

Tender to buy biased books scrapped

Funds for secondary school books to go to school infrastructure

In the face of widespread criticism, the government yesterday cancelled a tender on buying books worth Tk 13 crore for secondary schools.

government secondary schools and 2,000 non-governmental schools.

"The books could not be procured right now for unavoidable reason," Dr M Delwar Hossain, the project director, said in the letter yesterday.

The director of the development of selected secondary schools project issued a letter scrapping the tender on purchasing a set of 200 books for 2,317 schools each.

The move followed a report headlined "Secondary goes primary way" run by The Daily Star on May 8. The tender was scheduled to be opened on May 17.

Political bias was the main yardstick for the books selected by a committee headed by Professor Wakil Ahmed of Dhaka University, alleged sources.

The list approved by the education ministry selected the books under the project bankrolled by the government. The books were meant for distribution among 317

books.

Deadly negligence claims school staff's life

An employee of Mastermind School at Dhanmondi died when a piling pillar crashed on her at the Elephant Road yesterday.

The victim was identified as Parveen Akhter Putul, 22, wife of one Mizanur Rahman. Parveen was walking down a footpath on her way to work at 7:00am, when a pillar of an under-construction building fell on her.

The victim was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where she died at 8:30am.

Parveen was working as an attendant at Mastermind School.

Police neither arrested the builder for public safety negligence that led to the death of the school staff nor did they file any case.

Meanwhile, Tejgoan police recovered the body of a man, aged about 35, from under the Baily Bridge in Zia Udyan near the Sangsab Bhaban yesterday.

The body was found at around 8:30am.

Police failed to ascertain whether the man was murdered or whether he had committed suicide as there were no injury marks on his body.

Saifur seeks MP help to cut waste

Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman has sought cooperation of the lawmakers to minimise wastage of national resources.

"I can see a major portion of national resources being wasted through the Annual Development Programme (ADP). "This cannot continue for long and we have to find ways of improving the situation," he told the Members of Parliament (MPs) at a pre-budget discussion at the National Economic Council (NEC) conference room in Dhaka yesterday.

Around 32 ruling BNP and Jatiya Party MPs were present at the discussion meeting.

Pointing out that all the ministers and members of the parliament have made lofty promises to the voters, Saifur asked the lawmakers, "Do we have the resources to meet the requirements of all? Around one hundred thousand crore taka will be needed if we want to implement all the projects under the ADP."

He underscored the need for a rapid economic growth, saying it will not be possible to generate sufficient employment to alleviate poverty without at least a seven percent GDP growth.

Referring to the dismal situation in schools, colleges and hospitals in the rural areas, Saifur mentioned that a huge chunk of national resources is spent every year to maintain these institutions, but these are not rendering the required services.

64 dead, 22 still missing after China mine blast

Sixty-four workers died and 22 others are missing and feared dead after a gas explosion ripped through a coal mine in eastern China, officials said yesterday.

"Sixty-four miners have been confirmed dead and their dead bodies have been found," a mine official surnamed Zhang told AFP from the scene of the blast in Anhui province.

He said there were 22 still missing from the accident, which happened 590 meters (1,947 feet) deep in the mine shaft, and that rescue work was ongoing.

"The chances of their survival is not very good," Zhang said.

"So far 17 rescue workers have been sent into the mine. They have been divided into two groups and they are trying to find those still missing."

"It was a gas explosion. Twenty-seven people have been rescued and 10 are in hospital."

The blast struck the registered Luling coal mine in Anhui province's Huaihai city shortly after 4:00 pm (0800 GMT) Tuesday.

Rescue workers were feverishly trying to find those trapped in the mine shaft, said family members and friends of employees who were held.

"They haven't been home for two days," said a man in his 20s, whose father and uncles work in the mine, but were not in the same shaft at the time of the accident.

The man and other residents reached by phone Wednesday said the mine, located near Suzhou city, was the largest in the Huaihai Coal Mine Administration.

It employs 7,000 workers, an official in the company-run union said.

The young man, who declined to give his name, said his family members had worked in the mine for years, beginning when it was built some 35 years ago.

Few major accidents have happened in the state-run mine.

"It's a safe mine, but mines always have some accidents happening," said a friend of a mine office employee. She said that while accidents were few and far between they had happened in the past and a few people had died.

Many family members of the miners were at the scene, waiting at the gate of the mine hoping their relatives would be found alive, said another employee's friend.

Chinese mines, many illegally operated, have an appalling safety record with thousands of deaths reported last year in explosions, floods and cave-ins.

FBI hunts for Saudi bombers

Death toll now 34

At least 34 people, including a Briton and an Irish national, were killed in suicide car bombings that devastated three expatriate compounds in Riyadh, the Saudi interior ministry said Wednesday.

The updated figures carried by the official SPA news agency added five more to a previous Saudi toll -- one Briton, one Irish national, an Australian of Lebanese origin, a third Filipino and one unidentified corpse.

Saudi Arabia has offered no explanation for conflicting death tolls.

In Washington, State Department officials contradicted themselves, giving figures ranging as high as 50 dead after announcing a

preliminary toll of 91, which Vice President Dick Cheney cited. Up to 12 Americans had died, they said.

FBI agents meanwhile are heading to join Saudi troops hunting for suspects who Riyadh has vowed will be sorry for masterminding triple suicide bombings.

Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Saud Al-Faisal promised on US morning television on Wednesday to find those behind the suicide bombings in Riyadh which killed at least seven Americans and has been blamed on al Qaeda by the United States.

The Monday night blasts gutted housing complexes for foreigners in what was the first major attack on
