Unceremonious exit of Simon Dring

As expected the present popular government has asked Mr. Simon Dring, the ETV Managing Director to leave Bangladesh within a stipulated time. I do not think this is going to enhance the image of the government that endeavours to hold freedom of press so boldly. Again another legal dispute is known to have remained pending in the higher court of justice on the ETV issue. The government's action might now be interpreted as intentional, and will only substantiate the observation made earlier by Dr. Kamal Hossain (August 30) that, "This is not a public litigation. The writ petitioners and their counsels have political identity and ill motive". Could this have acted behind the psyche of the policy-makers in Mr. Dring's case now?

Without going into their political identity, I would like to shed some light on the conscientious journalistic background of Mr. Simon Dring. He not only played a key role in bringing about a new dimension to electronic media in the country from the BTV's traditional monotony and channel invasion from outside the cause of our struggle for independence in 1971. The scientists have been looking for over a century for any changes in the laws of physics with translations and rotations in space and with move-

ment through time, and have never found any evidence of such changes. Thus momentum, angular momentum, and energy are strictly conserved in our universe. For the counter rotation device to create energy from nothing, all the laws of physics would have to be thrown in the trashcan. The upset would be almost as severe as discovering that 1+1 = 3. Criminal Court"

It has been clarified by the Secretary of State, Mr. Collin Powel several times in international forums -- why USA cannot accept the jurisdiction of International Court over its armed forces for peace keeping or participation in the allied forces for any wrong doing or damage to other country.

All US soldiers take oath to protect US interest and its constitution; not any other interest or UN charter or any other constitution. If the US soldiers get involved in litigation in foreign or international court, the US soldiers or their parents may sue the US government for that violation of US constitution. This proposed change is subject to ratification by legislative procedure in USA that is why USA is not accepting any juris diction of International Court yet. 

The songs of innocence and the songs of violence!

On September 16, I stayed up to watch John Pilger's film for ITV titled "Palestine is still the issue", in which he conducts a series of remarkable interviews with Palestinians and a group of Israelis who support them, 'united by their courage and their yearning to be free'. He also spoke to families of suicide bombers and their victims, refugees, soldiers and an advisor to Prime Minister Sharon.

The stories of the Palestinians, as always, filled me with hurt, anger, helplessness and moral indignation -- a feeling exacerbated by the knowledge that perhaps as a human rights activist there is something more I could have done other than write, protest and rally with Palestinian friends and colleagues -- a feeling that each of us, through our silences and lapses, contributes to this continuing atrocity which goes against every norm or humanity, dignity and justice. This film was different from others in that it surfaced the indignation of some Israelis who find it hard to reconcile with their government, and want to do something to rectify the injustice. For instance, it was moving to hear the father of a 14year-old Israeli girl killed by a Palestinian suicide bomber say, 'the truth is that both my daughter and her killer were victims'. It also struck a chord when a soldier who refused to serve in the Occupied Territories challenged his government to hear its critics without calling them anti-Semitic.

Perhaps this gives us hope, that in this tumultuous world order, where it is difficult to discern who the real terrorist is or which nation really is the rogue, that humanity will ultimately prevail.

The American "war on terror " gave Israel and Ariel Sharon a "carte blanche" to commit unspeakable atrocities in occupied Palestine. Sharon pursues a campaign to humiliate, terrorise, and disenfranchise Palestinians. It is an insult to international law, the United Nations, and world community at large. Solution to the most complex problem is often the simplest-- if only one has the courage and integrity to make the decision.

While President Clinton tried and apparently came close, though according to some Israeli scholars, he was the last Zionist, it is now for President Bush to deliver his "vision" of a Palestine. The world will judge Bush on Palestine-Israel conflict by what he does and not by what his vision is. His father had once made the same promise when it was politically convenient in order to get his famous coalition in the Gulf War of 1991. He forgot and failed soon after. As now President Bush has all but declared the second Gulf War and wishes to hold Saddam Hussein to his word on UN arms inspection, he should reciprocate by being held to his words on Palestine -- a viable state with secure borders living side by side with Israel.
