Rampant Trescothick

In-form England opener Marcus Trescothick put the Zimbabwean attack to the sword with a brisk 119 in the ICC Champions Trophy oneday cricket tournament here on Wednesday.

The aggressive left-hander smashed two sixes and 11 fours in his 102-ball knock for his fourth century as England posted 298-8 after electing to bat in the day-night match at the Premedasa Stadium.

This was his second successive century, having made 109 in his previous game against India in the final of the NatWest Trophy at Lord's in July.

The opener's consistency augured well for England ahead of their crucial second and last league match against India on Sunday.

India lead the three-team Pool Two following their 14-run victory over Zimbabwe in their opening match. Only the group-winners will qualify for the semifinals.

Trescothick put England on course for a big total with a 141-run stand off 161 balls for the second wicket with skipper Nasser Hussain

He nearly overshadowed Hussain with his big-hitting, dominating the Zimbabwean attack from the opening over itself. He smashed 14 in a Douglas Hondo over and continued to bat in the same vein.

Hondo conceded 33 in his opening four overs and fellow-seamer Heath Streak 28 in as many overs as Trescothick struck the ball hard and clean to find various parts of the

The cheap dismissal of Nick Knight did not bring England's runrate down as 67 came in the opening 10 overs, thanks to Trescothick.



Fat TV deal

South African cricket has been boosted by the signing of a four-year TV rights deal worth 24.75m US The agreement with ESPN Star

Sports will run from September 2003 until April 2007 and allows matches involving South Africa to be screened in the sub-continent.
It applies to all Tests and one-day

internationals played in the republic during that period, except the tour by Pakistan in February 2007. Among the high-profile series included are England's visit in December 2004 and tours by

Australia and India two years later. "This was a long and tough negotiation," said United Cricket Board (UCBSA) chief executive

Gerald Majola. "It provides the UCBSA with substantial revenue over the next

few years. "The sub-continent market includes India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh and it is an enor-

mous market of fans who will be watching our cricket.'
