Day for Enamuls

Left-hander Enamul Hoque put in his years of experience to save the blushes of Bangladesh A while batting against the youthful BCB (Bangladesh Cricket Board) Development Squad on the second of the Challenge Trophy yesterday. The 37-year-old bowling all-rounder, aspiring to regain national cap, scored a fighting 49 as the A team recovered from a top and middle-order collapse to take a slim two-run lead at the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium. Beginning their innings after the Development Squad's first essay ended at 223 in the morning, the experienced campaigners of the second string side were all too vulnerable against the young lads. On the second day of the four-day match when other experienced cricketers were falling like flies against the young lads, it was the 37-year-old left hander who showed sheer patience and batted with some authority. Coming in to bat at number nine after the seniors lost their seventh wicket on 131, Enamul shared an

invaluable 79-run for the eighth wicket with wicketkeeper Anwar Hossain to help his side cross two hundred mark. His gritty 73-minute innings that yielded one six and five boundaries off 64 balls came to an end because of another Enamul Haque. The junior Enamul, incidentally also a left-arm spinner, clean-bowled him for 49. The day belonged to Enamuls. Enamul junior mesmerised his veteran opponents with his spin that claimed six scalps for 65 off 26 overs. The A team however got off to a good start with openers Mehrab Hossain and Enamul Haque scoring 30 and 24 runs respectively. One down Naimur Rahman also scored 30 while captain Aminul Islam was run out on 22 after a bad mix-up with Minhazul Abedin. Minhazul, on an acid test for his maiden Test call at the age of 37, could manage only 11 before holing out to mid on off Enamul Jr. After losing their third wicket on 97, the A team suffered a big collapse and were reduced to 131 for seven when Enamul appeared as saviour. He received a good support from young wicketkeeper Anwar Hossain, who scored 29 off 85 balls. The development squad made

Waqar keeps captaincy

PCB names separate Test, ODI teams

"Why should I resign? We selected the best team so the causes of defeats could have been bad planning and bad captaincy or any other."
 Dependable batsmen Inzamamul Haq and Yousuf Youhana return after missing the tour of Zimbabwe, it was revealed on Saturday. A crop of oldies were recalled for the separate Test and one-day teams announced by the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB). "We have to have a team of youth and experience so this is the best possible team which we have selected for the tour of Zimbabwe," chief selector Wasim Bari told this news agency. "All those seniors who proved their fitness are back in the side." The PCB had appointed Younis captain until the 2003 World Cup but his post was in danger following Pakistan's 3-0 drubbing by Australia this month. But he has survived to lead both the Test and the 16-member one-day sides. The 15-man Test squad will leave for Zimbabwe on November 1. Chief selector Bari also refused to accept the blame for Pakistan's poor showing in the United Arab Emirates and rejected calls to resign.

Australia matches through injury, but seasoned opener Saeed Anwar and wicketkeeper Moin Khan failed to find a place in either team. Akram and Anwar had opted out of the Australian series because they wanted a rest, a decision which came under severe criticism from captain Younis and the national media.

Paceman Wasim Akram made it into the one-day team only. Pakistan will play two Tests and five one-day internationals on the month-long tour. After a warm-up from November 3, Pakistan will start the two-match Test series with the first in Harare from November 9-13. The second Test will be played at Bulawayo from November 16-20. The one-dayers will be played at Bulawayo (November 23 and 24) and Harare (November 27, 30 and December 1). Pakistan will then cross the border to play five one-dayers and two Tests in South Africa in December and January, with a fresh squad. **SQUADS**

England, despite their woeful start to their Ashes campaign, should be aiming to beat Australia 5-0 in the series starting in Brisbane Thursday week, Australian opening batsman Justin Langer said here Saturday. "If England are not going out in the first Test saying they want to beat us 5-nil, they are crazy," he said. "That's how you have to go into every contest. If they are not thinking 'We want to beat Australia 5-nil' that would be really crazy. "We would definitely like to win 5-

nil -- and will be working towards that," he said. "It's not just a case of being arrogant. That's just how you should go into every contest. "It's no secret we set out to win every series 5-nil or 3-nil," said Langer, a member of the Australian side that completed a 3-nil whitewash of Pakistan in Sharjah last week. Langer, returning to skipper Western Australia in a three-day match against England starting at the WACA Ground here Monday, said his big aim in the clash would be to keep the tourists on the back foot after a dismal start to their program. England lost by 58 runs to an

Muktijodha Sangsad Krira Chakra increased their chances of playing in the semifinals of the 18th Federation Cup when they overcame Farashganj Sporting Club 3-1 at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur yesterday. It was their second victory in the competition. They now head Group C with maximum six points. But it was not all plain sailing for the former winners, who fell behind after an early goal from Anik. But goals by national skipper Alfaz Ahmed, attacking partner Saiful and midfielder Matiur Rahman Munna, eventually saw the all-reds earn a comfortable victory in the end. With Mohammedan suffering shock defeat at the hands of Rahmatganj on Friday, Muktijodha had every incentive to get a result on Saturday. A draw in their final group match against Brothers Union tomorrow will guarantee top spot and a potentially explosive meeting with Abahani on November 1. If they can negotiate that hurdle then Muktijodha, who earlier defeated Bangladesh Navy, are assured of an easy opponent in the November 3 final since Mohammedan will not be there as expected. Anik put Farashganj ahead in the 30th minute but the Muktis had to wait until five minutes after half time for an equaliser from Alfaz. Saiful swung the game away from their spirited opponents 13 minutes later. And in the 80th

batted South Africa into a strong position on the second day of the second and final Test against Bangladesh at the North West Stadium Saturday. At tea, South Africa were 281 for two in reply to Bangladesh's first innings total of 215. Gibbs (114) and Kirsten (89 not out) put on 141 for the second wicket before Gibbs was run out, Bangladesh's only success of the day. Kirsten and Jacques Kallis continued to deny the tourists' bowlers, putting on an unbeaten 79 for the third wicket. The in-form Gibbs made batting look easy as he reached his seventh Test century off 161 balls when he swept the last ball before lunch from leg-spinner Alok Kapali for four. Kirsten had gone to his 50 when he pushed the previous ball for a single having faced 74 balls and hit seven fours and a six. Gibbs continued untroubled after lunch before he was run out while attempting a quick single to mid-off. The fielders showed no excitement when Tapash Baisya's throw hit the stumps but television replays showed Gibbs had not grounded his bat. Gibbs hit 17 fours and two sixes in his 190-ball innings. The left-handed Kirsten, who made 150 in the first Test in East London to become the first man to score centuries against all other Test countries, played a typical innings, taking no chances but moving relentlessly towards his 16th Test century. Although they seemed headed for another heavy defeat, Bangladesh's bowlers performed steadily. The pitch, which South African captain Shaun Pollock criticised as "too flat" after the first day, gave the bowlers no assistance. Kallis seemed lucky when on 36 he appeared to be caught behind off off-spinner Sanwar Hossain but he survived and was on 46 not

Shaun wasn't scared

South African captain Shaun Pollock said he was not unduly concerned by the rampant start Bangladesh made on Day One of the second Test on Friday. Bangladesh raced to 124 for one at lunch but were dismissed after tea for just 215. By the close, South Africa were 61 for one in reply, with Herschelle Gibbs ominously confident on 36. "I wasn't really worried," Pollock said. "I thought they might get a few more than they did after the start they got but I was going to bowl first if I

won the toss and I would have been a lot more worried if they were 124 for one and I had asked them to bat first." To emphasise the difficult conditions he and the rest of his bowlers faced on the flattest of batting tracks, Pollock brought the match ball to the press conference. The seam was virtually non-existent. "It wasn't a great day to be a bowler. I must admit I didn't think the wicket would play like that. It was very flat and for the first day of a test match it's not really what you need. The first morning it should do something. "I was attacking in the first session and wanted to get wickets and I always knew we could pull it back
