

PDP-Cong coalition asked to form Kashmir govt

Mufti Sayeed takes oath as chief minister Saturday

New Delhi's representative in Kashmir yesterday invited a coalition headed by Mufti Mohammed Sayeed to form a government, ending weeks of political wrangling in the violence-torn state.

Governor Girish Chandra Saxena said Sayeed, a former Indian home minister who has called for unconditional talks with Muslim militants, will be sworn in as Kashmir's chief minister Saturday.

Sayeed staked the claim to office after two weeks of bickering between his regional People's Democratic Party (PDP) and its coalition partner, India's main opposition Congress.

The two parties together swept from power Kashmir's dynastic National Conference in the September 16-October 8 polls but had each wanted the top post, frustrating Kashmiris who viewed

the election a mandate for change.

"Our government will try to bring peace to the state," Sayeed said.

But he stressed there was a "hype in expectations" of the new government.

Ghulam Nabi Azad, the regional Congress head, said the coalition had the support of 52 legislators, eight more than needed to establish a majority in the 87-member legislature.

Under the coalition agreement, the PDP will head the government for three years with Congress taking over the chief minister post for the remaining tenure of three years.

Azad yesterday played down differences within the coalition, saying Congress "will support the chief minister to the hilt".

The PDP and Congress have drafted a programme calling for the "reorientation" of the counter-insurgency police, who have been accused of human rights abuses,

and the repeal of India's tough Prevention of Terrorism Act, which critics charge is used disproportionately against non-Hindus.

The main rebel group, Hizbul Mujahedin, said yesterday it was sceptical of the incoming government's "apparent goodwill steps" and vowed to continue the insurgency.

Kashmir had been put under India's direct rule on October 18 after the National Conference's outgoing chief minister, Farooq Abdullah, refused to stay on as caretaker state leader.

The National Conference, an ally of Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee that had taken a more hawkish stand on the insurgency than the PDP or the Congress, lost half of its seats in the election.

The polls saw a 46 per cent voter turnout, despite a violent campaign by Islamic rebels that left more than 800 people dead.

FROM PAGE 1 results as an outcome of manipulation and fraud, she said it deprived the people of their right to choose their government in a genuine way.

Hasina said Awami League took part in the last election after fulfilling almost all its pre-election pledges in economic, social, political and external sectors during her five-year rule since June 1996. But "the outcome of the election was a bolt from the blue".

"The election results were manipulated through planned fraud, vote rigging and unfair practices," she told the seminar in the European city.

Analysing the last three election results, Hasina said in 1991 Awami League secured 103 seats with 34 per cent of votes and in 1996 some 146 seats with 38 per cent of votes.

"In 2001, how one can justify that 40.2 per cent of votes give 62 seats while 45.9 per cent give 220 seats? How can it be possible?"

Hasina said, "My people still wonder about the 2001 election result. In my view, the mere holding of periodic election is not the only

yardstick of measuring democracy or the tone of a society."

"If election process is betrayed, if a fundamentalist alliance assumes power through conspiracy, the country might become a hotbed of terrorism, it can become a safe haven for a terrorist network, as the government of fundamentalist alliances will morally and physically help so-called fundamentalist terrorists though under cover," she said.

Citing recent reports published in Time Magazine, Far Eastern Economic Review and Wall Street Journal that Southern Bangladesh has become a haven for "religious fanatics", Hasina said BNP, Jamaat and IOJ, partners of the alliance government, "are open about their sympathies and support for religious fanatics".

The Awami League chief said they could not earlier figure out the magnitude of the situation. But if these reports are true, "it is a matter of serious concern for the world community and us".

Hasina feels it could bring a "nightmare for the world and peace would be a far cry, not only for us in Bangladesh, but also around the region".

But democracy, the opposition leader said without democracy, without the principle of genuine people's consent, state can only enforce and impose its will through violence.

"Without good governance, there can be no economic growth, without rule of law, there can be no justice or security for the individuals," she told the meet.

About human rights, the immediate-past prime minister observed that where human rights are ignored, criminals and terrorists thrive, and regional and global security is at risk, because chaos spreads all too quickly, as September 11, 2001 so vividly demonstrates.

Besides wastes, his department has to collect earth and building materials from city roads, left by private developers and government agencies after finishing their work.

Moreover, there are allegations that a sizeable section of DCC's 6,000 street cleaners do not work properly. There are many political appointees among them and they just sign registers at ward commissioners' offices and draw salary from the DCC, sources said.

The conservancy department has about 450 portable and 3000 concrete roadside bins where the street cleaners are supposed to dump wastes first. But the ward commissioners do not supervise the cleaners' work properly.

Lack of co-ordination between DCC and ward commissioners' offices has created a 'system inefficiency' in collecting the wastes, sources said.

Officials at DCC's Engineering Department now pin their hopes on community-based waste collection programme. Only this can keep the city clean, a top official said.

Such private initiatives for waste collection have already been launched in about 300 areas of the city, they said.

FROM PAGE 12 rates to eradicate poverty speedily," Vajpayee said.

Besides, he pointed out, contribution of all developing countries to greenhouse gas emissions in the atmosphere is very little compared with that of industrialised countries.

The Kyoto protocol requires industrialised nations to cut greenhouse emission levels by a deadline of 2008 to 2012, and is likely to emerge as one of the focal points of the Delhi UN Convention on Climate Change, known as COP-8.

Developing countries are obliged to make inventories of their emission levels and develop national action plans for cutting them back - with financial and technical help from developed nations.

The UN conference in New Delhi, in which 169 countries are participating, is focusing on future action needed to tackle global warming and the preparatory work to be done ahead of the protocol coming into force early next year.

Climate change has emerged as one of the most serious concerns in the world today and the convention has provided us with a sound basis for global co-operation, the Vajpayee said.

The convention reflects the consensus that addressing the challenge of climate change is the integral part of the need to achieve sustainable development, he added.

He said the world has understood the importance of diversifying energy supply, substantially increasing the share of renewable energy in the total energy mix, and enhancing the use of energy conservation technologies.

Earlier, two school children of the Tata Energy Research Institute (TERI) handed over the children's declaration on climate change to TR Baalu, environment minister of India and president of the COP-8.

Nasimul Haque of Bangladesh urged for immediate ratification by Russia and Canada so that Kyoto Protocol can be put into effect.

He also asked the United States and Australia to ratify the protocol. He was speaking on behalf of the Climate Action Network, a coalition of non-government organisations (NGOs) representing the civil society worldwide.

Representative of the UN secretary-general Niiti Desai, UNFCCC executive secretary-general Joke Waller-Hunter, IFCC chairman Dr

RK Pachanri, Patrick Girand of the Asian Development Bank and Kristalina Georgieva of the World Bank also spoke at the inaugural session.

AFF adds, after the session, heads of delegation went into a huddle to begin forging a declaration on the future action needed to roll back global warming.

A European Union delegation told reporters they would at the round table discussions draw the attention of all countries on the need to start looking beyond the 2012 deadline.

"Science tells us that the existing measures are not enough to achieve a stabilisation of the concentration of greenhouse emission levels in the atmosphere," said senior EU delegate Steen Gade.

"The developed countries should take on further reduction commitments and we should also start to discuss in what way the richest developing countries can contribute," he added.

Gade said discussions on future action should include all countries regardless of whether they have to make commitments or not on emission reduction.

Senior UN leaders warned ahead of the opening of the ministerial conference that urgent action was needed to slow changes to the world's climate.

"The accumulated evidence continues to give us concern on climate change. There has been an increase of three percent in the level of carbon in the atmosphere since 1995," said GWP Obassi, secretary-general of the World Meteorological Organisation.

He said sea levels were rising and extreme weather events such as floods were happening with greater frequency.

Obassi said new evidence showed most of the changes in the weather pattern were due to human activities.

"Industrialised nations must do all to cut greenhouse gases. As a first step, they must ratify the Kyoto protocol," said Klaus Toepfer, executive secretary of the UN Environment Programme (UNEP).

By Friday, when the conference ends, delegates are expected to announce a Delhi declaration mapping out an action plan to cut greenhouse emissions and check global warming.

FROM PAGE 12 The report said HIV/AIDS is now the fourth biggest cause of death in the world and about 2.9 million deaths are attributed to unsafe sex. About 40 million people have been infected with HIV and the number is growing rapidly.

About 1.7 million deaths a year worldwide are attributed to the usage of unsafe water, sanitation and hygiene.

Iron deficiency has been marked as the most prevalent of nutrient deficiencies, affecting an estimated two billion people. The most common victims are children and mothers. It causes almost a million deaths.

The report identified vitamin A deficiency as the leading cause of acquired blindness in children and iodine deficiency to be the single most preventable cause of mental retardation and brain damage.

The report recommended a substantial increase in government taxes, which would enable them to provide significant health benefits at low cost.

The report also recommended health ministries to undertake stronger roles in formulating risk prevention policy and provide more support for scientific research, improved surveillance systems and better access to global information.

The other recommendation of the report includes development of effective, committed policies for the prevention of globally increasing risks to health and reaching a balance between government, community and individual contributions.

Bank's assistance for constructing a bridge over river Padma.

Thanking the ADB for its cooperation in building the Jamuna Multipurpose Bridge which set up direct link with the country's northern districts, she said the bridge on the Padma would establish direct communications with the southern districts.

Earlier welcoming the ADB delegation, the prime minister congratulated the officials on the occasion of the bank's 20th Anniversary.

The case was later transferred to the Sessions Judge's Court.

Hasina and three other accused in the case are now on bail.

The case was originally filed with Ramna police station on December 11 last year against Prof Rafiqul for awarding a contract to the China National Water Resources and Hydropower Engineering Corporation (CNHEC) for development of the site for installation of the AES 450 MW Meghnaghat power plant phase 1 for his "personal benefit." SHACO is the local agent of CNHEC.

The contract involving Tk 141.65 crore was given to the company ignoring the lowest bid of Tk 123.76 crore, causing a loss of Tk 17.89 crore to the state, the FIR of the case said.

In the charge sheet, the Investigation Officer (IO) of the case said the names of Hasina and the two others have been included as investigation revealed their involvement in the scam. Eight persons were shown as prosecution witnesses.

Giving official account of deaths since the launch of "operation clean heart" for crackdown on crimes on October 16 midnight, he said so far 11 people had died after having been picked up during the manhunt for offenders.

Meanwhile, some 158 people including 15 "listed criminals" were arrested in last 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday and 26 firearms seized.

Asked about this, some of the executive engineers admitted "a few irregularities" and said that they had nothing to do in this regard as the musclemen backed by the ward commissioners controlled the whole process.

Sources said that the commissioners or their representatives were present at the executive engineers' offices during collection and dropping of the tender schedules. Besides, a number of contractors alleged that they could not

Blix in Washington to meet Cheney, Powell

"No decision yet" to wage war on Iraq, says chairman of joint chiefs of staff of US

The UN Security Council was to meet yesterday for more talks on disarming Iraq as chief UN weapons inspector Hans Blix prepared to meet senior members of the US administration.

The 15 United Nations council members met briefly Tuesday before announcing they were suspending until early yesterday discussions on a 27-paragraph draft resolution presented by the United States last week.

The draft which would set tough new conditions for restarting UN weapons inspections in Iraq is supported by Britain, but France, Russia and China, the remaining permanent council members with veto power, oppose it because of "hidden triggers" for the automatic use of military force against Iraq.

The meeting will be the fifth on Iraq involving the whole council, which met twice last week and on

Monday to hear Blix.

Meanwhile on Tuesday, General Richard Myers, chairman of the US Joint Chiefs of Staff, told reporters that there was "no decision yet" to wage war on Iraq.

The Swede, who heads the UN Monitoring, Verification and Inspection Commission (UNMOVIC), arrived in Washington late Tuesday accompanied by the director general of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), Mohammed El-Baradei.

They were to hold talks with US Vice-president Dick Cheney, national security advisor Condoleezza Rice and Secretary of State Colin Powell, according to a US administration official.

"And the president will probably drop by that," the official said, declining to discuss any agenda.

However, White House officials clearly took heart in a statement Blix made on Monday, when he urged the Security Council to give full

support to weapons inspectors he intends to send to Iraq, saying it would be helpful to warn Iraq that there would be consequences if it failed to cooperate.

In Paris, Foreign Minister Dominique de Villepin told parliament Tuesday that France wanted the UN Security Council to send a "clear, strong message" to Iraq.

British Foreign Secretary Jack Straw told the BBC yesterday that he was confident of a "good" outcome to the Security Council debate.

Asked if Britain would back the United States in "going it alone" in any military action, Straw replied: "We don't rule this out is the answer.

The only way to avert an armed conflict was for Iraq to comply with all agreements it signed up to after the 1991 Gulf War and ensure that it no longer has weapons of mass destruction, he said after a meeting with Bahrain's King Hamad in Manama.

Three more die, 158 held

FROM PAGE 1 and handed over to police. Police produced him before the court and he was sent to the jail. He fell sick inside the jail and was sent to the hospital where he died.

In Madaripur, according to our correspondent, an army team arrested Tota Miah, 37, Shankar Malu, 35, and Sayed Munshi, 38, in their village Khoajpur for their alleged involvement in looting 19 rifles from the Dattapara Police Camp in Shibchar. The incident took place two years ago.

The army team took them to village Shirkhara in a bid to seize the looted arms. Tota Miah fell sick at the village and was rushed to the Madaripur Sadar Hospital where he died at around 9:00am yesterday. The autopsy was carried out at the hospital in presence of army personnel.

Army sources said Tota gave a statement before the on-duty army personnel that he would show rifles if he were taken to Shikharra village.

Accordingly, Tota was taken to the village. At one stage, he ran out of the army custody, stumbled and got injured, the sources claimed. He was rushed to the hospital where he died. The army sources also claimed that Tota Miah did not die from torture.

Meanwhile, Abu Sayed, a higher secondary second year student of Salahuddin College at Choumohoni of Noakhali, died at the Chest Diseases Hospital in the capital Tuesday evening.

Sources said army picked up Sayed and seized a knife from him on October 22 in his Talua village

residence. He was turned over to police who produced him before the court. The court sent him to jail on October 24.

Sayed fell sick in the jail and was rushed to the Majidi Sadar Hospital. However, his condition deteriorated and he was shifted to the Chest Diseases Hospital in Dhaka on October 28. He died at the hospital Tuesday evening.

The body was sent to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital for autopsy. Hospital sources said there were marks of injuries in different parts of his body. His brother Abu Ahad Sufian took the body to their village.

Family sources said the victim was not involved with any political party or their front organisation.

Meanwhile, on the 14th day of the "Operation Clean Heart", army arrested 158 people and seized 26 firearms along with 552 rounds of ammunition across the country in the last 24 hours ending at 8:00am yesterday.

In the capital, army arrested Ayub Ali, a constable of the police protection division of the Dhaka Metropolitan Police while he was allegedly taking bribes from sex workers in the early hours of yesterday. He was handed over to the Tejgaon Police Station.

In Chittagong, 36 people were hauled up in different parts of the city and the district yesterday.

Army troops picked up 17 each from the port city and Banskhali Upazila and two from Patia Upazila. Of the two arrestees in Patia, one is an incumbent ward commissioner, and the other a former ward com-

missioner.

Our Sylhet correspondent said five people including three listed criminals were arrested in the army crackdown in the district yesterday.

They are Nurul Islam Lucky, son of Masud Mia of Kuchai village; Iqbal Hossain Mintu, son of late Altaf Hossain of the same village; and Nazrul Islam Kamal, son of late Rashid Miah of Sultanpur, were listed criminals. Two others arrested are Mohammad Ayub Ahmed, son of late Humat Ali of Shah Sikandar, and Akid Mia, son of Tera Miah of Pashchimbagh.

Our Rajshahi correspondent said army arrested 263 people from 16 districts of Rajshahi division yesterday.

The joint convener of the Rajshahi city unit of the Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) was among the arrestees.

Our Mymensingh correspondent said army arrested six people including district BNP General Secretary and former general secretary of the Transport Owners Association Manjurul Haque Manju yesterday.

The other arrestees are Zahur Haque Liton, Abdul Halim Khan, Swadesh Sarkar, one Robin and Masuduzzaman Khan.

Sources said army raided the residence of Awami League lawmaker and Organising Secretary of Bangladesh Jubo League Mirza Azam in Jamalpur yesterday. No further details were available

An executive engineer, preferring anonymity, said "It is impossible to get any work of the DCC without making secret arrangements with the ward commissioners."

When contacted yesterday, two ward commissioners who are said to be in the 'five star' group refuted the allegations of their involvement in the tender manipulations.

They claimed that the allegations are motivated and they demanded proper investigation into those.

"I want proper investigation and I should be punished if found guilty," said one of them, Chowdhury Alam, Commissioner of ward-56 and president of Ramna unit of BNP.

The other, commissioner of ward-21 and president of Badda unit of BNP MA Quaiyum, also expressed similar sentiment.

Other members of the group are the general secretary of the city BNP Abdus Salam, president of Sutrapur BNP and commissioner of ward-74 Abdul Bashir and commissioner of ward-51 and president of Dhanmondi BNP Abdul Latif. Salam

is now out of the country and the two others could not be contacted.

The mayor also could not be contacted yesterday as he is abroad.

Meanwhile, the executive engineers are now preparing a list of those who took part in the bid. They would submit it to the Tender Committee of the DCC headed by the CEO for preparing a short list for finalisation of the process by the mayor.
