White House now points at CIA

The White House pointed the finger at the US Central Intelligence Agency yesterday over a false accusation that Iraq tried to buy African uranium.

President George W Bush said his charge that Iraq tried to buy nuclear material from Africa was approved by his "intelligence services," and US national security adviser Condoleezza Rice said the specific wording was approved by the CIA.

But Rice said the White House "absolutely" had confidence in CIA

Food aid on wane, import on rise

Food aid and import swung opposite ways in the just ended fiscal 2002-03, with the aid plummeting to a two-decade low and import surging to a post-1998 peak.

Quoting government statistics, food officials said the aid totalled 2.6 lakh tonnes in the last fiscal year, the lowest since 1981-82.

Food import surpassed 30 lakh tonnes in the last fiscal year, the second highest in the last two decades. Only in fiscal 1998-99, 42 lakh tonnes were imported.

In fiscal 2001-02, food aid from bilateral and multilateral donors stood at five lakh tonnes and food import at 12 lakh tonnes.

Officials said the decline in food aid in the last fiscal year was mainly due to a drastic fall in food assistance from the US because of its 'other commitments'. Only 54,970 tonnes of US food were received last year, down from 1.7 lakh

The USAID on April 10 said droughts in southern and eastern Africa continued to attract widespread donor attention and considerable food aid.

In the last fiscal year, Bangladesh received relatively less food aid also from the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP) -- 1.18 lakh tonnes compared to 1.72 lakh

Partial suspension on HPSP funds withdrawn

World Bank and pool financing development partners have withdrawn the partial suspension on their pooled funds for the Health and Population Sector Programme (HPSP), said a World Bank press release here yesterday.

The fund suspension, imposed on May 2, 2003 due to projectrelated default, particularly in the areas of sectoral reforms, has been withdrawn with effect from July 4, 2003 based on their concurrence on the government's proposed alternative action plan for the health and population sector, said

the release. It said the government has

recently prepared a comprehensive plan of action to carry forward an alternative reform agenda to achieve the intended objectives for the health and population sector.

The bank and other pool financiers -- the European Commission, the Netherlands, SIDA and DFID -have welcomed the alternative plan as a good basis to sustain external support to the sector.

The public sector financing accounts for just a third of the country's total health expenditure with the non-public sector playing an increasingly important role in the provision of health service.

Pirates prey on fishing boats in Meghna, Bay

Pirates in the Meghna river and its estuary have made fishing boats and trawlers their regular targets of extortion. They are now issuing 'security cards' against tolls extorted from the fishermen.

Non-compliance with the 'card system' invites great trouble for the fishermen. Pirates take away belongings and fishing boats from non-paying parties at gunpoint. At least 12 such incidents of piracy took place in the last week.

According to the fishermen and local people, at least five gangs of pirates have established control over vast areas in the estuarine Meghna and the Bay. They have divided the waters into five zones.

In the past, they used to rob the fishermen of their fishing gears and trawlers and on most occasions left the fishermen unharmed, but the pirates have now changed their

Now a trawler has to obtain a card from one of the five groups on payment of Tk 50,000. The trawler having such a card is 'safe' from all SEE PAGE 11 COL 6
