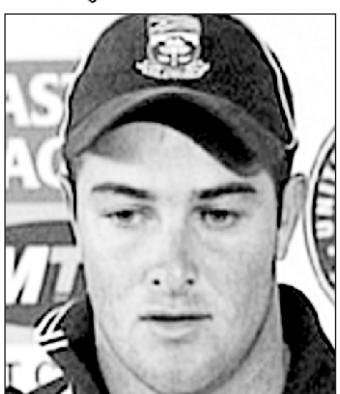

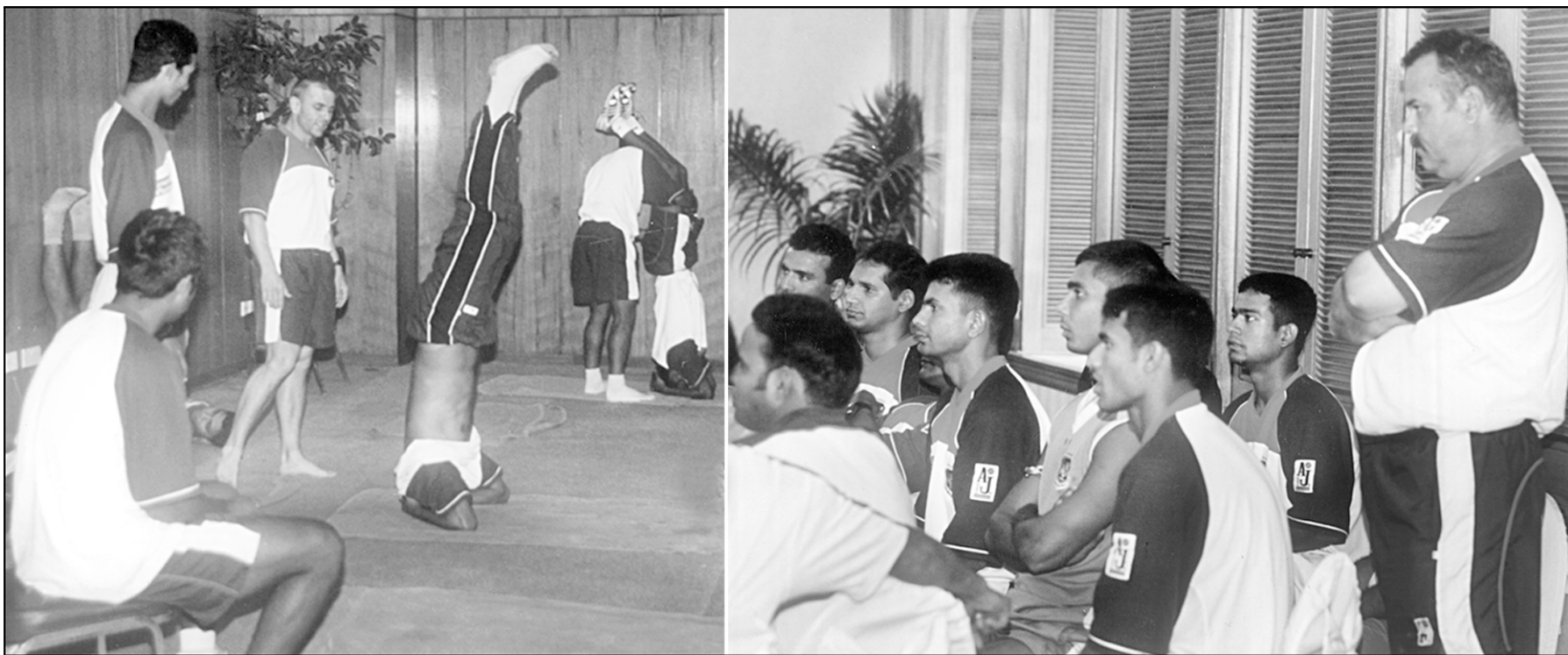

# Whatmore clarifies

Bangladesh coach Dav Whatmore has clarified why certain players were not called up for a short camp before the team leaves for Pakistan to play three Tests and five one-day matches.

Opening batsman Moniruzzaman, off-spinner Fahim Muntasir and wicketkeeper Mohammad Salim were overlooked on Monday when the Bangladesh Cricket Board announced a 22-member preliminary list to attend a five-day camp that started yesterday.

Talking to some journalists, Whatmore said that trio should not be disheartened because they had already proved their ability but more importantly the Sri Lankan-born Australian wanted to assess new players instead.

"They (Moniruzzaman and Fahim) are very much in the running for selection in the coming six months. But I was recommended by the selectors to see a few new faces. And about Salim, well, he's the number two wicketkeeper and so we don't need to see him in training."

All three players were kept as reserves for the tour of Australia.

Of the 22 players who reported to the World Cup-winning coach in the pouring rain, only Naimur Rahman, the former Bangladesh captain, came to the Bangabandhu National Stadium apparently unprepared.

The casually dressed off-spinner before leaving the BNS, reportedly told Whatmore that as he learned of his call-up belatedly, so he was unable to attend before Wednesday.

Seeing that the conditions would make net practice impossible, Whatmore shifted the camp to the

Sonargaon Hotel in the morning. At the five-star hotel's gymnasium, physio John Gloster asked one group of players to stretch while the others watched video footage of the team's performance in Australia.

"If the weather remains the same, we will have some outdoor practice at Maulana Bhasani Hockey Stadium tomorrow morning," said Whatmore.

Asked if the inclement weather would affect the cricketers' form, Whatmore said he is not unduly worried about that prospect as most

of his players were still match-fit because they had been on international duty even last week.

Captain Khaled Mahmud also said that rain would not affect their performance as they have regularly trained in Australia for the last one and a half months. He believed his team would not face any problem adjusting to conditions in Pakistan.

When asked what was his target in the coming series, especially in the one-dayers, Mahmud said that there can be only two results in one-day matches and they would defi-

nitely play for win.

"Our last victory was against Pakistan in the 1999 World Cup. Who knows, if we can motivate ourselves like four years ago, we might win a match or two," said Mahmud who was man-of-the-match in that historic victory at Nottinghamshire.

The new selection committee led by Faruque Ahmed will sit with Whatmore today to finalise the 15-man squad for Pakistan. The Tigers are expected to fly off to Karachi on Saturday night.

## New coach wants Kenya to start from WC

Kenya's new cricket coach Andy Moll is hoping to build on the country's World Cup performance as he sets about helping the team towards their goal of becoming a Test nation.

"The players must all improve in their own individual ways, improve the team and really that's what I'm looking at," Moll, who took over two weeks ago, told reporters at his first training session with players at the Aga Khan Sports Club in Nairobi.

(Former coach) Sandeep Patil and (assistant) Andy Kirsten did a great job getting the team up there, and I'm coming here hopefully to build on that," he said.

Moll, an Englishman who has played for Warwickshire and also coached Free State in South Africa, said he did not feel under pressure following Patil's achievement.

Patil led Kenya to become the first non-Test nation to reach the World Cup Super Six and semi-finals, beating Sri Lanka, Zimbabwe and Bangladesh on the way.

"As far as I'm concerned, that was in the past. They enjoyed it and quite rightly they celebrated it, but now they will only be remembered for what happens in the future," Moll said.

He said he hoped to achieve his goals with the team by bringing in more professionalism, discipline and enjoyment.

"If we can be professional in everything we do, in our preparations, in the way we play the game and if we enjoy ourselves, I think we can achieve our goals," he said.

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## 'Be hungry like the Proteas'

England captain Michael Vaughan wants his team to match South Africa's hunger in the third Test at Trent Bridge starting on Thursday.

The hosts slumped to defeat by an innings and 92 runs last week in Vaughan's first Test in charge, prompting the new skipper to give a blunt assessment of his side.

"All in all, it was a pretty poor performance," he said. "I don't think we were as hungry as them."

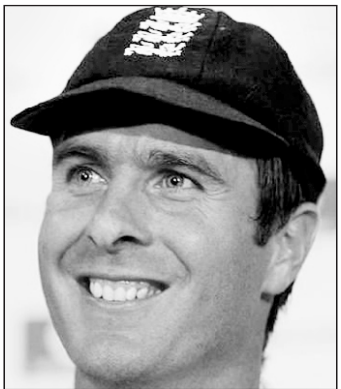
"I can't answer why, it's something that needs to be addressed. I know you have to rock the boat a few times and upset a few players."

Another defeat would leave the hosts 2-0 down in the series with two games to play, but at least Vaughan, handed the captaincy at short notice after Nasser Hussain's resignation following the drawn first Test, has now had time to plan his strategy.

One of his first tasks will be to work out a way of dismissing rival captain Graeme Smith, who has plundered 621 runs in three innings including two double centuries.

The England attack has been unable to contain the tall left-hander, who combines a solid defence with a range of clinical strokes, predominantly through the leg side.

James Kirtley is likely to be handed his debut in place of the retired Darren Gough, joining forces

England's batsmen have also struggled, with Vaughan's 156 at Edgbaston and Andrew Flintoff's defiant 142 in a losing cause at Lord's the only two innings of substance.

# Bankers in Super Five

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# Karachi Test at stake

Karachi's cricket authority challenged in court Tuesday a Pakistan Cricket Board decision to withdraw its rights to host Tests and one-day matches, putting next week's Test against Bangladesh in jeopardy.

The Karachi City Cricket Association (KCCA) filed the suit in the Sindh High Court, KCCA lawyer Arshad Tayyab Ali said. It was due to be heard on August 15.

The action challenged a Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) decision last month to set up provincial cricket associations to organise cricket matches at district level, effectively ending the KCCA's rights to host Tests and one-day games.

The PCB also announced that the newly formed Sindh Cricket Association (SCA) would host a Test against Bangladesh in Karachi due to start on August 20.

KCCA has refused to accept the decision saying the formation of SCA was "unconstitutional". Ali described the board's move as "an unjust action against the KCCA".

If the court issues an injunction order on the KCCA petition, the PCB cricket schedule and the Bangladesh Test could be jeopardised.

"We had no other option but to go to the court as our last resort and would still not want to disrupt the Test match," KCCA secretary Sirajul Islam Bukhari told this news agency.

PCB spokesman Samiul Hasan expressed dismay over KCCA's action.

"It is disappointing and on the eve of a hectic home season we should have spent our energies on organising the Test," Hasan told AFP.

However he played down the matter, saying that "at the moment there is no threat to the Test match."

Pakistan is due to hosts South Africa for three Tests and as many one-day games after the series against Bangladesh.

# Nasser rebukes critics

Former England captain Nasser Hussain has described criticism of his approach to the Lord's Test against South Africa as "absolute drive".

Hussain shocked the nation by resigning three days before the game, with one-day skipper Michael Vaughan stepping up to fill the gap.

He was involved in a verbal altercation with South African skipper Graeme Smith during the game and questions were asked about his general on-field demeanour.

"Every time I've put on an England shirt on, I've given it my absolute utmost for the country and I will carry on doing that for as long as England want me," Hussain told the British Broadcasting Corp.

"I'll always be an ear there for Vaughan, for Fletch [Duncan Fletcher], for any young player as you saw when someone got stuck into Jimmy Anderson, I was there for him because I believe young players need that backing."

"I've done that for James Foster in the past and I'll do it with any young player in the future. But the

last thing Vaughan needed on his first game in charge was me going round telling people what to do and where to bowl."

"The bottom line for me is that there's only one important goal and that's England getting back into this series and the England team doing well."

"Any talk about me being quiet or

failing to support the county game by allowing England players more opportunities to turn out for their clubs.

But Hussain defended Fletcher's reputation, having worked side by side with him since the 1999-2000 tour to South Africa.

He said: "I've got the utmost respect for Mr Boycott. He's been brilliant, the work he's done with me on my batting."

"Unfortunately, on the Duncan Fletcher he's got it wrong."

"Duncan Fletcher has been one of the greatest things that has happened to English cricket and we mustn't knock him."

"Duncan Fletcher invariably gets things right and we must get behind him now because he's got a new young captain. They need to form a relationship, and we must all get behind them and work in the same direction, not constantly knock from the outside."

Hussain, who is now 35, has scored more than 5,000 Test runs and has no immediate plans to call time on his international career like teammate Alec Stewart.

England have a busy winter ahead with tours to Bangladesh, Sri Lanka and West Indies and he plans
