Crucial EC meeting tomorrow

The standoff over the union parishad election schedule took a new turn yesterday when Chief Election Commissioner MA Syed said the Election Commission (EC) wants to hold the polls according to its own schedule.

"We want the election held as per the previous schedule. January or February is a good time for election. Besides, the previous schedule was acceptable to all," Syed told journalists at the EC Secretariat.

"It is the commission's responsibility to announce the election sched ules," he added. "However, we have not taken any decision as yet." The EC was all set to announce the schedule yesterday with the elections staggered over January 4 to February 27.

However, in a letter to the EC on Saturday, the Ministry of Local Government, Rural Development (LGRD) and Cooperatives requested that the schedule be deferred by two months and the polls be held in March-April. The letter said special law enforcement facilities to hold the election

between January 4 and February 27 would be difficult to arrange because of the ongoing anti-crime drive by the joint forces. Till filing of this report at 10:00pm last night, the quasi-judicial body took

Seven minutes into the day's proceedings in the parliament, the AL legislators stormed out of the House protesting the bill -- 'The Bangabandhu Award Fund (Amendment) Act, 2002' -- that proposed substitution of the word 'National Agriculture' for 'Bangabandhu' in an ordinance Bangabandhu Award Fund Ordinance, 1976. The ordinance was promulgated 26 years ago.

The AL lawmakers did not come back to the House for the rest of the day. Criminal 'Benga' Babu nabbed; two more die

A young man the army picked up in Joydevpur, Gazipur yesterday afternoon died at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) last night, while another youth detained in Khulna on November 1 died at the Khulna District Jail last night.

In the capital, the joint forces of army, BDR and police arrested notorious criminal Nazmul Hasan Riyad alias 'Benga' Babu alias Malik, 24, in his residence at Uttar Goran in the city's Khilgaon area in the early hours of yesterday.

The young man in Gazipur, according to army sources, Arju Miah, 35, was picked up from his Hazipara residence at about 3:00pm yesterday. He was sent to the Gazipur Sadar Hospital. Later, a sub-inspector was called to the hospital and asked to rush the victim to the DMCH who finally died at about 8:15 last night. The sources said the army

Kathmandu meeting on SAFTA starts Nov 29 Dhaka to seek trade concessions

Bangladesh will seek special trade facilities from India. Pakistan and Sri Lanka under the South Asian Free Trade Area (SAFTA)

The first preparatory meeting for transforming South Asian Preferential Trade Agreement (SAPTA) into the AFTA will be held at Kathmandu on November 29-30. A ur-member Bangladesh delegation led by a joint ecretary of the commerce ministry will attend the eeting

The ministry held a long meeting yesterday to disuss and finalise the issues for the Kathmandu meet. The meeting decided that as a Least Developed

Country (LDC), Bangladesh would try to get trade facilities from the three developing nations under the framework of the World Trade Organisation (WTO).

Of the seven South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) members, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Nepal and the Maldives are considered LDCs, while India Pakistan and Sri Lanka developing nations.

The meeting also decided that Bangladesh along with other South Asian LDCs would seek special market access and lengthier timeframe for restructuring their tariffs under the envisaged free trade regime.

According to Dhaka's proposal, the LDC SAARC members would gradually reduce their tariff rates to SEE PAGE 11 COL 3
