Biotech wheat may cut US exports by 50pc

There is a "high risk" that the US wheat industry will lose 30 per cent to 50 per cent of its business with foreign markets for spring wheat if Monsanto Co releases its controversial genetically modified wheat in the next few years, according to new research by an Iowa State University economics professor.

The research report, released on Tuesday said the near-term impacts on prices and exports is decidedly negative if Monsanto proceeds with its plans to introduce its "Roundup Ready" wheat.

The \$15,000 study was conducted by Iowa State professor of economics Robert Wisner and financed by the Western Organization of Resource Councils, a coalition of community groups.

Monsanto's biotech wheat, which would be the first genetically modified wheat in the world, has been engineered to withstand herbicide so weed control is easier for farmers. Monsanto is nearing the end of the regulatory approval process and could have the wheat available within the next two years.

Repo auction

The repurchase agreement (Repo) auction of Bangladesh Bank for commercial banks and financial institutions was held here yesterday.

Five bids of one-day tenor amounting to Tk 159.60 crore were received and accepted.

The rate of interest against the accepted bids ranged from 8.80 percent to 8.75 percent per annum, said a press release of Bangladesh Bank.

Oil prices fall further

Oil prices fell further in Asian trade Wednesday on growing opposition to the US-led war against Iraq, traders said.

The New York light, sweet crude slipped two cents lower to 36.70 dollars a barrel in after hours trading from the last overnight done deal of \$36.72 dollars in New York.

Traders said the market was softening as reports emerged that a US-led attack on Iraq would be delayed due to mounting opposition.

Prices were settling down to more realistic levels, albeit at a slower pace given the pending threat of war, they said.

Crude prices have firmed up over the past three months, giving refiners better margins for the first quarter of this year, said an energy market analyst with a major Singapore brokerage house.

\$10m EC package for WTO negotiation soon

The European Commission is finalising a US\$ 10 million package to help Bangladesh enhance its trade negotiation capacity ahead of the next WTO ministerial conference in Mexico in September, an EC envoy said here yesterday.

"It's the high time for Bangladesh to gear up because the Cancun conference is very close," said Anne Marchal of the EC Delegation in Dhaka, explaining the importance of the ministerial.

In a discussion with journalists on "EU Policy on Trade and Development" at a local hotel, she said the Mexico ministerial would address the concerns of WTO members about issues like market access, TRIPS, genetically modified foods and tariffs.

"Bangladesh needs a good background paper on these issues," she said, adding that the trade related technical assistance (TRTA) package is to help address the trade related concerns of the country as well as other LDCs.

The EC's trade capacity package is a part of its total US\$ 30 million project under SEDF.

The EC package would be concentrated on supporting LDC ministerial in Dhaka before the Cancun conference, strengthening WTO cell in the Ministry of Commerce, trade analytical and research capacity, and increasing awareness of civil society and chambers about WTO issues.

The pre-Cancun package is only the first stepping stone in the EC TRTA (Trade Related Technical Assistance) towards Bangladesh," she said, "More will be delivered in due time."

Replies a question, the EC envoy said the country might be benefited from SAARC cumulation, but again it needs to be analysed in details.

Referring to her recent visit to a local pharmaceutical industry where she found most of the raw materials coming from neighbouring countries, she indicated that the country has potentials to add more value to exports.

She said the SAARC cumulation is not only meant for textile sector but also for other products. Bangladesh was missing the export potentials in other areas also by not taking the advantage of SAARC Cumulation to diversify export products, the EU envoy felt.

Taking part in the discussion, Economic and Political Affairs Officer of the Delegation Zillu Hye Razi said neither the government nor anyone from the private sector so far made any request to relax the rules of origin requirements.

A marginal relax in the rules of origin could facilitate Bangladesh diversify its exports to some extent, he added.

Selim made ACC board member



Nizam Selim, president of the Shrimping Hatchery Association of Bangladesh (SHAB), was elected member of the oversight board of the Aquaculture Certification Council (ACC) yesterday, says a press release.

ACC is the organisation that formulates codes of conduct for shrimp industries, gives certification and acts as international watchdog to maintain quality of shrimp products.

Elected at the Boston Seafood Show, USA, Selim is the first Bangladeshi to be elected of the 14-member board.

Md Mamunur Rahman of ATDP-II's Seal of Quality Programme said Selim's election is timely as Bangladesh's shrimp industry has to comply with the forthcoming certification codes. A compliance of codes will help Bangladesh increase its shrimp export, he added.

Japan submits farm proposals to WTO

Japan submitted proposals for World Trade Organisation agriculture reforms Wednesday, ahead of a deadline at the end of this month for breaking a deadlock.

Slamming a previous draft as "especially beneficial to exporting countries," Farm Minister Tadamori Oshima outlined Japan's position in a letter to the chairman of the WTO's agriculture negotiations Stuart Harbinson, who is Hong Kong's ambassador to the Geneva-based trade body.

"The second proposal should appropriately reflect non-trade concerns, secure flexibility, continuity and balance and reflect our country's proposal," Oshima said in a statement.

"In order to move negotiations forward, the voices of importing countries who have put forward realistic and concrete proposals need to be heard," he said.

Harbinson's initial draft, which was widely rejected at a WTO meeting of 25 ministers in Tokyo last month, calls for "harmonization" of tariffs, with greater reductions in high tariff goods.

The products on display include tea, handloom clothes, foam, food items, beverage, handicrafts, wooden furniture and so on.

The fair will remain open for all from 9am to 9pm everyday till March 26.

State Minister for Commerce Barkatullah Bulu, Deputy Minister for CHT Affairs Moni Swapani Dewan and Deputy Commissioner and Convenor of HTTF-2003 Organising Committee Jafar Ahmed Khan also spoke.

Egypt freezes imports for three months

Egypt's government has decided to freeze state imports for three months except for basic food items due to the weak local currency and a shortage in hard currency, official newspapers reported Tuesday.

The Egyptian pound has lost about 20 per cent of its value against the US dollar and the euro since it was allowed to float freely on January 29.

Other measures taken by the government will include fixing the price of 15 basic food products and reimbursing producers for any loss, said the daily Al-Akhbar quoting Prime Minister Atif Obeid in a speech to parliament.

The list of these products, yet to be published, was expected to include items such as sugar, oil, rice and flour, according to a parliamentary official.

The prime minister did not specify how long the price fixing measure would stay in effect, while the list of government imports to be frozen was to be made public later Tuesday, said the official.

Obeid said that "food and products of a strategic nature" will be exempt from the ban.

The government's social aid programs are a legacy of the 1952 revolution and they include issuing provision cards to low-income citizens allowing them to buy basic products at low prices.

WB okays \$108m for Afghan transport

The World Bank said Tuesday it had approved a loan of 108 million dollars for Afghanistan to rebuild roads, repair the Kabul airport runway and improve air traffic control.

"More than two decades of conflict combined with a prolonged lack of maintenance has resulted in severe damage to long sections of roads and critical structures such as runways, bridges, tunnels, and retaining walls in Afghanistan," the Bank said in a statement.

"Deterioration of air traffic control equipment and a shortage of qualified operators has reduced the safety and availability of flights, Afghanistan's most practical means for long-range domestic as well as international travel," it added.

The emergency project aimed to remove bottlenecks such as collapsed bridges, eroded road sections, disintegrated pavements, damaged tunnels, and unsafe air traffic.

"Solving Afghanistan's transport problems is absolutely essential to both short-term recovery and long-term development, two areas on which the government has rightly asked international donors to focus equally," said Terje Wolden, a World Bank senior transport specialist.

"Removing the bottlenecks will help the country promote regional economic integration and facilitate trade, improve delivery of humanitarian aid, and assist reconstruction efforts in all sectors."

The road work would focus on overhauling the Kabul to Pol-e-Khomri-Kunduz highway, including the Salang tunnel.

Sri Lanka ups air fares amid Gulf war fears

Sri Lanka's national carrier, Sri Lankan, Wednesday raised its air fares by 20 dollars to recover additional fuel costs triggered by fears of war in the Gulf.

An airline official said a flat 20-dollar "fuel surcharge" will apply indefinitely to all return tickets irrespective of the destination. One-way tickets will be charged a 10-dollar surcharge.

"This is to recover the additional cost the airline has to bear as a result in the sharp rise in fuel prices due to uncertainties in the Middle East," an official said.

"For 2003, I expect global economic growth to slightly exceed last year's level of three per cent."


