US-Iraq war of words hots up as Turkey balks on war

While Baghdad and Washington continued their war of words yesterday, the prospects of real fighting got the cold shoulder from Turkey, home to strategic US air bases, which said it wanted UN approval for war before any action. Recep Tayyip Erdogan, leader of Turkey's ruling party, said "we and

government officials say Turkey will not clarify its decision (on possible military action against Iraq) without a UN Security Council resolution." Turkey is facing intense pressure from key ally Washington to provide

support for a possible operation to topple the regime in Baghdad, which the United States accuses of possessing weapons of mass destruction. Turkey's government and top brass were due to hold a key meeting

yesterday to discuss whether to give that support. The only Muslim member of NATO, Turkey has long called for a peaceful resolution to the Iraqi crisis, but has also insisted that any military moves

against Iraq be based on international legitimacy and consensus. Meanwhile, UN arms experts carried on with their search for Iraq's alleged weapons of mass destruction as new tensions simmered over the nuts and bolts of their work

The latest row was over the terms under which UN inspectors may interview Iragi scientists involved in weapons development, either now or in the past.

It comes as the Iraqi press said Washington is pursuing a strategy of lies

in order to justify an attack on the country and as Iraq's vice president bridled at US insistence inspectors interview scientists outside Iraq

As the war of words continued, three convovs of all-terrain vehicles belonging to the UN Monitoring, Control and Inspections Commission (UNMOVIC) left their base at Baghdad's former Canal Hotel at 8:30 am (local time), an AFP correspondent witnessed.

Their destination was not immediately known.

On Thursday, General Hossam Mohammad Amin, head of the Iraqi body that liaises with the United Nations, said inspectors had "found no direct or indirect proof" that Iraq possesses weapons prohibited by the United

"In the final analysis, the teams have not been able to find any evidence to support American and British allegations that Iraq is harbouring or storing banned weapons," Amin said.

Amin also hinted at a possible clash between Iraq and inspectors over scientists now or formerly involved in chemical, biological, nuclear and ballistic missile programs and associated research, development and production facilities. UN Security Council Resolution 1441, which tightened the inspections

regime, requires "immediate, unimpeded, unrestricted, and private access to all officials and other persons" whom UNMOVIC or the International

Management of Dhaka City's wastes has always been a challenging task. Even where any such risks are readily identifiable, it is not an easy task to impose controls. This has indeed very harmful implications. As global warming induced by the greenhouse effect has increased

it has also changed the pattern of distribution of infection and vectorborne diseases entailing heavy tolls

This makes it all the more important to install an effective mechanism to safely dispose of hospital wastes, much of which may be highly toxic and life-threatening. With the growing urbanisation

resulting in proliferation of health clinics and hospitals in the private sector in many parts of the city in addition to the government hospitals, the hazards from careless disposal of hospital wastes have aggravated ominously. This is due to the fact that there are no func-

tional rules or regulations regarding disposal of hospital wastes in the country. The presence of used needles, syringes, bloodstained gauge and bandages in the garbage dumps in the vicinity of such establishments is a common phenomenon. The greater danger is that these deadly wastes are often collected and sold in the market by unscrupulous elements putting

public health in great danger. It is not unusual to come across shady characters in the vicinity of some hospitals and clinics who may be seen busy laying out used bandages on the grass to dry and washing used 'one-time use' syringes with water to sell them

cine shops. It is not difficult for such shady operatives to make such used items look like new with the help of easily available machinery to make new plastic labels or packets. These fake products are presented to customers so ingenuously that they are unable to tell the

real product from the fake one. Then an equally vital issue is the safe disposal of blood, urine and swab samples after the laboratory tests are done. Health experts are of the opinion that even when these harmful substances are poured into covered drains or flushed down toilets, there is no guarantee that

CJ urges judges, lawyers to protect human rights

Cinema blasts **Statements** of 8 injured recorded

Justice Sultan Hossain Khan, chairman of the one-member judi cial inquiry commission investigating the recent bombings in the four local cinema halls arrived at the Mymensingh Circuit House yesterday noon to continue investigation into the carnage that killed at least 18 persons and many more injured on December 7.

This is the second visit of the probe commission chief to the scene of the serial bomb explosions in the four cinema halls of the town. Earlier on December 14 and 15, he visited Mymensingh in connection with the investigation and recorded statements of 19 employees of the cinema halls.

Yesterday evening, Justice Khan visited bomb-hit Aloka and Chhayabani cinemas. Later, he visited Mymensingh Medical College Hospital (MMCH) and recorded statements of eight injured victims of the blasts undergoing treatment at the hospital.

He will again visit the MMCH today morning to record some more statements. Later, he will go to Mymensingh Jail to talk to those arrested in connection with the blasts and record statements of the

Talking to reporters at the Mymensingh Circuit House in the evening, Justice Khan said it would not be wise to close the investigation in a hurry as extensive investigation was still needed to reveal the

Justice Khan will leave Mymensingh today evening and will again come back here in the first

India, Pakistan to exchange list of N-installations

Talks on missile defence Jan 15-16

India and Pakistan are set to exchange lists of their nuclear installations on January 1 under an agreement that prohibits the two countries from attacking each other's nuclear facilities. Both the countries complied

with the agreement signed in 1991 and began exchanging the lists of the nuclear installations on January 1, 1992.

Even at the height of tensions between the two countries following the December 13 attack on India's Parliament last year, India and Pakistan exchanged the lists on January 1, 2002. Now they are again poised to exchange the same and officials on both sides do not see any problem in that.

The 1991 agreement prohibits both the countries from attacking against each other's nuclear installations and facilities in times of war.

The last year's list contained 11 Indian nuclear installations against six on Pakistani side, local daily The News reported.

"The exchange of the lists of nuclear installations on the first day of the New Year would herald a new era of conciliation and rapprochement as both India and Pakistan have given a firm commitment to the international community to bolster the set of Confidence Building Measures (CBMs) leading to a structured dialogue," the paper quoted western diplomats in Brussels as saying.

Meanwhile, proliferation of missile systems in many countries,

including North Korea, will figure in the first talks on missile defence between Indian and US officials here on January 15 and 16, official sources said on Thursday.

The Indian delegation will be led by Sheelkant Sharma, Joint Secretary, Disarmament in the External Affairs Ministry, the sources said.

The Indo-US missile defence talks are reportedly part of a series planned in the capitals of the two

The officials are expected to discuss East Asia in February when the Indian delegation will be headed by Nalin Surie of the East Asia division of the External Affairs Ministry, the sources

Forty-one people were killed yester day in a suicide bomb attack on pro-Russian Chechen government headquarters in Grozny, the separatist republic's representative to Russia's parliament was quoted as saying by Interfax.

Two huge explosions went off within a minute of each other, devastating the five-storey government building, Russia's NTV television said, reports Reuters.

The head of the pro-Russian administration in Chechnya, Akhmad Kadvrov, was not hurt in the attack, which Russian news agencies said had been carried out by suicide bombers. Television pictures showed

stunned people drenched in blood stumbling out of the wreckage, helped by Russian soldiers and civilians. Debris was strewn over a large area and cars parked nearby were smashed and gutted

PDB dillydallies in feeder handover Thousands in Godagari yet to get power connection

An estimated 4208 subscribers of the Rural Electrification Board (REB) in 44 villages in Godagari upazila are yet to be brought under its electricity supply network.

The problem has arisen because the Power Development Board (PDB) is not handing over its Rajabari feeder, under Godagari power sub-station, to the REB, violating several departmental and ministerial orders in this respect, sources said.

The PDB authorities, however had handed over the Rajabari feeder, a 70- kilometre line (11 KV)

from Anchua village to Rajabari via Haripur, to the REB in 1999. Under the Fourth Action Plan, the PDB is bound to hand over all its lines to the REB in REB areas. But violating all the rules, the

PDB forcibly took back the feeder on August 23,1999, without serving any notice to the REB, just three days after its formal handing over.
