Bangladesh termed the Amnesty International's report one-sided and said that it failed to reflect ground realities of the country.

The annual report of the London-based human rights watchdog, Amnesty International, was released last Wednesday

In its report, the Amnesty

International said Bangladeshi authorities have frequently resorted to torture and have failed to investigate dozens of reported custodial deaths.

Amnesty said 38 people reportedly died after torture in army custody and eight after torture in police custody.

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## WB team due June 1 to see urban transport project

A World Bank (WB) team from Washington will visit Dhaka on June 1 to review the Dhaka Urban Transport Project (DUTP), sources said.

Task Manager of the bank Steyne Lunduby and Senior Transport Economist Navid Qureshi will lead the delegation.

During their month-long stay, they will hold meetings with the communications ministry and the DUTP.

After the review, the WB will decide whether they are going to fund the second phase of the DUTP. The first phase ends in June next year.

During the review meeting with the WB delegation, the DUTP will propose three new projects -- construction of a new road network for the capital, construction of two bridges over the Buriganga river and an integrated traffic management plan.

But DUTP officials are sceptical about the meeting as a large segment of the tasks under the project

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## Dhaka hands over relief for Iraq

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia sanctioned a relief of Taka 12 crore for Iraqis.

The second consignment would be sent shortly, he said.

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## HSC, Alim, Fazil exams

# Over 1,000 expelled on first day

More than 1,000 examinees were expelled for cheating on the first day of the Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC), Alim and Fazil examinations.

The seven general education boards expelled about 770 examinees during the English first paper examinations, and over 300 examinees were expelled from the Madrassah Education Board centres.

Meanwhile, a teacher was manhandled by two examinees at the Dumki Janata College exami-

nation centre under the Barisal Education Board, as he punished them for cheating.

Last year, over 7,000 examinees were expelled on the first day of the HSC examinations, which suggests that cheating curved down this year thanks to government measures to check unfair means in examinations.

The education ministry has taken up several counter-cheating measures like summary trial court, fine, restriction on people's movement and installation of video

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## 'Criminal' David held at Gopibagh

# World Heritage Site hostage to caretakers

## Renovators barred from Khan Jahan Ali Mazar

SOHEL ISLAM back from Bagerhat

Religious caretakers are preventing the Department of Archaeology from carrying out renovations to historic Khan Jahan Ali Mazar and Mosque at Bagerhat and threatening to do it themselves.

Only the rules and edicts of the

caretakers, locally known as khadem, reign supreme at the shrine, one of three world heritage sites in Bangladesh, declared by the UNESCO in 1985.

Ulugh Khan Jahan alias Khan Jahan Ali died on October 25, 1429, but it is not clear when the mazar was built.

The khadem had also extended the mosque without authority, marring the relic's aesthetic.

They covered the mosque's floors and walls with bathroom tiles and established a graveyard for family members on its southern side before the Bagerhat district a d m i n

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New structures have been erected at the Khan Jahan Ali Mazar and Mosque in Bagerhat, destroying the World Heritage Site's originality.
