said the amendment to the constitution was the "sole and exclusive function of parliament.' The meeting, convened by the

Pakistan Bar Council and attended

by representatives from across the country as well as heads of major

political parties, said if their members were elected to parliament they would undo the amendments if Musharraf imposed the package. Musharraf, who came to power in a bloodless coup in 1999, proposed a set of more than 20 changes to the

country's 1973 constitution that

would bolster his power and give the

military a permanent role in politics. The package includes the establishment of a National Security Council -- which is to be headed by Musharraf and will include army, navy and air force chiefs -- and have powers to sack the elected prime minister and cabinet.

Opposition leaders have slammed the move, saying it would give the armed forces a constitutional role in the country's politics.

Self-exiled two-time ex-prime minister Benazir Bhutto has meanwhile voiced her concerns about the proposed constitutional changes adding her Pakistan People's Party (PPP) was clearly being targetted by Pakistan's military elite.

"The PPP's two elected and democratic government's were destabilised in the past because the military ... found their hawkish policies were undermined by the presence of a political force with an independent base," she said in a statement.

"The military hardliners are today looking for a dummy parliament and dummy prime minister so that those policies can continue unabated. I caution the world community from putting all its eggs in one basket, and that too in the basket of a military dictator," she said in reference to widespread Western support for Musharraf's leadership of Pakistan.

Musharraf, who insists his government was authorised to make changes under a May 2000 Supreme Court ruling, has said the changes were aimed at ensuring "checks" on government power.

He has announced parliamentary polls for October 10, but political activities such as public rallies have remained suspended since the
