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in the aftermath of terror attacks in the United States.

Pakistan's cricketing woes further compounded when the West Indies, in February, and then Australia, in October last year, refused to tour Pakistan and their series were played at neutral venues.

"We are delighted with the news because it would open doors for international teams to resume tours to Pakistan more regularly," said PCB chief executive Ramiz Raja.

Raja on Wednesday said that international cricket's return to Pakistan will get a real boom if two one-day games, one each in Pakistan and India, take place.

The Board of Control for Cricket in India has sought their government's approval to play the games in order to restore bilateral cricketing ties severed since 2000 amid tensions over the disputed region of Kashmir.

Bangladesh will tour Pakistan from mid-August and play three Tests and five one-day games followed by South Africa's three Tests and three one-dayers.

"We are already hosting Bangladesh and South Africa between August and October but the tour by the Black Caps will be significant as they were the last team to come to Pakistan before their tour was curtailed because of reasons beyond PCB's control," Rajasaid.

Pakistan had demanded monetary compensation from the International Cricket Council (ICC) during its meetings in London last year and then in Johannesburg, South Africa in March this year.

NZC had agreed to compensate Pakistan by playing either a Test or five one-day games.

"New Zealand's acceptance also indicates that we were not only able to convince NZC but also the ICC that Pakistan was a safe country to play cricket," he said.

# Another Agassi escape act

Andre Agassi performed a French Open escape on Wednesday that escapologist extraordinaire Harry Houdini would have been proud of.

The eight-time Grand Slam champion and one of only five men to win all four Grand Slam singles titles and the only one to do so on three different surfaces dived with death in winning the Roland Garros crown in 1999, coming from two sets down to see off Ukrainian Andre Medvedev.

On Wednesday, he went close to the edge once more, edging out Croatian teen Mario Ancic 5-7, 1-6, 6-4, 6-2, 7-5 to reach the third round of the men's singles.

The 33-year-old Las Vegas's immediate prize is a meeting with Belgian 26th seed Xavier Malisse to determine who bags a place in the last 16, the stage at which the wheat becomes separated from the chaff.

"Experience has taught me that every point needs to be the most important point," said Agassi, recognising this was just the kind of match to show him where his game is after he came here with almost no preparation on European clay, having lost in the opening round in Rome and missed Hamburg and Monte Carlo.

"In tennis you have to finish off the match something is always going to change psychologically as you get closer to the finish line.

"But that's what tennis is all about. You have to dig deep."

Agassi, who already has the Australian Open title under his belt this season and landed his 763rd victory to take him one ahead of long-time rival Pete Sampras revealed that standing on the court at Roland Garros inspires him more than any other venue.

"This particular tournament is the one that has made my career so full," said Agassi, who aged just 18 went all the way to the semi-finals before losing another five-setter to Swedish champion Mats Wilander.

He then lost the finals here in

1990 and 1991 to undergo what he termed the "devastation and disappointment of two lost finals."

But the love affair with the event was finally consummated with his win over Medvedev.

"I'll never forget what that meant to me," he explained.

After giving a two-set and a break start to a man 14 years his junior Agassi showed that class, not age, is what matters.

"I feel like I have a new life right now. It's not easy out there under any circumstances let alone when you're in a tussle, a dogfight."

On the double fault which almost derailed him as he failed to serve out at 5-3 in the decider Agassi was unapologetic.

"I always tend to stay aggressive no matter where the nerves are.

"When you double fault you regret the decision. I might have rushed a little bit. I managed to settle down and still get it done."

As the crowd urged him on by chanting his name and indulging in repeated Mexican waves, Agassi was almost in a world of his own.

"I didn't hear anything. I was a bit distracted with what was going on on the court."

But, paying tribute to "some of the most enthusiastic fans in the world" he said the feeling had been just like four years ago.

"You play for those moments, the challenge of responding to those moments.

"I've gone into Slams not feeling so good and vice versa. You have to find a way when it matters the most.

"I hope the story was that this was the match I needed to get through."

Ancic, who hails from Split, the home town of former Wimbledon champion Goran Ivanisevic, ended up with his shirt and shorts caked in the red clay after leaping around, Boris Becker-style, to stave off the inevitable.

But he enjoyed the experience, even in defeat.

"The crowd was unbelievable. Everything was perfect except I lost," he said.

Lindsay Davenport's recent marriage has caused some consternation for umpires at the French Open on whether she should be referred to as a madame or the more youthful and single made-moiselle.

She even felt obliged to discuss the matter with the judge in charge of her 7-5, 6-1 second round defeat of Uzbekistan's Iroda Tulyaganova.

"I was just curious, they've been calling me a few different names here," said the 26-year-old American who married long-time companion John Leach on a Hawaii beach last month, becoming one of the very few wives active on the WTA circuit.

"It was a question of what the appropriate title for myself is. They've said madame, they've said mademoiselle.

"I was asking her just didn't know. She was very nice about it."

Davenport said she had no particular preference but reckoned that as she is not using her married name in the world of tennis, made-moiselle might be more appropriate.

And asked if she had any intentions of using Leach or Davenport-Leach or some other combination, she replied firmly: "I'm staying Davenport."

# Indo-Pak collapse

Australia beat India 2-0 here Thursday to march into Sunday's tri-nations challenge series final as Australia A managed a shock 5-3 win over Pakistan, leaving Pakistan facing an uphill battle.

An on-form Australia will be a strong favorite in the decider. They already whipped Pakistan 3-0 in the opening encounter of the contest a day earlier.

Australia began brightly against India, who finished fourth at last year's Champions' Trophy tournament, with striker Tristram Woodhouse poaching a goal in the third minute.

The 28-year-old pounced on a favourable rebound from Indian goalkeeper Devesh Chauhan to score his second goal in international company.

The visitors hotly disputed the goal, believing the ball went over the backline beforehand, but the goal stood.

Australia were unable to mount many more attacking raids for the rest of the first half.

With Australia failing to control the midfield, India threatened to equalise through one of their many penetrating counter-attacks.

Only fine work by goalkeeper Mick Hickman foiled strikers Prabjot Singh and Gagan Ajit Singh, ensuring Australia led 1-0 at halftime.

Early in the second half, Australian midfielder Brent Livermore was given plenty of space to create a goal in the 44th minute.

His pass to Woodhouse was deflected past Chauhan, with Michael McCann knocking the ball over the line.

India pressed harder in the latter parts of the match, but failed to make an impact on the scoreboard.

The four-team competition is an important lead-up event to August's Champions' Trophy in the Netherlands and next year's Olympics in Athens.

In Thursday's second game, Australia A striker Andrew Smith opened the scoring in the 12th minute before Adam Commens' spectacular diving effort for the second, two minutes later.

But Pakistan's Ghazanfar Ali clinically converted from a penalty corner in the 15th minute before teenager Steven Boyce added Australia A's third shortly after to make it 3-1.

Ali again found a path through the secondary side's penalty corner defence in the 29th minute to reduce the deficit before the tourists were again exposed before the break.

Lucas Judge slipped behind goalkeeper Ahmed Alam to follow-up Robbie Hammond's powerful drive and tap home from close range in the 33rd minute, making it 4-2 for Australia's second string side at the interval.

## Serena the perfectionist

Defending champion Serena Williams, chasing a fifth Grand Slam title on the trot, said there was still plenty of room for improvement after racing into the third round of the French Open on Wednesday with a 6-3, 6-2 win in 1hr 07min over Marie-Gaiane Mikaelian of Switzerland.

The top seed next meets experienced Austrian Barbara Schett, who outlasted last year's semi-finalist Clarisa Fernandez of Argentina 6-4, 5-7, 6-1 for a place in the final 16.

Two years ago, Schett dumped Venus Williams in the opening round.

Serena has only lost twice all season to Belgium's Justine Henin-Hardenne in the Chareston final and to Amelie Mauresmo of France in the Rome Masters semi-final.

But she believes she has totted up crowns this year at the Australian Open, the Paris indoors and at Miami without pushing herself as hard as she would like.

"I never really play at 100 per cent. I'm more or less used to winning when I'm not doing my best.

"There have definitely been days when I've been off and able to win. I think it's frustrating. I'm never satisfied with the way I play there's always something I'd like to improve," said the 21-year-old who replaced Venus last year as world number one by reaching the Wimbledon final where she promptly beat her elder sibling.

"I just set my goals high. I just try to stay where I am on top.
