13 get life term in Adv. Mondol murder case

Two persons have been sentenced to death and 13 to life term in the sensational Advocate Habibur Rahman Mondol Murder case.

Those to die are Saidur Rahman Shahid, Commissioner of Ward-83 the Dhaka City Corporation, and 'Kala' Jahangir, a listed criminal.

Shahid is in jail custody while Jahangir is absconding.

Three others have been acquitted of the charges.

Shahed Noor Uddin, Judge of the Speedy Trial Tribunal 1, Dhaka Division, delivered the 36-page judgement yesterday in a jam-packed courtroom amid heavy security. The tribunal completed hearing of the case in 135 working days.

Those awarded life term are Tonai Mollah, Nurul Haq, Abdul Malek Apu alias Chakma Apu, 'Pichchi' Hannan alias Hannan, 'Kala' Sharif, Mohammad Rahman, Sentu, Akhter Hossain, Alamgir alias 'Bhezal' Alamgir, Kachi, Biplob and 'Dakat' Shahid.

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Shops, house robbed in Ctg again

In yet another massive robbery, six shops and a house was looted at Banskhali in the district yesterday.

Valuables said to be worth around Tk 3 lakh were looted and a shootout between the miscreants and police also occurred.

Police said a group of some 12 robbers looted goods worth around Tk 1.5 lakh from six shops at a market place under Kalipur Union Parishad around 12:30am.

With the inmates at gun-point, they later attacked a house and looted valuables reportedly worth another Tk 1.5 lakh.

Robbers also exchanged fire with patrol police whom they encountered at Palgram at around 2:00am.

Free floats the exchange rate

Economists, bankers allay fear of costlier dollar

The Bangladesh Bank (BB) yesterday set foreign currency exchange rate band free from any regulation.

From Saturday, banks will fix buying and selling rates of dollar and other currencies according to supply and demand situation under the free-float system and there will be no band on the rates.

The BB however will keep an eye on the market and intervene in money market and US dollar selling and purchase transactions whenever needed. The BB will also deal with banks on dollar on a case-to-case basis.

The central bank held a meeting with the managing directors of all the four nationalised commercial banks (NCBs), who will have a major role in managing the free-float regime.

Meantime, economists and bankers have

welcomed the deregulation of the exchange rate and said this would enhance the government's commitment to the market. They also allayed any apprehension of hike in dollar rate.

Some bankers said the dollar rate may even fall if the government can properly manage foreign aid to increase foreign currency inflow. They said a sound macro-economic fundamental is also a prerequisite.

"We have already got almost a decade of experience of current account convertibility of taka," said Prof Wahiduddin Mahmud of Dhaka University. "Under the system, there are no restrictions on buying foreign exchange for import and other legitimate current account transactions."

"The Bangladesh Bank therefore had to fix the exchange rate taking into account the supply-demand situation in the forex market as reflected

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Businessman gunned down on 3rd attempt

Bodyguard, another man also killed

A wealthy businessman who survived two previous attempts on his life was gunned down along with his bodyguard yesterday at Palashpur in Shyampur of the city.

Police said the killing of businessman Qaiyum Khan was a sequel to disputes over land. Khan had purchased some lands in the locality and it led to rivalry with some locals.

Khan was supervising construction work at a market yesterday afternoon. On receiving a call on his cell phone, he along with his friend Kamal and bodyguard

Mohammad Ali went behind the market.

Five youngsters were waiting there. They shot him in the head. At this, his bodyguard started running away but the gang caught him, snatched his shotgun and sprayed bullet on Khan again.

Mohammad Ali was also shot. Kamal however escaped unhurt.

Relatives and employees of the businessman rushed both to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where doctors declared Khan dead. The body was sent to the hospital morgue for autopsy.

Ali was shifted to the Chest

Diseases Hospital where he died in the evening. His body was also sent to DMCH morgue.

Family members said Khan had left for his business office at about 10:30 in the morning. They suspected he was killed by the same people who had attacked him twice in the past.

On March 23 this year, armed elements shot Khan in Paltan area. He was first admitted to the DMCH and then shifted to a private clinic at Dhanmondi upon threats from some unidentified people. The attack followed his alleged involvement in occupying a market in

British Prime Minister Tony Blair yesterday became the first Western leader to visit post-war Iraq, lauding his troops in a former palace of Saddam Hussein for helping create "a defining moment" in history.

Blair, who gambled his premiership to back the American-led invasion of Iraq, flew to the southern city of Basra in the cockpit of a missile-carrying RAF Hercules before moving around in a helicopter protected by a machine-gunner.

Cruel sun claims 5 lives in Pabna

Cry for water, power peaks

Power and water proved elusive, but the sun did not. And the mercury was aiming to hit a new height in the current sizzling summer.

About 300 people succumbed to diarrhoea in Dhaka yesterday as the blistering heat wave continued to smother Bangladesh.

At least five people died in Pabna and two in Rajshahi in the last three days while hundreds hospitalised across the country in the hostile summer that sent mercury to 41.4 degrees Celsius in Rajshahi on Wednesday.

The Pabna victims are Shah Ali, 35, of Harirampur, Rafiq Ali, 65, of

Ratanpur, Sukhjan, 90, of Goralia, Chhulia Begum, 60, of Majpara, and Noor Hossain, 50, of Dublin. In Rajshahi, Abdul Jabbar, 42, and Hazrat Ali, 38, of Bilmara at Bhagmara died while working on the field on Tuesday.

The sizzler, twinned with humidity and frequent brownouts, made life miserable in Dhaka and elsewhere yesterday.

In the capital, the temperature hovered between 35.7 and 25 degrees Celsius through most of the day.
