

## 140 Sadarghat staff withdrawn

Govt to go tough on employees for negligence

The government yesterday decided to act tough against the officials and employees responsible for allowing passenger launches with faulty designs to operate and failing to maintain discipline at Sadarghat river terminal.

All the officials and employees numbering around 140 have been withdrawn from Sadarghat -- the country's biggest launch terminal.

The decision was taken at a high-level meeting yesterday with Shipping Minister Akbar Hossian

in the chair. Shipping Secretary Zulfiqer Haider Chowdhury was also present.

According to sources, there are around 140 officials and employees of the Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) and the Department of Shipping posted to Sadarghat for maintaining discipline at the terminal and looking after river communication related issues.

The withdrawal came following the staff's failure to keep order which caused a number of launch disasters recently, including the capsizing of MV Nasrin-1 on Tuesday last at the confluence of the rivers

Padma, Meghna and Dakatia near Chandpur.

The meeting also formed an inquiry committee headed by a deputy secretary of the ministry to find out the people responsible for allowing the overloaded launch to leave the terminal.

The committee has been asked to

## CIA takes blame for Bush's wrong claim on WMDs

Bush still has confidence in CIA

CIA Director George Tenet is trying to put to rest a burgeoning credibility problem by taking full blame for allowing President Bush to make allegations about Iraq's nuclear weapons programme later found to be false.

In a carefully scripted media culpa, the White House on Friday blamed the CIA for its January misstep and Tenet finished the job hours later with a dramatic statement accepting responsibility.

"I've heard no discussion along those lines," CIA spokesman Mark Mansfield said Friday night when asked whether Tenet might consider resigning. National security adviser Condoleezza Rice, traveling with Bush in Africa, said Tenet still enjoyed the president's confidence.

The current controversy evolves around Bush's assertion in his State of the Union address that Iraq had tried to buy uranium from the

bers of Congress and Democratic presidential hopefuls, that challenged the credibility of the administration's arguments that Iraq was trying to reconstitute its nuclear weapons program before the US invasion in March.

Administration officials said that despite the misstep they did not expect Tenet to resign. He is the lone holdover from the Clinton administration and, while trusted by some conservatives, has enjoyed Bush's confidence.

## DND Dam threatened 2.5 lakh homeless in 15 districts as flood worsens

The raging Sitalakhyा river threatened to submerge houses of about one million people when it overflowed the Dhaka-Narayanganj-Demra (DND) Dam.

Elsewhere, about 2,50,000 people became shelterless as the flood situation worsened.

The Sitalakhyा spilled over the dam at Kadamtali point in Shiddhirganj, swamping the low-lying areas inside the irrigation project.

Gushing floodwaters carried away homes on wetlands in 15 districts, forcing people to flee home.

Over a million of people, who have been marooned, are facing

acute crisis of food, drinking water and medicine.

The Narayanganj district administration has thrown itself into a frenzy of activities to prop up the vulnerable DND Dam, which was leaking over the last four days, with the help of people. Deputy Commissioner SM Harunur Rashid was supervising the protection activities, locals said.

As the irrigation floodgates of the dam were opened to ease pressure, the low-lying areas of Sanargar, Mizmizi, Kaari, Kadamtali and Kalamali went under water immediately.

Panic-stricken villagers shifted to higher ground along with their belongings. Hundreds of locals were trying to save the embankment,

dumping sandbags at weak points till dead of night.

Locals said they informed the

A Bangladesh Navy ship deployed sonar equipment yesterday to trace the overcrowded launch that capsized in the Chandpur confluence of three mighty rivers four days ago.

Rescuers and fishermen retrieved 118 bodies until yesterday following the sinking of MV Nasrin-1 on Tuesday with over 750 passengers on board.

BNS Shaibal arrived in Chandpur at 12:15pm from Chittagong yesterday and immediately swung into action.

## Barrister Ishtiaq passes away

Renowned lawyer and sometime adviser of the caretaker government Barrister Syed Ishtiaq Ahmed died of old-age complications at BIRDEM Hospital in Dhaka yesterday. He was 72.

He left behind wife National Professor Dr Sufia Ahmed, son Justice Dr Syed Refaat Ahmed, daughter Dr Raina Fateh and a host of grandchildren, relatives, friends and well-wishers to mourn his death.

His first namaz-e-janaza will be held at the Supreme Court premises after Zohr prayers and a second janaza will be held at the Azad Mosque at Gulshan in the afternoon. He will be buried at the Banani graveyard.

The condition of Barrister Ishtiaq had been deteriorating since Thursday, a doctor on duty at the Incentive Care Unit (ICU) of the hospital told The Daily Star. Barrister Ishtiaq breathed his last at around 8:45pm.

He was hospitalised when his blood pressure fell on Tuesday. He had been suffering from diabetes, anaemia and encephalopathy.

His pressure was gradually falling and he was on artificial ventilation, doctors added.

Ishtiaq was admitted to the medical ward of BIRDEM and later shifted to the ICU they said.

His body was kept at the Combined Military Hospital, Dhaka.

Born on January 18, 1932 at Gazipur in India, he had his early education at Hili of Dinajpur and Kolkata.

He did his matriculation from Mymensingh Zilla School
