Rahul Dravid said Thursday he was keen on extending his brilliant run with the bat after becoming only the fourth player in the world to hit four centuries in successive Test innings.

"I want to make the most of my current form," said the 29-year-old prolific batsman, who made hundreds in his last three Test innings in England recently.

He slammed 100 to help India reach 457 against the West Indies on the second day of the opening Test at the Wankhede Stadium here.

Australian Jack Fingleton and South African Alan Melville are the other batsmen to have achieved the rare distinction of scoring four Test hundreds in successive innings. West Indian Everton Weekes

Japan's Tetsuo Fuji is one of 14 cricketers from emerging cricket nations spending a fortnight working out at Australia's cricket academy here.

Australian Cricket Board said on Friday that 14 players and two coaches from Fiji, Indonesia, Japan, Papua New Guinea, Samoa, Tonga and Vanuatu would train at the academy from October 14 to 25 under academy senior coach Wayne Phillips.

Fuji captained his country at the Asian Cricket Council Trophy in Sharjah in 2000 where he dismissed two batsmen with consecutive balls, one bowling right-hand medium pace and the other with left-arm off-

The visit is a joint initiative of the International Cricket Council's (ICC) East Asia-Pacific region development program and the ACB to promote and develop the game bevond its traditional boundaries.

The developmental crickters will be shown through the academy's facilities and given advanced coaching and training programs by academy staff.

They will also sit for an introducatory umpire course and visit local schools.

North Korea unseated defending champions China Friday to take the Asian Games women's football gold medal after a 4-0 drubbing of Vietnam in the round-robin finals.

The Koreans went undefeated in the six-team tournament winning all their matches except for a 0-0 tie with China, proving themselves to be the toughest team in the tournament and a major threat in next year's Asian Football Championships and women's World Cup.

Defending champions China have also gone undefeated so far here at the Busan Games, but two ties leaves it vying for a silver medal which will be decided in a later match Friday against South Korea.

"We are really happy with this, it's a great achievement for us," North Korean coach Ri Song-Gun said


