BDR, BSF trade fire over Kalindi jetty

Over 1,800 rounds fired, flag meeting today

The Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) and the Border Security Forces (BSF) of India traded heavy fire at two border outposts (BoP) in Satkhira district Friday night and yesterday morning

The BSF fired about 1,500 rounds of machinegun shots during the skirmish beginning at 11:00pm, while the BDR responded with 300 shots. No casualties were however reported.

BDR Commander of Nildumur Battilion No. 1 Lt.

Col. Ramzan Ali said the BSF tried to build a jetty on the other side of the Kalindi, an international river opposite the Kaikhli BoP, at 9:00pm, violating an earlier flag meeting decision. If constructed, the jetty would change the course of

the Kalindi river, devouring Bangladesh territory. Two flag meetings were held on November 13 and 15 in which the Indian side agreed to refrain from constructing the jetty, Ali said But on Friday night, the Indians backed by the BSF

Army corporal axed for graft during drive

An army corporal was sacked yesterday on charge of corruption while he was posted at Karimganj in Kishoreganj during the ongoing anti-crime crackdown.

Following an investigation, a court marshal found the corporal, Mohammad Abdul Hai Akand, guilty of realising money from the criminals on the assurance that they would be spared by the joint forces. The accused was demoted to the

rank of soldier and given a one-year iail term

Arms deposit deadline now Nov 21 Rezaul Karim

The government yesterday extended the deadline for depositing licensed firearms by five more days and warned of stern actions against anyone for failing to surrender weapons by November 21.

Firearm licences of those who will fail to deposit their weapons by the new deadline will be cancelled.

The time extension came as only about 30,000 out of a total 189,265 licensed firearms were deposited till Friday, the original deadline. In the capital, 11,291 arms were depos-

On November 5, the government ordered licensed arms holders to deposit their weapons within 15 days

Talking to The Daily Star, State Minister for Home Lutfozzaman Babar said the new deadline will not be extend anymore and violators of the order will be severely punished as possessors of illegal weapons.

Arms cache found in Ukhia jungle, criminal Swapan held in Barisal

The army yesterday picked up 11 activists of ruling BNP's youth and student fronts from an lftar party at the house of party leader and former minister Brig (Rtd) Hannan Shah in Shafaisri village under Kapasia thana in Gazipur district.

When contacted over phone last night, Hannan Shah said the army personnel told him that they were picked up on charges of extortion. The arrested include Sohel Kapasia thana unit president of Jativatabadi Chhatra Dal. BNP's student front.

In Cox's Bazar, the army in a single haul recovered 24 firearms from a jungle near Palangkhali School in Ukhia upazila. The cache comprise 12 single-barrel guns, 11 LGs and a pistol. But none was arrested.
