Juve masterclass

Juventus moved to the brink of the last 16 of the Champions League after defeating Real Sociedad 4-2 here on Tuesday to maintain their hundred per cent first phase record.

French striker David Trezeguet and Italy international Marco Di Vaio both scored twice as last season's losing finalists punished the woeful defending of their Spanish visitors.

Juve took their foot off the pedal after their four-goal blitz and allowed the Basque side to bring some respectability to the scoreline with two goals in the last 23 minutes.

Croat defender Igor Tudor put through his own net in the 67th minute before Francisco De Pedro rifled home a free-kick to complete the scoring at the Delle Alpi stadium.

Juventus' victory saw them open up a three-point lead at the top of Group D and take a giant step towards the second round.

The reigning Italian champions and current league leaders have nine points from their three matches, three more than Sociedad and six more than third-placed Galatasaray.

"We have real quality throughout

Magpies don't interest Kluivert

Dutch striker Patrick Kluivert said Tuesday he has no intention of leaving Barcelona to join English Premiership side Newcastle.

"I don't want to go to Newcastle. Please believe me. No, I don't want to go," Kluivert insisted as he was crowded by reporters outside the Nou Camp stadium.

The presence of Newcastle president Freddy Shephard in Barcelona's directors' box last weekend fuelled speculation that had come to negotiate the transfer of the disgruntled Dutch international.

Kluivert is in his sixth season at Barcelona but in July he was forced to take a two million euros pay cut - his salary is believed to now be around five million euros a year - and the very public dispute between the player and the club appears to have affected his ability to find the net.

In his previous five seasons, he has never scored less than 15 goals but so far this term he has yet to get a goal.

Kluivert's recent inability to find

the net, and absence from the pitch because he is nursing a knee injury, has left him facing whistling from the stands.

"The Dutchman, who has not ruled out a move at the end of the season, said he wants the abuse to stop.

"The most important thing is for them to stop whistling, but if they insist then how can they expect someone to want to stay?" said Kluivert.

Premiership Shearer stars

Former England skipper Alan Shearer scored twice and set up another as Newcastle came back from 2-0 down to beat Fulham 3-2 at Loftus Road in the English Premiership on Tuesday.

Fulham were two goals ahead in the first seven minutes, with goals from St James' Park old boy Lee Clark and Louis Saha, but 33-year-old Shearer was the hero for the Geordies as Newcastle, who endured a miserable start to the season, pulled off their fourth win in a row.

Clark, who spent seven seasons at Newcastle, hit a superb angled drive for his first goal of the season after five minutes and, just two minutes later, Chris Coleman's men went 2-0 up through Saha's drilled shot into the far corner.

But Bobby Robson's men reduced the arrears to a single goal on the quarter hour.

Shola Ameobi crossed from the right, Laurent Robert and Shearer played a one-two and the Frenchman drove home a half-volley from 10 yards.

Shearer then levelled with a 50th-minute penalty when Alain Goma felled Shola Ameobi and the veteran striker completed Newcastle's comeback with the 56th-minute winner with his eighth goal of the season.

It was food for thought for watching England coach Sven Goran Eriksson.

Shearer, who has now retired from international football, is joint top scorer in the Premiership.

FIFA world rankings Brazil unchallenged

Kiev punish Gunners

Maxim Shatskikh's volleyed goal and a schoolboy error by Arsenal keeper Jens Lehmann earned Dynamo Kiev a 2-1 Champions League victory here on Tuesday.

Shatskikh's 27th minute, opportunist goal, after the ball had cannoned into the air, was the first blow in a match which left the Gunners rock bottom of Group B, five points behind Kiev and Inter Milan and three points adrift of Lokomotiv Moscow.

German Lehmann, inexplicably trying to dribble the ball outside his box, finally lost possession to leave Valentin Belkevich an easy goal in the 64th minute.

Thierry Henry's tap-in from six yards in the 80th minute gave Arsenal hope but it proved too little, too late for the team who are top of the English Premiership but always struggle in this competition.

Arsenal coach Arsene Wenger refused to criticise Lehmann.

"I am not here to blame players who make mistakes as, of course, before that we had time to control the ball," said the Frenchman.

"It was very unfortunate but when you ask your players to play the ball out from the back, you must expect that they will occasionally make mistakes. It is part of the game.

"Jens is very down in the dressing room but all of the boys are down."

"In the last 20 minutes we had our chances but we just couldn't get the equaliser. The ball just wouldn't break for us," he told ITV.

Arsenal beat Chelsea 2-1 on Saturday to take top spot in the Premiership in a high point after the low of anticipated player suspensions following the ugly scenes against Manchester United last month.

This result meant a further dip in morale for Arsenal who have now not won in their last eight European fixtures.

Arsenal coach Arsene Wenger left captain Patrick Vieira and Swedish winger Fredrik Ljungberg on the substitutes bench, meaning Brazilians Gilberto and Edu started in midfield.

The midfield of Kiev coach Alexei Mikhailichenko was boosted with the return to fitness of Georgi Peev though Romanian international Florin Cernat had not recovered in time.

The first chance of the game came when Robert Pires headed Thierry Henry's ninth-minute corner on to the crossbar in an early scare for the Ukrainians.

Dynamo had not conceded a goal in their last five games in Europe and the rearguard was yet again proving tough to get past. Arsenal's forays forward kept floundering around the edge of the penalty area against an impressively solid backline.

Uzbek Shatskikh proved alert to the chance when Jerko Leko's initial

Moscow mauling for Inter

Russian champions Lokomotiv Moscow recorded their first win in this season's Champions' League campaign, thrashing visitors Inter Milan 3-0 in their Group B match here on Tuesday.

Lokomotiv captain Dmitri Loskov, striker Mikhel Ashvetia and midfielder Dmitri Khokhlov were on target for the home side, lifting them into second spot in Group B.

Inter still remained on top of the group however with six points from three matches, two points ahead of second-placed Lokomotiv, though the situation could change after the other Group B match between Dynamo Kiev and Arsenal later on Tuesday.

No doubt Inter have been unsettled by the sacking of coach Hector Cuper on Sunday. The team were looked after in Moscow by interim coach Corrado Verdelli with Alberto

Zaccheroni taking the reins on Wednesday.

The hosts got off the mark after just two minutes when Loskov fired the ball into the top right hand corner from the edge of the six-yard box after Vadim Yevseyev's short pass from the right.

Inter replied positively, pinning Lokomotiv back and forcing their keeper Sergei Ovchinnikov into several impressive saves, but to no avail as the hosts defended well.

Inter skipper Javier Zanetti missed a clear chance to equalise when he stole the ball from Khokhlov and dribbled into Lokomotiv's box but could only fire the ball over the crossbar.

Lokomotiv had several scoring opportunities before the break and certainly kept the Inter keeper Francesco Toldo on his toes, but they failed to increase their lead by the half-time whistle.

After the break, Inter poured forward and their Argentinian

Luyindula denies Bayern

A goal two minutes from time from substitute Peguy Luyindula gave French champions Lyon a 1-1 draw against Bayern Munich here Tuesday as both sides kept up the pressure in the push for the knock-out stages of the Champions League.

Luyindula had replaced Sidney Govou in the 67th minute and struck the vital equaliser just as Bayern were starting to celebrate a victory they thought they had secured through Roy Makaay's first half

strike.

Ironically, the man Makaay replaced at Bayern, Giovane Elber could have won it for Lyon in stoppage time but he was denied by a superb save by Oliver Kahn.

The result means that the German champions stay top of Group A with five points with Lyon and Anderlecht, who beat Celtic 1-0, both on four points.

Celtic now prop up the group with three points.

Makaay, who also scored both goals in Bayern Munich's opening 2-1 win against Celtic, hit the target again here after 25 minutes.

The man who signed for 18.75 million euros from Deportivo La Coruna timed his run to perfection to

get on the end of a fine through ball from Michael Ballack to slot the ball past Gregory Coupet in the Lyon goal.

Ballack, last year's German Footballer of the Year, had almost broken the deadlock in the 17th minute when he forced a good save from Coupet with a rasping drive.

Lyon were relying on the pressing of Juninho for most of their inspiration while Vikash Dhorasoo saw a ninth minute attempt bobble past the post of Bayern goalkeeper Oliver Khan.

Makaay had gone into the match with Hitzfeld demanding a more all-

Tristan fires Deportivo

Didier Deschamps' great start to the Champions League took a knock as tricky forward Diego Tristan helped Deportivo La Coruna steal a 1-0 victory over enterprising Monaco here Tuesday.

Monaco, who had won their previous two matches in Group C, went down to an 83rd minute strike from Tristan after having missed a series of chances to score in the match. Monaco custodian Flavio Roma was beaten by Tristan's powerful effort when the ball deflected off his legs and trickled over the line despite efforts by defender Gael Givet to clear.

The win moves Deportivo to top of the group as Monaco slip to second.

Anderlecht upset Celtic

Ivory Coast international Aruna Dindane handed ten-man Anderlecht a Champions League lifeline after scoring the only goal in a hard-fought 1-0 win over group A rivals Celtic here on Tuesday.

Dindane tapped in a Christian Wilhelmsson pass in the 72nd minute after the Belgian league leaders had fought most of the match a man down following the sending-off of captain Glen De Boeck just before the half hour mark.

The result, coupled with Lyon's 1-1 home draw with Bayern Munich, means that Anderlecht now move up to third in the group having spent the past few weeks rooted to the bottom.
