





Partial troops pullout by end of January

The government plans partial withdrawal of the armed forces from 'peaceful and rural areas' by the end of next month, said highly placed sources.

The withdrawal will begin before the union parishad elections get underway on January 25.

However, the Operation Clean Heart will continue as long as required. There will be no relaxation in the joint drive or troops pullout from 'crime-prone' areas, especially in Dhaka, Chittagong, Cox's Bazar and some other cities and towns.

Troops withdrawn gradually from apparently peaceful areas would be first stationed at thana headquarters. If the situation improves, they would be stationed at district headquarters for further observation of the situation, the sources said.

The drive began on October 17 to nab criminals and recover illegal arms as law and order had deteriorated

across the country. Deployment of troops in the drive has brought positive results as criminal activities have reduced greatly, sources pointed out.

However, different quarters criticised the death of

more than 30 people during the drive. Troops have so far arrested around 8,000 people (listed, non-listed and suspected criminals), recovered about 1,400 firearms and 28,000 rounds of ammunition. But most of the top criminals have fled the country before and after the drive began.

Meanwhile, the recent decision to defer the UP nolls date followed demand from the MPs to hold the election after withdrawal of army because grassroots level leaders and activists of different parties are now hiding to avert arrest during the on going drive.

A number of sitting UP chairmen and probable candidates have already been arrested.

Pro-Taliban in ruling ranks, says Hasina

Awami League President Sheikh Hasina once again asked the government to come up with an example of her 'seditious statement', if any, during her recent visits to Thailand and India.

The opposition leader also accused the ruling alliance of having the pro-Taliban forces in its fold.

"The government has to specify which of my activities or statements went against the country. It has to prove which of my words or sentences seemed seditious," asserted Hasina at a press conference at the Jatiya Press Club yesterday.

Speaking against the misdeeds of a government does not mean speaking against the state, she said. "The ruling alliance has to



understand the difference between anti-government and anti-state." Hasina's renewed challenge and statements in self-defence came yesterday hard on the heels of an
