### Govt plans to remove flaws in grading system

The government is considering reforming the grading system in the Secondary School Certificate (SSC) examinations in the wake of various flaws in the system, key education ministry officials told a seminar yesterday.

The grading system, introduced in the SSC examinations in 2001 in place of numeric evaluation system, remained non-updated since then.

"There are some problems in the grading system but we will continue with the system by bringing about necessary changes," Education Minister Dr. Osman Farruk said at a

## Man stabs wife to death in city

A young man allegedly stabbed his wife to death in the city's Pallabi area yesterday morning.

Nasima Begum, the 20-year-old employee of Banarasi Sari and resident of Section 11, Block C of Pallabi, was rushed to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) with multiple stab injuries at 7:45am. The on-duty doctors declared her

Hospital sources quoting the victim's relatives said Al-Amin had a quarrel with his wife at around 6:00am and at one stage stabbed her in the abdomen. As Nasima collapsed, the unemployed 25-year old stabbed himself in the chest and hands. Al-Amin is now under treatment at the intensive care unit of the

Another source said Nasima had fight with Al-Amin over some money her mother had borrowed

Meanwhile. Al-Amin's relatives claimed Nasima had committed suicide after the quarrel and her mother had stabbed him following the incident.

Nasima and Al-Amind has an eight-month-old daughter named

Police have already arrested Al-Amin in connection with the killing, hospital sources said.

## Fish farm owner shot dead in Khulna

# **US** ready to act alone 'within 4-5 months'

Iraq yet to yield over arms inspection issue

US President George W Bush made clear on Saturday he would act against Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein with or without world support, and was said to be ready to strike within four or five months.

Iraq showed little sign of yielding over the issue of UN arms inspectors, with Deputy Prime Minister Tareq Aziz saying they could return only under a comprehensive deal that would prevent a US attack and lift crippling 12-

At the United Nations, Arab ministers urged Iraq to avert an attack by complying with UN resolutions calling for arms inspectors to ensure that Baghdad is not developing nuclear, chemical or biological weapons.

But the ministers said Arab countries remained opposed to any threats to attack a fellow Arab country, and German Foreign Minister Joschka Fischer said Berlin too was deeply skeptical of any plan for military

Bush, hosting Italian Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi for talks at his Camp David retreat, told reporters Saddam was guilty of serial defiance of UN resolutions.

"He has defied the United Nations 16 times. Not once, not twice, 16 times, he has defied the UN," said Bush, who this week challenged the world body to

Bush said the United Nations deserved "another chance to prove its relevance" and "show some back-

bone", but he added: "Make no mistake about it, if we (the United States) have to deal with the problem, we'll deal with it." Following his talks with Bush, Berlusconi predicted

action would be taken against Iraq early next year if Baghdad continued to bar UN weapons inspectors. Berlusconi said he had told Bush that Saddam was "a pragmatic man" who, rather than risk a US attack, would

give into demands that arms inspectors return to

"However, if I should be proved wrong tomorrow and Iraq does not comply with the UN  $\dots$  then I think one can think in terms of (action) in January or February,"

In Baghdad, Aziz told a news conference that Iraq was ready for a solution that maintained its sovereignty,

dignity and legitimate rights and prevented aggression. But he said Iraq would bar inspectors if "there is no honest, balanced and credible formula that will take us

## Asstt director of Sylhet medical college murdered

### Body recovered from bush

The assistant director of the Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College Hospital has been brutally mur-dered by unidentified men some time during Saturday night.

The body of Dr. Aftab Hossain,

54, a long-time resident of Sylhet, was discovered yesterday morning from a bush in a hilly area near village Ghoshgaon in Golapganj upazila, about four to five kilometres from his private chamber.

His hands were tied together and a rope was tightly fastened around his throat. The body bore a number

of injury marks. Sources said the doctor had gone to his private chamber at Dhaka-Dakshin Bazar in Golapganj upazila on Saturday afternoon as usual. At about 9:00pm, a young

man came to his chamber and urged him to see a serious patient in a remote village. Accordingly, the doctor took the guy on his motorbike and went off to see the patient, but never returned.

The doctor's motorbike could not be located. His mobile phone is also missing. The motive behind the gruesome murder could not be ascertained. Police have taken Dr. Hossain's chamber assistant Jainuddin into custody for interroga-

Sources said a local gang had been pressing the doctor for toll for the last few months but he declined to pay them. The local UP chairman has been informed about the matter.

Dr. Aftab Hossain hailed from Pakshy, Ishwardi, Pabna. He left SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

## memo to **Speaker**

Lawyers yesterday submitted a memorandum to the Speaker for implementation of their six-point demand including withdrawal of enhanced court fee and stamp duty.

Their demands also include scrapping of all 'black laws' including Special Powers Act, Public Safety Act and recently enacted Law and Order Disruption (Speedy Trial) Act and formation of a 'judicial service commission' for separation of the judiciary from the executive.

They are also demanding amendment to Section 115 of the Civil Procedure Act to facilitate filing of review petition with district judge's court against lower court's verdict, instead of going to the High Court

Earlier, the lawyers brought out a procession from the Supreme Court premises and marched towards the parliament complex to hand over the memorandum.

The country needs to change a

beggar's attitude because poverty cannot be eliminated with one or two thousand taka loan, the finance and planning minister said. "Rather there is the need for industrialisation and employment generation to eradicate poverty. Earlier on Wednesday last.

speaking at a follow-up symposium on the just-held World Summit on Sustainable Development, the finance minister criticised the NGOs of overplaying some small problems like arsenic contamination and HIV to do brisk business in the country.

"People projecting these as big problems are really creating panic among people and damaging the country's image," he had said.

Such campaign, he commented, was likely to harm export, thereby adversely affecting the economy.
