

Quality of primary education better

Speakers tell second educational researchers' conference

BSS, Dhaka

The quality of primary education in terms of enrolment, attendance, promotion and repetition were found better in Bangladesh during 2000-2002 than in the previous two years. It was observed in different research studies, which were made public at the second educational researchers' conference at the Islamic Development Bank Bhaban auditorium here yesterday. Bangladesh Forum for Education Development (BAFED) in cooperation with UNESCO organised the conference. The researchers, however, expressed their confidence that the current trend of education being given in the primary schools would help the country score a sustainable rate of literacy up to 80 per cent in the next six to seven years from the present 41 per cent.

With three separate sessions, the conference was participated by eminent research fellows, educationists, policy makers, government officials and the NGO representatives concerned with primary education. They discussed five study papers on primary education. Chairman of the University Grant Commission (UGC) Prof Dr M Asaduzzaman inaugurated the conference with BAFED chairman Prof Dr Abu Hamid Latif in the chair. UNESCO representative to Bangladesh Wolfgang Vollman gave the address of welcome. Senior research fellow of Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies (BIDS) Dr Atiur Rahman chaired the first working session. Samir R Nath, Momotaz Jahan and Dr Siddiquir Rahman represented separate study papers in the first session. Dr Kamrun Nessa Begum, Dr Munsur Musa, Shaymoli Akbar and Arijit Roy presented their papers in the second working session with former director of UNESCO Dr Monzoor Ahmed in the chair.

The speakers underscored the need for conducting more resourceful and fundamental research to devise effective planning for quality primary education. They said research on various fields could explore new avenues for the policy makers to formulate effective policy. They, however, said the education system was still in a 'bad-shape' although the government had given highest priority to the development of primary education with allocating more funds in this sector.

US official lauds govt's role in democratisation
