

Trade ministers from LDCs meet today

Free access of goods high on agenda

Trade ministers and officials from 38 least developed countries (LDCs) begin a three-day meeting in Dhaka today to set common agenda in the run-up to the WTO ministerial meeting in Mexico in September.

Among the LDCs, 23 are represented by their ministers to make it their largest such gathering in 10 years, officials said. Prime Minister Khaleda Zia will address the closing session of the meeting that will make a "Dhaka Declaration".

Market-related issues such as duty- and quota-free access of goods from the LDCs to developed

countries will figure high on the agenda at the meeting, beginning at 9.00am at Sonargaon Hotel.

"The meeting is expected to forge a common position of LDCs on the WTO (World Trade Organisation) issues and international trades," Commerce Minister Amir Khasru Mahmud Chowdhury told The Daily Star.

The LDCs will call for lifting of restrictions on temporary movement of 'natural persons', moratorium on imposition of anti-dumping and countervailing duties on products from the LDCs by developed countries.

'Godfathers' resurfacing to grab AL party posts

The prospect of a political comeback by some Awami League (AL) leaders having 'godfather' image is now haunting the main opposition party as it plans to restructure some of its key units prior to launching a movement for snap polls.

Twenty months after its debacle in the October 2001 parliamentary polls, the AL is going to form fresh

committees of some of the most important units through holding councils next month. These include Dhaka city, Narayanganj city (organisational) and Narayanganj district units.

Against this backdrop, the 'godfathers' are now surfacing again to clinch vital party positions.

Senior AL leaders told The Daily Star yesterday that party chief Sheikh Hasina, who is now on a trip to US and Europe, had already made it clear that she wanted to see 'clean people' in the leadership of party units.

But the reality, party sources noted, is that people having highly dubious political past are now out to manipulate the councils of Dhaka city, Narayanganj city and district units of the party in their favour.

Shamim Osman, an ex-MP and AL leader of Narayanganj, who left the country after the AL's polls debacle and remained quiet politically all these months, is now trying to make room in party politics there.

Last week, Osman gave an interview to the local press by making phone calls from New York and some of his old associates have become active again to launch a campaign so that he gets a position in the new party committee in Narayanganj.

Similarly, former minister and incumbent General Secretary of Dhaka city AL Mofazzal Hossain Chowdhury Maya, who had earned condemnation from party men and others for alleged criminal activities of his son Dipu, is now desperately trying to secure the top post of the city unit.

Experts said the chemical

with the brand name Ethrel 39SL contains chloroethoxyphosphonic acid and is a 'plant growth regulator'. If swallowed, it can cause 'chemical poisoning' with no antidote.

Education budget curves down, standard nosedives

Education budget has been on a decreasing curve since independence of Bangladesh.

The allocation for education slid to 16 per cent in the current fiscal 2002-03, down from 21.14 per cent in 1972-73.

Education accounted for Tk 6,871 crore out of Tk 44,854 crore in the current fiscal. But the allocation was reduced substantially in the revised annual development programme, sources said.

However, the allocation for the fiscal 2002-03 was a little higher than 15.71 per cent in 2001-02.

In the fiscal 1972-73, the allocation for education was Tk 45.06 crore (21.14 per cent) out of Tk 213.11 crore.

Teachers' salaries and infrastructure gobble up a big chunk of educational spending and the expenditure is not enough to raise the standard of education, say experts.

The sector had the lowest allo-

cation of 11.13 per cent or Tk 1,494.23 crore out of Tk 13,431.24 crore in the fiscal 1990-91 during the rule of HM Ershad.

The budget for education was 12.76 per cent or Tk 98.21 crore out of Tk 769.31 crore in the fiscal 1976-77 during the rule of late president Ziaur Rahman.

Although the government claims to allocate the highest budget to education, the part of the amount is spent on religious affairs -- infrastructure for mosques and mosque- and temple-based librari-

ies, experts said.

Moreover, a huge amount of funds is channelled to defence education, depriving the mainstream education, said Professor Anu Muhammad of the economics department, Jahangirnagar University.

The allocation did not increase in comparison with the number of students and institutions, says another expert. Although the

Kushiara bridge still incomplete, ferries also out of order

Long-distance travellers who pinned hopes on the Kushiara bridge in Fenchuganj are frustrated by the slow pace of construction.

Construction of two vertical pillars and girders of the Tk 31 crore bridge on the Kushiara river has not yet been completed.

The bridge is vital for the Sylhet-Fenchuganj-Moulvibazar road. Communication through the road has turned even more difficult, with only one small ferry plying the Kushiara river for the last four days.

Three out of four age-old ferries on the river went out of order, leaving the smallest ferry operating at risk. Loaded trucks and buses get

Fresh bid to push in 42 foiled in Panchagarh

The Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) and frontier villagers foiled a push-in attempt by the Indian Border Security Force (BSF) on Atoori border in Panchagarh district in the early hours of Thursday.

Forty-two Bangla-speaking Indian citizens, including women and children, were pushed back into India within 40 minutes of their expulsion by the BSF into Bangladesh territory through the Ramzanpara border, sources at the BDR's Giragaon Company headquarters said yesterday.

People in the border areas are now deeply apprehensive that the BSF will start staging the inhuman push-in drama across the north-western border like it did during January through March this year.

Hundreds of Bangla-speaking Indians have reportedly been assembled in small and large groups in the bordering Indian villages at different points along the northwestern border.

The BSF are frequently moving these groups from one point to another especially at the dead of night in an effort to push them into Bangladesh, residents of the frontier areas alleged.

A similar BSF attempt to push in 62 Indian nationals through the same border point was foiled last Saturday, BDR sources and frontier people of Panchagarh border areas said.

JCD, Jubo Dal men attack AL office in Barisal

Activists of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) and Jubo Dal attacked the district Awami League (AL) office yesterday, leaving a party leader and four activists injured.

Sources said about 100 JCD and Jubo Dal workers made the attack when a party meeting of was going on. Those injured included Organising Secretary of the district AL Talukder Mohammad Yunus.

Kotwali police rescued Yunus and took him to the police station.

AL sources alleged that Yunus was arrested under pressure from local BNP leaders.

The officer-in-charge of the Kotwali Police Station however declined to say whether he was arrested.

AL leader shot in N'ganj

An Awami League leader was shot and critically injured by unidentified gunmen at Mandanpur under Bandar police station here Thursday night.

The victim Jasimuddin, 40, secretary for agricultural affairs of Bandar thana unit of Awami League, was admitted to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital with a bullet in the chest.

Sources said Jasimuddin was waiting for a Dhaka-bound bus in Mandanpur bus stand on the Dhaka-Chittagong highway at about 7:30pm when a group of men in an autorickshaw fired three rounds of bullets on him.
