

# Asian, European ministers hope to revive WTO talks

"If the ASEM meeting can send a positive signal to the Cancun meeting, then its contribution will be fully realized," Chinese Assistant Commerce Minister Yi Xiaozhun said.

Delegates agreed that the ASEM economic ministers' meeting would be a opportunity to express commitment to global trade liberalization and iron out differences ahead of the September talks in Mexico.

The thorny issue of agriculture, considered the key to reviving the WTO negotiations, was likely to figure high on the ASEM agenda, with a focus on tariff reductions and cuts in subsidies, delegates said.


"The agricultural sector is going to be a very critical issue in the coming negotiation process," said South Korean Trade Minister Hwang Dooyun. "So at this meeting, of course we will touch upon this issue too."

European delegates said a recent European Union agreement to cut farm subsidies that cost nearly half of all EU spending would be helpful in bridging differences with their Asian counterparts.

"After the political signal the EU has given with respect to agriculture, we have lifted a taboo," said Gaston Van Duyse-Adam, Belgium's ambassador to China, who represented his country's economic minister at the meeting.

"We're coming to zones of agreement more than zones of contention."

"It's one of the last chances to exchange views beforehand," said a European delegate.

## US economy on the mend, others lag: Snow

Treasury Secretary John Snow said Tuesday the US economy was poised for a sharp acceleration in growth but Europe and Japan were lagging.

In a brace of television interviews in New York at the end of a day privately wooing top Wall analysts, the US Treasury chief implored the Bush administration had its economic house in order while key allies had to do more.

"I think the biggest problem we face today on the economic side of things is inadequate world growth rates, particularly the big economies -- Japan and Europe," Snow said on CNN television after predicting "a substantial pickup" in US economic performance for the rest of this year.
