

BSF pushes in 62 through Panchagarh border

UNB, Atoori (Panchagarh)

BSF pushed in 62 Indian Muslims through different borders of Atoori upazila on Friday night.

All but four of them have fled to different places of the district.

The four held from the district town were pushed back by BDR yesterday. They are Abdul Kadir, 32, Yusuf Ali, 45, Sekander alias Seken, 62, and his wife Sahida Begum. They had 580 Indian rupees with them.

Before being pushed back Seken and Sahida told newsmen that they were residents of Jamuna Pusta slum of Delhi. Police raided the area on the night of May 19 and picked them up along with some others.

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Algeria quake toll edges towards 2,000

The known casualty toll from Algeria's earthquake has risen to at least 1,875 dead and 8,081 injured, the interior ministry said Saturday as the prime minister warned that the final toll could be much higher.

"We have to be realistic...I prefer to be honest with our compatriots," Prime Minister Ahmed Ouyahia said on radio as rescuers continued to hunt for survivors from under collapsed buildings. "Unfortunately, we will still find quite a number of people under the rubble."

Ouyahia said he feared the death toll could be particularly high because at the time of the quake families had been gathered in their homes at dinner time just when a football match was in progress.

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Acquitted criminals throw acid again

A gang of criminals, recently acquitted by a court in an acid throwing case, repeated the crime on Anowara Begum, 32, at Mukhtijoddha Colony in the Hill View residential area under Panchlaish Police Station on Friday night.

Anowara Begum, mother of four children, was rushed to Chittagong Medical College Hospital (CMCH).

She was in critical condition with burn injuries in the face, shoulders, chest, throat and hands, according to hospital sources.

According to police, the incident occurred at around 9:00pm on Friday when Anowara went to get water from a tube-well. A gang of five, led allegedly by Moqbul, tied the victim's hands and threw

acid on her.

Police arrested prime accused Moqbul from Segun Bagan area under the Khulshi Police Station the same night.

Moqbul and his gang of 10 criminals were accused of throwing acid on 12-year-old Baby Akhtar who succumbed to her injuries on October 7 last year.

They were acquitted of charges on March 30.

Baby was the daughter of Humayun Kabir, one of Anowara's neighbours.

Police hinted that land dispute between Moqbul and Humayun Kabir might be the reason behind such repeated incidents.

A case was filed with the Panchlaish Police Station accusing Moqbul, his son Ismail and brother-in-law Mannan of the crime.

Girl foils 'kidnap' attempt, helps rescue 3 others
'School teacher' arrested

"I had no ill motive behind taking the girls. I like to take care of children," she told journalists.

China allows free access of 59 items

China has agreed to provide duty and quota-free access to 59 items, according to commerce ministry sources.

Beijing recently made the offer following the first meeting of the third-round of negotiations under the Bangkok Agreement for preferential trade in March.

The items to get the privilege would be finalised at the next round of meeting in August.


During the negotiation in Bangkok, Bangladesh sought duty-free access of 129 items to China, 109 to South Korea, 89 to India and 124 to Sri Lanka. The other countries are yet to positively respond, ministry sources said.

Bangladesh, India, Laos, South Korea and Sri Lanka -- for preferential trade. China joined it in January last.

Earlier, China allowed Bangladesh 20 to 50 per cent duty reductions on 739 items. During the visit of Chinese Prime Minister Zhu Rongji in January last, Beijing agreed to offer zero tariff access for jute and jute goods.

According to the agreement, Bangladesh also allowed duty reductions on several items from the member countries. Ten to fifty per cent

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Nazrul's 104th birthday today

The country celebrates the 104th birth anniversary of national poet Kazi Nazrul Islam today.

Different organisations have taken preparations to celebrate the occasion. A three-day national programme begins today at Darirampur, Trishal of Mymensingh. Prime Minister Khaleda Zia is expected to inaugurate the programme.

The poet was born on May 24, 1899, at the village Churulia of Burdhaman district in West Bengal.

Nazrul started his career as a folk poet but rose to the eminence of an uncompromising dissenter against the colonial British rulers. He was also a great source of inspiration.

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PM to pacify alliance leaders over reshuffle

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia will hold a meeting with the top leaders of the four-party alliance soon to erase the dissatisfaction stemming from the cabinet reshuffle on Thursday and non-accommodation of some coalition partners in the cabinet.

Many leaders of the alliance that brings together Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP), Jamaat-e-Islami Bangladesh, Bangladesh Jatiya Party (BJP) and Islami Oikya Jote (IOJ) believe the changes are 'meaningless' and may not bring about anything positive.

Others, however, see the changes in the council of ministers as a much-needed shot in the arm of the alliance.

The major revamp caught all the six fired ministers and state ministers, apart from Sadeque Hossain Khoka, off guard. They termed their removal as 'sheer disgrace'.

Besides, disillusion crept in Bangladesh Jatiya Party (BJP) and

Islami Oikya Jote (IOJ), two alliance partners, over non-inclusion of any of their leaders in the cabinet.

Although the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) committed to sharing power with all of its coalition partners, it is yet to deliver the pledge to the small parties.

Sources said Jamaat leaders Mohammad Kamaruzzaman and Abdul Qader Mollah met Khaleda at about 1:30pm and held an hour-long meeting.

They told the PM that the party rank and file took Nizami's transfer to the industries ministry from
